

They have made improvements to the plant, and will increase the output to 4000 rolls or full 5000 pounds per month. J. M. Spence will act as salesagent for the creamery which insures that the business will be looked after carefully, and that the output will reach the market where the price is highest. F. W. McRaymonds is retained at the creamery as butter maker. He has no superiors in his line of work. The butter of the Ukiah creamery has a flavor which makes it eagerly sought after. Fred Bruce at Walla Walla—New Pen Prisoners.

Walla Walla, April 5.—Fred Bruce is guilty of stealing horses. After being out 24 hours the jury has so decided and he will have to suffer the penalty for his crime. It was for some time thought that the jury would disagree and that a new trial would be necessary to the result. The 12 men selected to try the case came back three times for instructions and caused the court and the attorneys no end of bother—but finally agreed.

This makes the present number of prisoners at the institution 240, which is seven more than at any former time.

COST OF PUMPING WATER

MAYOR VINCENT'S ADDRESS TO THE NEW COMMISSIONERS.

He Gives Facts and Figures Setting Forth His Experience in Handling the System.

At the meeting of the city council held on Wednesday evening, April 3, the waterworks and everything pertaining thereto were turned over to the water commission. The time was open for Mayor F. W. Vincent to give the commission some advice and offer a few suggestions, as follows:
