FOR THE HORSE PARADE

DATE FOR IT HAS BEEN SET MAY 4, SATURDAY.

Entries Must Be in on or Before April 25—Horsemen Should Send in Descriptions.

One year ago Pendleton gave a horse parade, and surprised the country with the display of animals the equal of which had not been seen in any town of the Pacific coast. The parade this year will occur on Saturday, May 4, one month hence, and it is believed it will surpass the display made last year. However, horsemen must be careful, if such a result is to be attained, and to this end, the following will be adopted, and will be strictly adhered to:

THEIR TOUR OF THE COAST

CHICAGO COMMERCIAL CLUB RETURNS HOME AND TALKS.

They Say They Were Well Treated by the People of the Far West.

The Chicago Commercial club members who were in Pendleton on route home ten days ago, are thus mentioned by the Chicago American:

The Commercial club's junket through the wild and woolly West to the Pacific coast cities is probably the biggest advertisement Chicago has had since the inhabitants of that section themselves crossed the Rockies and gazed in wonderment upon the White City. The world's fair gave to many of the people of the Western slope their first conception of the greatness of Chicago and that "I will" spirit that has made her what she is.

The trip which the club just ended was never quite paralleled in the history of excursions that have gone out of Chicago. Never before has a large party of men of affairs in control of great business interests been able to take together such a long trip out of this city. Surely an excursion of a party of such representative business men as Marshall Field, William A. Fuller, E. G. Kiehl, John V. Farwell and the others who went, could not help but attract attention wherever it went.

One of the members, speaking of the attempts made at different places by calculative minds to estimate in a round sum the wealth the party represented, said: "When we were in Los Angeles we were said to be worth \$200,000,000. At San Francisco these figures were shoved up to a billion dollars. At Salt Lake City it had passed the billion dollar mark by a quarter of a million dollars. If they could have peered into our wallets when we got home they'd have come down to dollars and cents. Well, the people on the coast were quite as liberal with their hospitality as they were with their exaggerations of our combined wealth."

The party was wine and dined wherever it stopped. The memorable trip was finished with a swift ride through Iowa and Illinois that established a new record for passenger travel from Council Bluffs to Chicago. The special train that carried the party of distinguished men covered about 8000 miles during the twenty-three days out of Chicago.

Success in Every Respect.

W. A. Fuller, president of the Commercial club, said: "The trip was a grand success in every respect. We were royally received everywhere we went. The western people appear delighted to meet Chicagoans. They were all pleased with our lofty opinions of the coast. It certainly is a garden spot. The personal acquaintance which resulted from the extended trip will no doubt be beneficial to all concerned. We learned much of the great possibilities of the Western country. There was no direct talk of investments being made, although I guess there wasn't a man who made the trip but that would be glad to own a winter home in California."

"The cities and inhabitants of the far West received us in a most kindly manner. They were good imitators of Minister Wu in so far as information from this direction was concerned. They desire to know more of Chicago out there and what Chicago is doing. They had a brief glimpse of us during the world's fair—just enough to whet their appetites."

Royally Entertained.

Metropolitan national bank, said: "We were royally treated by the people of the West. No act of courtesy or hospitality that might in any way conduce to the enjoyment of the trip was omitted. This in itself explains the attitude of the coast cities toward Chicago. It was not because we were members of the Commercial club or any other organization. It was simply because we came from Chicago. We were treated so royally by the people of the coast that I have no doubt that they must have a high opinion of the city of Chicago and its business men. Everywhere we went Chicago was spoken of in glowing terms. Our city is the hub of the Western country so far as the concentration of their business relations is concerned."

GASOLINE CAN EXPLODED.

Charles Bade, the Contractor, Was Seriously Burned.

Charles Bade, of the Jacobson-Bade company of Portland, contractors, was seriously burned on Sunday, March 31, at 12 o'clock. His company has the contract for the new two-story brick building at the Indian agency which is approaching completion. Among other things to be looked after was a gasoline engine, of which Mr. Bade had charge. He was engaged in starting the engine, and when it took the sparks, it exploded a small can of gasoline which was too near. Mr. Bade was terribly burned about the neck and face. His mustache and eyebrows were singed and his face blistered so as to be unrecognizable to his acquaintances. His neck was so badly burned that it puffed up to twice its normal size. Dr. C. J. Smith attended the victim of the accident until Monday, when he took the night train for his home at Portland.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY'S REPORT.

A Pamphlet of 124 Pages Showing Membership to Be 627.

The second annual report of the Oregon Historical society is from the press and comes to the East Oregonian. The work may thus be summarized: It is a pamphlet 6 1/2 x 9 1/2 inches and contains 124 pages. It shows that the society had 627 members on November 30, 1900, distributed in twenty-two counties in Oregon and four in Washington. The material collected during the year is classified as follows: Library department—Documents, 134; diaries, account books, etc., 18; maps and charts, 15; bound newspaper files, 27; miscellaneous papers, unbound, 53; pamphlets, 165; miscellaneous books, 106; early school books, 48; Museum department—Pioneer relics, 207; archaeological relics, 172; pioneer photographs, 448; other pictures, 139. The documents consist mainly of letters and other written matter relating to the early social and business life of the country, and the relics are such as were used while crossing the plains with teams or in the early industries of the country. Visitors at the rooms in the city hall, Portland, average 1500 a month, and all who visit that city are cordially invited to call.
