HAMS, BACON, BEEF, MUTTON

THE OREGON FARMERS DO NOT RAISE ENOUGH.

Or Some Thing is the Matter With the Market Handling of Livestock.

Many persons will learn with surprise that immense quantities of meat are shipped here from the East, while all the time Oregon boasts of her vast ranges for sheep and cattle, and her fine beginning at the hog industry. And considerable interest will be felt in the following statement recently made to the Portland Telegram.

Dr. A. H. Melvin, who, in the interest of the United States bureau of animal industry recently toured California, Oregon, Eastern Washington and Montana, and in the course of his travels inspected the various packing houses in Portland as well as in San Francisco and Seattle, is credited with having made the startling statement that Portland could do 100 per cent more business in this line than it is now doing, if the live product could be supplied to the packing firms who are sending their goods into other states and into foreign countries.

Instead of Portland supplying its own packers with fresh pork from the adjacent territory, it imports annually amazing numbers of hogs. Since last fall, records from the bureau of animal industry show more than 2000 head of hogs were brought to Portland from Nebraska alone. And in conjunction with this the Armour, Cudahy, St. Clair and other Eastern and Middle States packers send in Portland something like a carload of Eastern hog products every day. Wallawa county hograisers, who are supposed to be well acquainted with the business, declare that at 2 1/2 cents a pound hogs can be raised profitably. And the Portland daily market reports show pork quoted at 6 1/2 and 7 cents.

Montana Sends Us Beef.

"As to beef," said a Portland packing house representative, "the Portland market is supplied mostly by Montana, California and Nevada. When taking into consideration the fact that during the past few months from 2500 to 3000 head of cattle were shipped to Portland through the Union Stock yards, the insufficiency of the local supply may be readily understood. Of the beef very little, if any, is exported, after being killed and dressed. It goes to fill the local demand."

"Sheep, on the contrary, are shipped East every day, but a large proportion of them return as mutton. The animals are taken to the Eastern states to be fattened on screenings, and then in turn butchered and shipped to the West, and perhaps to the very locality where they first saw the light of day. This reason of this thousands of head of stunted flocks go to waste that could otherwise, with a little progressive energy and work be used to financial advantage."

"Right on the face of all this possibility Omaha is supplying mutton to the Seattle market every day, and twice a week a carload of mutton goes into Wallawa, Idaho, a market which, by right, should belong to this city."

When questioned as to the cause of this state of affairs the speaker gave the laconic answer: "Simply for the very same reason that moss grows on trees."

A BIG INCREASE IN LAMBS

How Sheepmen Figure on a Matter of Much Interest.

Every once in a while reference is made to the percentage of increase in lambs, which is a subject of considerable interest to sheepmen particularly. Sheepmen figure the matter in different ways which is liable to mislead those who do not understand. The correct way, according to the opinion of J. E. Smith, of Pilot Rock, is to compare to the number of lambs with the total number of ewes. Some sheepmen do not figure that way, but in estimating the percentage increase do not take the dry ewes into consideration. The lambing season is about over and many sheepmen report an increase of more than 100 per cent of lambs as compared to the number of ewes. Mr. Smith and William H. Evans, also of Pilot Rock, expressed the opinion that a conversation held recently that the increase in the number of lambs, as compared with all the ewes in the county, would this year be more than 90 per cent, when all were counted after coming out of the summer ranges in the mountains next fall. This to them was a satisfactory state of affairs, for it means a percentage of 100 or increase, or more, as compared with the number of breeding ewes, which is large for any country. The conditions during the lambing season in Umatilla county, with the exception of a week or ten days at the commencement, were favorable and sheepmen without an exception are in good humor.

THE COST OF GRUB AT HOME

Prices Are Very Reasonable for That Country.

Seattle, April 30.—The Times has this from Nome: "Not only is there a great variety of food and clothing in this region, but the supply is ample. Only a few lines will be short when the boats arrive next June. Prices are reasonable, as may be seen by this retail list of staples."

Flour, per sack, \$2.50; ham and bacon, per pound, 25c; canned meats, can, 50c; canned fruits, can, 50c; canned vegetables, can, 35c; tea, pound, 75c to \$1; coffee, pound, 50c; beans, pound, 15c; rice, pound, 15c; rolled oats, meal, etc., pound, 10c; eggs, dozen, 50c; sugar, pound, 10c; condensed milk, can, 25c; vinegar, gallon, \$1.

During the past week these prices have been cut by several firms, but it is very probable that the prices quoted will be the general rate all winter. As far as known, lemons are the only short article at this time. The few in camp sell at \$3 per dozen. Until many people killed their horses for dog meat hay was short, but there is now enough to last through at \$250 per ton. There is an over supply of potatoes, and the old "sour doughs" are delighted and surprised when they can get fresh spuds in mid-winter at \$5 per cwt. Coal sells at from \$5 to \$7.50 per ton, according to quality, while drift wood brings \$15 to \$20 per cord.

Plenty of Whiskey.

The supply of whiskey seems to be unlimited, and there is no danger of the camp suffering from a shortage in this line. If the supply should run low the camp can fall back on "hootch," a delightful native beverage. Perhaps no outpost of civilization can boast of more liquor resorts than Nome, but by some perverse species of reasoning many people have arrived at the conclusion that the camp would be a "dead end" if it wasn't for the

saloon and gamblers." Drunkenness and gambling create wealth!

Standard Oil Was Fair.

In connection with the provision question, I wish to record a tribute to the evident fairness and humanity shown by the people here by one of the most unscrupulous trusts in America—the Standard Oil Co. This trust shipped in a large supply of coal oil last summer, and brought the price from 70c down to 50c per gallon. This discouraged the shipment of large stocks of oil to this point by local companies, and the prediction was freely made by those familiar with the ways of the trust that when other dealers had been frozen out, up would go the price of that very necessary commodity. But the Standard Oil company has agreeably surprised all prophets, and for once kept its word. Now when other stocks of oil are practically exhausted and the trust has the entire field to itself, it charges the same low rate for oil and guarantees the same to last all winter. To force an exorbitant price, which the trust could easily do, would work a great hardship on the people who have to burn large quantities of oil during these dark days and nights.

REMEDY FOR BALKY HORSES.

More Humane Than Torture and More Effective.

The asphalt of Pine street, just east of Nassau street, is being repaired. Yesterday at noon a two-horse team attached to a huge wagon of smoking hot asphalt balked in Nassau street on the subway corner. The driver struck the near horse, which was the particular object, once or twice with his whip. The near horse plunged and kicked. The other horse nearly tore its heart out trying to pull the whole load. The wagon slid back against the curbstone and the whole traffic of the street stopped. The driver got down with an ugly look in his eye. When he reached the ground he found himself face to face with S. P. C. A. Officer Seymour, who is posted in that neighborhood to be present on just such occasions.

"Well," said the driver, defiantly, to Seymour, "what am I going to do?" Seymour looked abstractedly at a steam roller that was working forty feet away.

A CREAMERY FOR ECHO

THE STOCKMEN OF THAT REGION ARE IN EARNEST.

L. C. Rogers Has Added a Carload of Dutch Belt Cattle to His Herd.

Now come the stockmen of the Echo country, who, after giving the subject careful consideration, say they are going to have a creamery there. The wonder is that they haven't thought of it before and had the creamery in operation long ago.

Rogers' New Cattle.

L. C. Rogers has long been known as the owner of a fine herd of Herefords, which have attracted much attention, not alone in Umatilla county, but in Eastern Washington as well, and for miles around in this section of the state. Mr. Rogers is one of those anxious to see a creamery established at some convenient point on the Meadows near Echo. He has recently purchased a carload of Dutch Belt cattle and they are now on his farm. A half tone cut of these animals will shortly appear in the East Oregonian. This breed of cattle is celebrated both as beef and milk producers and Mr. Rogers' experiment with them will be carefully noted.

Others Have Bought.

Quite a number of head of thoroughbred animals of different breeds have recently been purchased and taken by the new owners to the vicinity of Echo, and the outlook is that the stockmen are going to pay more attention to fancy cattle than heretofore. This creamery talk will stimulate the business all around.

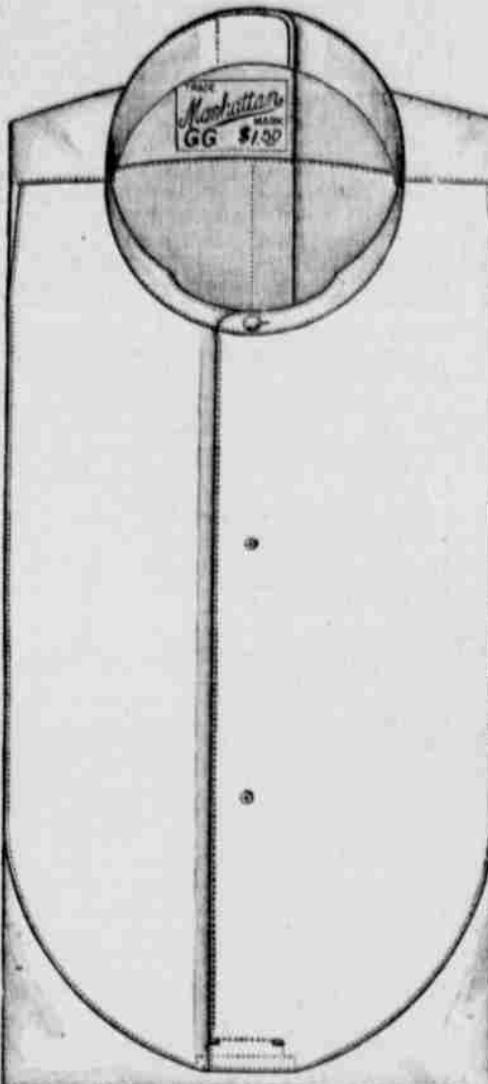
