### EASTERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL.

Site Will Be Chosen Today for New \$300,000 Building.

The executive board of the board of regents of the Eastern Oregon normal, consisting of President R. Alexander, Secretary P. A. Worthington, of Portland, W. G. Lynn, of Helix, and Senator G. W. Probstel, met at Weston on Thursday, March 21. The special meeting of the board was for the purpose of selecting a site for the new \$300,000 building to be erected with the money appropriated therefor by the last legislature. Final action upon the matter will be taken today. Several propositions were submitted. The citizens of Weston make a donation of the site at an expense of them of \$1700 or \$1800, an evidence of good business judgment on their part. Mr. Alexander came home Thursday evening, not being able to remain over for today's session. He is in excellent spirits over the prospects of the school under Dr. Beattie. He states that the terms of office of James H. Bailey and himself as regents will expire on April 15. The governor will probably announce his appointments to those positions between now and that date. A meeting of the board of regents has been called at Weston in April. In addition to the executive board, the regents are as follows: J. W. Scriber, of La Grande; J. W. Morrow, of Heppner; James H. Bailey of Pendleton. After the selection of the site today, plans and specifications will be prepared by the executive board for the new building, which is to be three stories high with a cemented cellar. It will have electric lights and be heated by steam. Immediately after the selection of suitable plans and specifications, advertisements will be made for the erection of the building and work will be commenced as soon as possible.

## MAY EMULATE MRS. NATION.

Milton People Threaten to Demolish H. Wall's Station House.

Walla Walla, March 22.—Milton is threatened with a crusade similar to the one inaugurated in Kansas a short time ago by Mrs. Carrie Nation.

Herziah Key recently started a "gallon house" just outside the city limits. The temperance people of the town have threatened to demolish the saloon if it is not closed. Key holds a license from the government to run the place. Mr. Key was in Walla Walla yesterday and told the following story of the differences to a reporter for the Eagle.

"Upon several occasions some one has damaged my premises in different ways but I have paid but little heed, thinking the matter would end there. A revival was started in one of the churches at Milton recently and I was told that some of the ministers who were conducting the meeting, a few nights ago addressed his congregation to see that the gallon house was removed. Then one of the congregation arose and declared the only way to close the place was to attack it at once and smash it down. This plan seemed to meet with the approval of some and a council of war was held Tuesday night to devise a plan of attack.

"I sent my harknapper to church that night and he informed me of their plans. The women were to form the vanguard and their husbands would bring up the rear and act as reinforcements. All would be armed with axes and clubs. The leaders would first demand admittance. If I refused then they would open fire with their hatchets and batter in the doors. Then the fun would commence and if I resisted the men would take a hand.

"I was expecting an attack last night, but somehow they failed to appear."

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## TWO MILLIONS WERE SPENT.

Oregon Legislature Appropriated and Raised Salaries to Make That Total.

A member of the Oregon Legislature asserts that the last session will go down in history as a \$2,000,000 session, says the Oregonian. He says that the state appropriations will aggregate \$1,970,000, and that the legislature enacted laws authorizing expenditures which will swell the total beyond the \$2,000,000 mark. As the acts of the legislature at the last session have not yet been passed, the exact figures are not available, and the total can only be approximated.
