A short time ago the Oregonian published a brief description of a railroad incubator invented by Colonel R. C. Judson, the renowned agrostrologist of The incubator was described as consisting of a series of chambers, or tunnels heated to the proper temperature, through which a sort of endless-chain traveling conveyor meanders, which is kept supplied with eggs from a hopper at one end, and its speed is so timed that the eggs are batched just as they reach the other end, so that a stream of eggs is constantly flowing into one end of the machine and a stream of chickens constantly flowing out at the other. 


