Assembles in San Francisco on May 14.

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PRIZE FOR LARGEST TROUT

PENDLETON SPORTSMEN'S ASSOCIATION PUT UP A \$100 BOD.

Rules Governing Contest Are Given in Detail—Time Is From April 1, to October 31, Inclusive.

The Pendleton Sportsmen's Association, at a special meeting held Friday evening, April 12, decided to offer a \$100 fishing rod as a prize to the member of the organization who should catch the largest trout (dressed) in the waters of the Umatilla river and its tributaries during the season of 1901, April 1 to October 31, inclusive.

Rules governing the contest: The following rules and conditions were adopted to govern the contest: The fish must be caught in the waters of the Umatilla or its tributaries by a member of the Pendleton Sportsmen's association; must be one of the following varieties: rainbow trout (salmo gairdneri), Dolly Varden (salvelinus malinensis), bull trout (salvelinus malinensis), western trout (salvelinus malinensis).

The Dolly Varden and bull trout are commonly named Oregon charr. The fish must be weighed by hook and line, with a pole; three members of the association shall make affidavit to the size of the trout, filing same with secretary; three reliable witnesses shall be named, so that the three members can satisfy themselves that the fish was caught in the waters of the Umatilla or its tributaries; any signs of snaggling or gabbok shall be held against the fisherman; the executive board of the association will decide all disputes, and their action shall be final; should any member falsely represent any information regarding this contest he shall be expelled under the by-laws of the association.

The committee to arrange the conditions of the contest consisted of J. E. Krasso, H. J. Stillman and C. C. Berkeley.

Club Shoot for Medal.

The regular monthly club shoot for the gold medal will occur at the usual place on Sunday, April 14, at 10 o'clock a. m. H. J. Stillman won the trophy the first two times and F. W. Waite the third time. The contest tomorrow will be of great interest.

Baseball Players Will Practice.

The baseball players who are figuring on becoming members of Pendleton's team this year will practice on the Alta street grounds Sunday afternoon. There is considerable talent in process of development, and it is thought that a strong nine can be gotten together. The board of directors have several important matters under consideration with the intention of starting the season off with a boom. No dates have been arranged as yet, nor is it known what team will be selected as opponents for Pendleton to open the season. Four teams have been proposed, Baker City, Athena, Whitman college and Sharpstein's Walla Walla team.

THE PRICE OF POTATOES

AN ADVANCE OF 100 PER CENT WITHIN THREE MONTHS.

There will be no more shipments to Denver at Forty Cents Per Sack.

Three and four months ago the price of potatoes in Pendleton was quoted at 40 cents per sack, delivered at the grocery stores, and they did not seem to be in very good demand even at that figure. As the winter passed and potatoes became scarcer, they advanced 10 cents per bushel. Several of the heaviest holders of last year's crop refused to dispose of their potatoes at the time, and still have several thousand sacks left. G. W. Rigby shipped a carload, 300 sacks, to Denver, Colo., two months ago, which netted him 40 cents per sack. The shipment had no sooner arrived at Denver than the merchant to whom consigned wrote back for three or four carloads more at the same figure. Mr. Rigby remarked this morning that he had no more potatoes either to ship or sell at home at 40 cents per sack.

Jump to 75 Cents.

The scarcity of spuds in the local market and the demand both here and at neighboring cities, had the effect of jumping the price from 50 cents to 75 cents per sack. That price is being generally offered by grocers, who retail them out to customers at from 85 cents to \$1 per sack.

RESERVE THE REDWOODS

Commendable Effort to Save Great Trees From Destruction

Boston, April 13.—The recent action of the state of California in appropriating \$250,000 to purchase a tract of redwood forest near Santa Cruz for a public reservation has aroused interest in every part of the country, perhaps nowhere more than in Massachusetts, where for years an intelligent group of tree lovers have urged the necessity of some such step. It is the redwood lands that are to be preserved to future generations in its original glory.

At the Arnold Arboretum in this city the opinion is expressed that the Santa Cruz reservation should be considered as only the starting wedge, other and larger reservations being required if a really adequate and typical portion of one of the most remarkable great growths in the world—by all odds the most remarkable in this country—is to be saved from the ravages of the lumber dealer.

Prof. Sargent's Views.

The director of the Arboretum, Professor Charles S. Sargent, whose work in charge of the forest investigation of the tenth census and, later, as head of the committee of the National Academy appointed to consider the dangers arising from the wholesale destruction of the western timber lands, was the cause of such national forest reservations as now possess.—is not disposed, however, to minimize in the slightest the importance of the action which has been taken. A recent statement of Professor Sargent sums up what has been done as follows:
