GENERAL NEWS.

English soldiers in West Africa are deserting. Reindeer reserves have been set apart in Alaska.

Mayor Alejandro Rodriguez of Havana has resigned. Maurice Barrymore has been declared hopelessly insane.

Seven thousand German soldiers will return home this month from China. Two thousand of Farragut's sailors were entertained in Brooklyn navy yard.

American trade in flannels, sheeting and jeans in China has increased greatly.

The Russian comptroller-general is found to be short in his accounts 44,000,000 roubles. The English cabinet may create more titles, the Prince of Australia and the Prince of Canada.

J. P. Morgan's syndicate has bought the Lake Superior Consolidated Mining Co.'s property.

Larkspur won the Montgomery handicap at Memphis from the Conqueror, 11-16 miles, time 1:55 1/2.

Generals Botha and Dewet are said to have united 13,000 men for operators against Gen. French in the Transvaal. A Buffalo meeting of 1000 people adopted resolutions favoring Sunday closing of the Pan-American exposition.

W. Jessop & Sons, Sheffield, England, factors of crucible steel, founded in 1774, will build a plant in this country.

Admiral Remy, commander of the Asiatic squadron, has been ordered to proceed on his flagship to Melbourne, Australia.

Under a decree American citizens of German birth who return to Prussia in military service age, having avoided service there, cannot reside in Prussia permanently.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Colfax had two inches of snow on Monday. Portland's Y. M. C. A. had a house warming.

Free rural delivery has been established at Salem. J. W. Farrier, a Chehalis farmer, shot B. Holcomb.

M. T. Chisler, a Harrington, Wash., harness dealer, suicided. The U. of O. and the U. of C. will have a field and track meet.

The Lewiston Development Co. has been formed with \$250,000 stock. Six cents has been fixed as the price of Salmon on the Columbia river.

Woodburn voted against license 100 to 80. S. Tolmison is the new mayor. An unknown man by mistake shot Geo. Isman, of Lewiston, on Monday.

Orin Hamlin, an Albany drayman, suicided Tuesday by taking strychnine. One thousand acres of desert lands has been located on near Oroville, Wash.

W. B. Taylor was convicted at Walla Walla of attempted criminal assault. Petitions for open gambling were presented to the Portland police commissioners.

A. R. Humphrey & Co. are charged with a shortage of wheat in their warehouse at Salem. Independence has no trouble in selling bonds at 4 per cent to take up the 6 per cent warrants.

J. B. Yeon sold 40,000,000 feet of standing timber to the Pelton-Armstrong Co. at Astoria. Commander-in-chief Leo Ralsieur of the G. A. R. will visit Portland between June 26 and 28.

Alamo, near Lawton, cannot have a saloon. A new law prohibits saloons within a mile of a mine.

Twenty thousand acres of virgin redwoods have been bought by Isaac Minor, for \$1,000,000. A contract for an ocean cable has been let to an English firm. It is for the Pacific cable from Victoria.

Alexander Rash, of Salem, was drowned by falling overboard from the schooner Bear on route to Unalaska. A man named Stringer suicided at Friday Harbor, after a quarrel with his wife, who then tried to kill herself with poison.

ASKS FILIPINOS TO SURRENDER

Aguinaldo is Drawing Up a Proclamation.

HIS OWN STATUS NOT YET SETTLED

Investigation Proceeds as to How He Conducted His Warfare—One Proclamation Against Him.

Manila, April 3.—Aguinaldo is engaged today in drawing up a proclamation calling on the Filipinos to acknowledge American authority and to lay down their arms, thus bringing the war to an end. Gen. MacArthur and his secretary, Lieutenant Colonel Crowder, were present yesterday when Aguinaldo took the oath, which was administered by Chief Justice Arellano, who had been a member of Aguinaldo's first cabinet. Arellano has explained in several interviews the policy of the United States in the Philippines, and Aguinaldo has exclaimed: "Enough! I'm satisfied with America!"

INVESTIGATING THE FRAUDS

MacArthur Alleges They Are Not of Gravity.

Washington, April 3.—General MacArthur cables: "The commissary frauds are being investigated. They are not of sufficient gravity to cause concern, and are apparently due to irregularities in the sales of savings. The gross reports are inexact and misleading."

He adds that Brigadier-General Hughes reports the surrender at Banga, in Northwest Panay, on March 31, of thirty officers, one hundred men, and seven hundred rifles, and that General Kober reports twenty-one men and twenty-one guns surrendered on the same date in Northern Mindanao.

HIS RECORD SCRUTINIZED

Aguinaldo Must Show He Warrs a Civilization.

Washington, April 3.—Although Aguinaldo has taken the oath of allegiance, he still is liable to punishment if it should be proved that he has not been conducting the warfare according to civilized rules. Investigation is now being made as to whether he or some one else was responsible for certain proclamations issued in his name, one ordering the guerrilla chiefs to demand three Filipinos in exchange for each American prisoner, and, in case the Americans refused, the American prisoners were to be shot.

HARRISON WAS ELECTED

Chicago Chooses a Democratic Mayor by 28,827 Majority.

Chicago, April 3.—Carter Harrison has been re-elected mayor of Chicago for the second time and will now commence his third term as chief executive of this city. His total plurality over Judge Elbridge Hency, republican, was 28,827 votes. The total vote of the city is: Harrison, 156,952; Hency, 128,695.

Of the 35 wards of the city Harrison carried 26 and Hency nine. The vote was badly split, some of the strongest republican wards of the city giving only a small plurality for their ticket and some going for Harrison who in turn suffered in some of the democratic strongholds. The indications at present are that the republicans will have a working majority in the council. The present body consists of 339 republicans, 27 democrats and four independents. Of the holdovers 16 were republicans, 15 democrats and three independents.

The chief issue in the campaign has been the granting of franchises to the street car companies of the city. These will all expire soon by limitation and terms of extension are to be settled during the next two years. Harrison has in former years made a record against the granting of long franchises. The democrats carried all the city offices on the ticket as well as mayor.

Other Eastern Elections. St. Louis, April 3.—Rolla Wells, democrat, was elected mayor by 16,000 plurality. St. Louis usually gives 15,000 republican plurality.

Kansas City, Mo., April 3.—In Kansas City, Kan., the largest city in the state, the democrats achieved a sweeping victory for the first time in the city's history, electing the mayor and all the city officers by 900 plurality.

In Topeka, where the republican ticket was supported by the law enforcement people, the democrats claim to have elected Arthur Parker, the remainder of officers elected being republicans.

Emporia, Kan., April 3.—The republican ticket which was supported by the prohibition element, won today.

Denver, April 3.—The republicans have elected the entire ticket except the mayor which is in doubt.

Lawrence, Kan., April 3.—The republican ticket was elected here by a majority of three to one.

Atchison, Kan., April 3.—J. W. Orr, democrat, was elected mayor today by 500 majority.

Leavenworth, Kan., April 3.—The entire democratic ticket is elected by a majority of 500. St. Joseph, Mo., April 3.—The city election resulted in a republican victory. Boise, Idaho, April 3.—Elections were held today in all towns of Idaho,

excepting Boise. There was little or no politics entering into the contests. Howard S. Ebbree was elected mayor of Caldwell, N. J. McClelland of Nampa and A. B. Anderson of Weiser.

Leadville, Colo., April 3.—The republicans elected the mayor today. Colorado Springs, Colo., April 3.—Colorado Springs elected the entire republican ticket today by from 1400 to 1800 majority.

San Diego, Calif., April 3.—The republicans have elected their entire ticket with the exception of the city treasurer.

Tacoma, April 3.—At the municipal election today the republicans elected seven councilmen and the democrats two. This is a republican gain of one.

BEARING PHILLIPS' MARKET

SAVAGE ATTACK ON THE CORN CORNER MADE THINGS LIVELY.

The Speculator Stood the Ground and Put Up Margins Enough to Hold His Advantage.

Chicago, April 3.—"Corn King" Phillips was the center of an attack today by the big bears of the speculative world, who are after his scalp. Wheat, corn, and oats broke off at the opening; but, on his support, rallied some, and, at the close, wheat showed a loss of two cents, corn one and seven-eighths cents, and oats three-quarters of a cent. Phillips had to put up an additional \$150,000 in margins, but says he is able to fight the bears to a finish. The latter promise a continuance of the tactics that made the boards of trade a scene of such activity and excitement today.

ASKED FOR \$25,000. Walla Walla Makes a Request of Andrew Carnegie.

Walla Walla, April 3.—If Andrew Carnegie acts in accordance with the wishes of the city council Walla Walla will have a \$25,000 library building. Councilman Isaacs introduced a resolution requesting a donation in this sum at the meeting of the city council last night and it was adopted without a dissent. The city pledging itself to spend \$2500 each year in maintenance. The program to be followed out upon the arrival of the president was also discussed.

Allen Resigns. New York, April 3.—A special to the World from Washington says: Charles H. Allen, governor of Porto Rico, who left San Juan today for Washington is expected to tender his resignation soon after reaching here. Mr. Allen will retire voluntarily.

MORGAN WANTS CANAL CONTROL

Has Organized a Company for Construction.

PRESIDENT M'KINLEY FAVORS IT

The Washington Times Confirms the Story and Quotes From State Department Official.

Washington, April 3.—The Times this morning confirms the story that a company organized by J. P. Morgan has offered to construct the Panama canal, and give this government every concession desired, in the Nicaraguan project be given up. The state department officials are given as authority, but they are not willing to admit that they are familiar with the details. It is said that the president is inclined to regard the matter favorably. This is the Scheme. The scheme is mentioned in a Washington dispatch to the Chicago Chronicle, which says: J. Pierpont Morgan has a gigantic scheme that the United States government shall abandon its plan of building a canal across the isthmus of Panama and permit private capital to take up and finish the work already accomplished on the Panama canal. Mr. Morgan, accompanied by James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern railroad and chief stockholder of the Northern Pacific, arrived from New York on Hill's yacht today. Tonight Messrs. Morgan and Hill and Senator Hanna, who had been notified of the coming of the distinguished financiers, have been in conference with President McKinley in an endeavor to interest the executive in the project. It is understood that a syndicate headed by Morgan and Hill has secured a low figure a majority of the stock of the Panama company and is now in absolute control not only of the affairs of that corporation, but of its property and franchises as well.

TO PLACE STEEL STOCKS

Morgan Leaves for Europe to Sell Combines Securities.

New York, April 3.—J. P. Morgan sailed at noon today for Liverpool on the steamer Tonic. He refused to talk, saying that his plans would not be completed until he reached the other side. It is known, however, that he intends placing the stock of the big steel combine on the exchanges in London, Paris and Berlin. Several detectives kept watch of the millionaire until the last whistle blew.

THE AMERICAN HANDICAP

Entries Number 216 Terms of the Shoot Weather Bad.

Interstate Park, N. V., April 3.—Two hundred and sixteen entries for the grand American handicap at trap shooting lined up this morning in a driving rain, while a strong easterly wind blew fiercely across the traps. Conditions governing the big event are twenty-five birds, \$25 entrance, twenty-five to thirty-three yards handicaps, \$1500 guarantee, with surplus added. The winner receives a silver cup worth \$500. The favorites in the betting are Elliott, Gilbert and Crosby, each being handicapped at thirty-two yards.

Boers Stop Trains.

Naanport, April 3.—In consequence of renewed activity on the part of the Boers, night trains running in a northerly direction have been suspended.
