WINNING GAME OF BASEBALL

Umatilla College Team and Athena Clash This Afternoon.

The baseball season in Umatilla county is being opened at Athena this afternoon with a game between the Umatilla college team and the Athena team, which has been strengthened by the addition of three new players from Iowa, Doc Osburn, the manager of the club this year, came down to Pendleton last evening to participate in the localities incident to conferring the Purple degree on a number of the fellows at the meeting of the Pendleton encampment. He stated that he would pitch the game this afternoon and that Brown would pitch Saturday's game between the two teams. Athena had a couple of catches, Ed Rash and Ed Koontz, but both were injured in practice, so it became necessary to draft Claude Penland from Pendleton. Mr. Penland went to Athena Thursday morning and pitched with them during the day, but he will catch both games, unless knocked out. Saunders, the pitcher in today's game, has been Athena's stand-by pitcher for the past two seasons. George D. Brown, Athena's crack shortstop in 1899, will play that position again this year, and captain the team. He is a juggler of anatomy on the Athena bench. James M. Spence and Bob Fletcher will see today's game, while a score or two of Pendleton's baseball cranks will be up on Saturday forenoon to witness the game Saturday afternoon.

The matter of baseball has not taken definite shape in Pendleton, as yet. Meach will go to Portland on Friday, to be away for a week or so. When he returns the subject will be brought thoroughly talked over and plans laid to put a good team in the field.

MORE RAILWAY COMBINES

UNION PACIFIC TO BE JOINED WITH THE CENTRAL.

Ben Campbell and Other Magnates in New York to Negotiate Further Union.

A close union of the Union Pacific and Central Pacific systems may be one of the features of the near future, in keeping with recent predictions along that line. A dispatch from Chicago says that President C. M. Hayes, of the Southern Pacific; President Bart, of the Union Pacific; Vice President Bancroft, of the Oregon Short Line, and Traffic Manager Campbell, of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, passed through Chicago Wednesday en route for New York. It was expected that the distinguished party of railroad men would make a short stop in Chicago, but their car on its arrival was immediately switched to the Lake Shore tracks and was attached to the Lake Shore limited, leaving at 10:30 a. m. A conference will be held with E. H. Harriman in New York, and it is understood that negotiations will be made looking toward the consolidation of the Union and Central Pacific railway systems.

Gould's Big Railroad Trust.

George Gould's plan to become the head of a combination of railroads capitalized at \$300,000,000 is progressing favorably, says the New York World. His plan meets with the approval and has the co-operation of J. Pierpont Morgan, the Rockefeller and the Harriman syndicate. The unification of the Gould system of railroads under the control of the Missouri Pacific will include the Missouri Pacific, St. Louis & Iron Mountain, St. Louis Southwestern, Texas & Pacific, International & Great Northern, Wabash, Missouri, Texas & Pacific and the Denver & Rio Grande. George Gould has just bought a controlling interest in this latter road, and it is intimated that he purposes to utilize it as an important factor in the construction of the greater Missouri Pacific system, of which he will be the head.

It is known definitely that the roads named will be included in the scheme of consolidation. It is probable that when the negotiations now pending shall have been completed, it will be found that the list will have been augmented by the addition of the Illinois Central, Chicago & Alton, Chicago & Eastern Illinois, the St. Louis & San Francisco, and the Kansas City Southern.

The Railroad Securities company, which was organized several weeks ago by Kuhn, Loeb & Co., E. H. Harriman and George Gould, will acquire a controlling interest in all of the companies, and will operate them as one combination, though their corporate integrity will be maintained.

The New York Tribune is responsible for the following about the fate of the Burlington:

The acquisition of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company by Northern Pacific and Great Northern interests, which for many weeks has been regarded as a certain development of the near future—and that, too, despite the emphatic and comprehensive denials of President James J. Hill, which have been taken to be "technical"—is now by common consent an accomplished fact and close to the stage of formal announcement, a belief greatly strengthened by the course of Burlington stock in the Pacific in the stock market. Various surmises and "tips" were afloat as to terms on which the control of the Burlington was to be taken over, but they all agreed in saying that the Burlington stock was to be retired in exchange for 3½ per cent. debenture bonds guaranteed by the Northern Pacific, according to the several reports, at the rate of \$187, \$200 and even \$230 in bonds for \$100 in stock. It was even declared that Mr. Hill was in Boston in conference with the leading Burlington interests; but at the offices of the Great Northern, the company it was said that Mr. Hill had left this city with his family Sunday, to go to Washington, with the intention of taking a short cruise in his yacht Wacouta on Chesapeake bay, and it was thought that he is in Baltimore. He will return to New York this week.

ATHENA'S NEW RACETRACK

Horsemen Have Money to Pay for the Construction.

Athena, March 29.—There is a movement on foot among the owners of blooded horses, who reside in this city and vicinity, to build a race track. This is a move in the right direction. If carried out, it will have a tendency to improve the stock raised here and enable horse raisers to demand a better price for their animals. A site has been secured about a half mile north of town, and sufficient money has been subscribed to build a half mile kite shaped track, on which, when completed, a number of young horses will be worked this season. It is the intention of the promoters, if interest is manifested in this venture, next season to build a mile track.

Good Ball to Be Played.

George D. Brown, captain of the Athena baseball nine, was in Pendleton Monday. While there he made arrangements with Claude Penland to catch for his team Friday and Saturday of this week. On those days the Whitman college-Athena games will take place. The best game of ball ever played in Eastern Oregon is looked for, as both teams are out to win and are in good shape. Mr. Penland takes Edwin Ruel's place on the team, he having had the misfortune to have a finger dislocated at the practice game of last Sunday.

Bought 29,000 Bushels.

G. W. Bradley, the grain buyer, reports having purchased 29,000 bushels of wheat this week. The price paid was 45 cents. Mr. Bradley will on Saturday remove his office to the Post-office building on Main street, where he has been thoroughly renovated. He also expects to have his bar wire telephone system in working order in a few days.

J. R. KILGORE IS CASHIER

Farmers Bank of Weston Holds Election—Dividend of 10 Per Cent.

The annual meeting of stockholders of the Farmers' bank of Weston, held Saturday, March 23, at the office of the bank in Weston, says the Leader. Seven directors were elected, as follows: Robert Jamieson, T. J. Price, J. F. Killgore, G. W. Probstel, G. DeGraw, M. M. Johns and G. W. Staggs. This list includes all the members of the former board except Mr. Hartman, whose residence at Pendleton made it inconvenient for him to serve. Mr. Staggs being elected in his stead.

The bank's officers were chosen by the directors as follows: Robert Jamieson, president; Geo. W. Staggs, secretary; J. R. Killgore, cashier; Will Jamieson, assistant cashier. Mr. Killgore was assistant cashier under C. M. Pierce, the former cashier, now in the hotel business in Hollywood, Calif. The bank's condition continues excellent, and for the past year its business has been more remunerative than for any previous year in its history, while the future promises a still further increase in business. The directors have been enabled to declare a ten per cent. dividend on the capital stock, and to pass \$1000 to the surplus, after paying all expenses. In the report, the condition of the bank shown to be as follows:

MORE ABOUT CREAMERY IDEA

Dairymen and Farmers Think Enough Cows Can Be Pledged.

A number of farmers have called at the East Oregonian offices to endorse the proposition for a creamery, as made in this paper several days ago. It appears to be the general view that the requisite number of milch cows could be pledged to the support of such an enterprise.

A Weston Endorsement.

Commenting upon the East Oregonian's announcement that Agent Charles Wilkins and others are desirous of securing the establishment of such an enterprise, the Weston Leader says in its issue of this week:

Pendleton finds out that Umatilla county imports 15 tons of butter annually, and wants a creamery. When Pendleton wants anything she usually acquires it, and a creamery will no doubt be established. The success of the Milton creamery is opening everybody's eyes to the possibilities and value of this industry, and more of such enterprises are needed. Milton creamery butter sells readily at Weston at 60 cents per roll with farm butter going at 45, so it will be seen that the home market throughout the country affords a profitable demand, not to speak of outside shipments. There is room for more creameries, and Pendleton should secure one, and thus sustain her reputation for enterprise.

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Chief Justice Quarles expressed himself on several matters, as follows:

"The labor troubles in Shoshone county seem to be nearly at an end. Governor Frank Hunt is at Wallace now investigating affairs with the intention of having civil law restored, if conditions justify. The rioting at Wardner, Wallace, Gem and other mining camps, occurred on April 29, 1900, and martial law was declared on May 4 or 5. The federal troops stationed there now have been ordered to the Philippines.

Idaho's Bright Outlook.

"The outlook for Idaho is bright. The emigration to the state for the past three years has been something phenomenal. It is liable to continue indefinitely. There is going to be considerable railroad building this summer. I think the Short Line will extend its road from Blackfoot to Houston in the Lost River valley, a distance of 80 miles. Dewey has his railroad graded from Nampa to Emmett, a distance of 30 miles, and the rails will soon be laid. One of the most important railroad projects in prospect, however, is the building of the Midland from Boise to Butte. It is not unreasonable to predict that this line will be built this summer.

There is considerable mining activity throughout the state. It is general and not restricted to any particular section. Business is good everywhere and the state is making rapid progress. Fred T. Dubois' re-election as United States senator seems to please everyone except the republicans.

Isaac N. Sullivan, Charles O. Stock-

lager and R. P. Quarles constitute the supreme court of the state. Judge Sullivan has been a member of that body ever since the admission of the state into the union in 1890. Judge Stocklager is a brother of the gentleman who was succeeded by Binger Horton as commissioner of the general land office.
