PEOPLE HERE FOR A DAY.

A. P. Bradbury, the crackerman, who is a Hotel Pendleton guest, says "the commercial travelers are hopeful of securing for Portland the 1902 annual meeting of the T. P. A., which being interpreted, means 'travelers' national association meets in Richmond, Va. Last year it met in New Orleans. At the latter meeting, it was the understanding that Portland was to have the 1902 session, and these regular things among the travelers. Last year, the delegates from the Oregon and Washington division were Alexander Kunz, E. Shelley Morgan, A. M. Smith and A. H. Devers, four in all. This year, five delegates go to Richmond, and the Oregon and Washington members are quite confident that the delegation will knock the persons of the tree that bears annual meetings as its fruit."

Alex. Sinsheimer, representing Glafkin & Co., made the statement that his house now handles the entire output from 28 creameries, excepting one, the Milton creamery, which has a few contracts besides the one with Glafkin & Co. These creameries are mostly in the Willamette valley and the Tillamook country. They average about 1000 pounds each per week, making over 4,000,000 pounds a year handled by that house alone.

"Yet we are unable to supply the demand," said Mr. Sinsheimer, "and are constantly crowded with orders. Other houses are handling large amounts of butter, and they all find the people now coming to Oregon from the East intend to go into the dairy and creamery business, and it is certain that before many years Oregon will have vastly increased its butter output, and not, as now, imported a percentage of the total consumed."
