YOUNG CHIEF FEAST.

The Event Will Occur on Tuesday May
7, at Thorn Hollow.
The feast to the memory of the late
Young Chief, who died a few months
ago will occur at his former home at
Thorn Hollow on Tuesday May 7. Long
Hair has sent out invitations to several
chiefs at the Flathead agency, Montana,
and Paul Showaway has done likewise
to the Nez Percés chiefs. Chief Joseph
and wife and seven braves arrived on
Tuesday from the Colville reservation
Washington, and are now encamped at
Thorn Hollow awaiting the opening of
feastivities.
The widow of the lamented Young
Chief is going to make the feast one
long to be remembered and a large
crowd will be in attendance. It will
last several days and during that time
a successor to Young Chief will be
elected.
Col. Wm. Parsons is in receipt of
letters from the Flathead agency, re-
ferring to legal matters, and incident-
ally mentioning that the chiefs there
will accept the invitation to the Young
Chief feast.

BESTHORN AND NISSEN.

Nearly 200 Persons Present at the
Wedding Tuesday Afternoon.
The marriage of Ed Besthorn and
Miss Marie Margarette Nissen took
place at the German hall in the Cold
Spring country at 2 o'clock on the
afternoon of Tuesday, April 30. The
ceremony was performed by Rev. E.
A. Wentzel of Walla Walla, in the
presence of nearly 200 persons, of whom
about 30 were intimate friends of the
groom from Pendleton. The bride
recently arrived here from Germany,
coming over with Hans Struve and
family upon their return from a visit
to the old country. Mr. Besthorn is a
popular member of the Verein Ein-
tracht and in business in this city,
where he and his bride will make
their home. The wedding party re-
turned this morning from Cold
Spring.

Preparing Baseball Grounds.

Commencing on Thursday, May 2,
the work of putting the baseball
grounds in good repair will commence.
The stones in left field will be care-
fully removed so as not to break them,
the bank in the same locality will be
spread out with a grader, and the in-
field will be shaved and given a hair
cut if necessary with a street scraper.
Manager Rader will put a force of men
at work and will not let up until the
ground is fit for professionals to play
on. The date for the opening game of
the season in Pendleton will probably
be Tuesday, May 14, and the visitors
will be from Colfax.

Death From Smallpox.

Will Bell, aged 22 years, died today
at 12 o'clock, from what Dr. J. C.
Smith, the attending physician, of
Adams, pronounced to be smallpox.
The deceased was the son of John
Bell, who was in Pendleton Tuesday
and who lives a few miles south of
Athena. Dr. Cropp was sent for and
came over to Athena on the train today
to give his testimony as to whether or
not it was smallpox.

HOUSES MUST BE NUMBERED

ORDINANCE PASSED AT AN ADJOURNED
MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

This is a Move Preparatory to Having
the Free Postal Delivery
System.

The city council is anxious to com-
ply with the requirements of the post-
office department regarding the free
postal delivery system, and has passed
an ordinance regarding the numbering
of houses. According to the system the
Jackson-Dickson company office at the
corner of Main and Webb street will
be No. 595, Main street; the Hotel St.
George will be No. 600, Main street;
M. A. Rader's furniture store will be
No. 599, Main street; the W. & C. R.
ticket office will be No. 601, Main
street; the Pendleton Savings Bank No.
700, Main street; Kemper's grocery
store No. 701; the First National bank
No. 795; Brock & McCombs' drug
store, No. 799; Wessell's department
store, Judd building, No. 800; The
Boston store, No. 801; the Hotel Pen-
dleton, No. 899. From the above-
mentioned numbers those interested will
be enabled to figure out their number on
Main street. The short streets north
of Court street east of Mill street com-
mence at the southwest corner of the
blocks on Court to number, with 100
as a basis, the even numbers being
on the east side of the street. The
numbering of the houses in Homer's
addition and Rader's addition, the
streets which extend north through
Switzer's addition and Livermore's
addition, commence with No. 100
at their southern termini at the
Umatilla river.

The Ordinance.
Further information may be ob-
tained from a careful study of the fol-
lowing ordinance as passed by the
council and approved by the mayor:
Section 1. All houses and buildings
used for dwelling or business purposes
fronting on any street, shall, within
thirty days after the passage of this or-
dinance be numbered as hereinafter
provided and all houses and buildings,
used for dwelling or business purposes,
hereafter built, shall, within twenty
days after being erected, be num-
bered as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. All houses and buildings as
in section 1, shall be numbered with
metallic or painted figures, of such
size, form and composition and so at-
tached as to be plainly legible from
the center of the street on which said
houses or buildings front.

Sec. 3. One hundred numbers shall
be allotted to the frontage of each
block, and in the district bounded by
Railroad street, Garden street, Thomp-
son street and the river, one number
shall be attached to each 12 1/2 feet of
frontage, and outside of this district
one number to each 25 feet of frontage.

Sec. 4. All streets running in a
north and south direction shall be
numbered commencing at their south
termini and the southwest corner of
each block shall be number 100, the
even numbers continuing north on the
east side of streets, the odd numbers to
be opposite on the west side of street;
the next block north shall begin with
number 200 and so on, the even num-
bers being used on the east side and
odd numbers opposite on the west side
of said streets.

Sec. 5. All streets intersecting Main
and north Main street shall be num-
bered east and west from Main and
north Main streets. Easterly to begin
with northwest corner of each block,
and westerly to begin with the north-
east corner of each block, the num-
bers to begin with 100, the next block
east and west 200 and so on in the
manner of the north and south streets.

Sec. 6. All streets east of Main
street, running east and west and not
intersecting Main street, shall be
numbered commencing at the west
termini and the northwest corner of
each block and all streets west of
Main street and running east and
west and not intersecting Main street,
shall be numbered commencing at
their eastern termini and the north-
east corner of each block in the man-
ner hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 7. Anyone failing to comply
with the provisions of this ordinance
shall be subject to a fine of not less
than \$1 nor more than \$5 or imprison-
ment in the city jail not to exceed 5
days.

HORSE SHOW LINE OF MARCH

Parade Will Start at 2 O'clock p. m.,
Saturday May 4.

The second annual Pendleton horse
parade will take place on Saturday
afternoon, May 4. Between 140 and
150 animals will be in line. The pro-
cession will be headed by 20 eque-
strians, which promises to be a con-
spicuous feature. The work of getting
the horses in line will commence at
1 o'clock, and owners are notified to
govern themselves according to instruc-
tions. The single and double driving
horses are to be assembled in that
vacant space on Lillith street, the
first block west of Kopitke's feed
yard on Alta street. The ladies on
horseback will assemble there also.
The light harness horses which will be
led in the procession will be gathered
on Cosbie street, south of Alta street,
while the heavy draft horses will be
gathered on Garden street, south of
Alta.

The Line of March.
The equestrians will head the pro-
cession, starting from Lillith street,
one block west of Kopitke's feed yard
on Alta street, thence east on Alta
street to Main; as the procession
passes Cosbie and Garden streets, the
led driving horses and heavy draft
horses will join the parade, the single
and double drivers having formed in
the line and following the ladies; the
line and following the ladies; the
procession will pass on Alta street
directly east to Court street thence
north on Lee to Lewis street, west on
Lewis to Vincent, north on Vincent a
few feet to Water street, west on Wa-
ter to Main, south on Main to Webb,
west on Webb to Alta, south on Alta
to Bluff, east on Bluff to Main, north
on Main to Water street, at the Hotel
Pendleton, and disband.

ARRIVED FROM SKAGWAY

W. F. MATLOCK AND WM. BEAGLE AT
HOME.

Alaskan Traffic This Season Will Be
Larger Than It Was
Last Year.

W. F. Matlock arrived home this
morning. W. Beagle came on Tues-
day. Both are direct from Skagway
and Juneau.
Mr. Matlock returns this time in a
physical condition somewhat different
from that of a year ago, when he ar-
rived in Pendleton from a 1200-mile
walk to and from Dawson City over the
ice. Mr. Beagle also comes home hale
and hearty from the northern winter
cold.

Mr. Matlock's return is welcome to
the baseball men and especially to the
manager, M. A. Rader. His coming
has been awaited with anxiety. The
ball grounds in west Pendleton belong
to Mr. Matlock, and it is desired to
make some extensive improvements on
them. Mr. Matlock will in every way
possible encourage the enterprise, his
interest in the town and in baseball
being as great as that of any citizen of
Pendleton.

All the Pendleton people in Juneau
or Skagway are well and thriving. One
exception may be cited, perhaps. W. N.
Matlock, who has W. F. Matlock's
business in charge at Juneau, has
been somewhat ill, although now
fully recovered.

"The Alaska country has but be-
gun to develop. There is a great fu-
ture. Gold production is now sufficient
to maintain the country at its present
status for years to come. But every
year the territory covered is increas-
ing in scope and new fields are being
found every few weeks."

"Now is the time to go to Alaska,"
said Mr. Matlock. "The fare between
Seattle and Skagway is only \$5 first-
class either way. There are four of five
lines of steamers on the route. They
charged \$25 one way until last Monday.
The fare from Victoria, B. C., to
Seattle, is only 25 cents. Formerly it
was \$3. I expect to go to Skagway in
about a month with the family, to re-
main for a month or so.

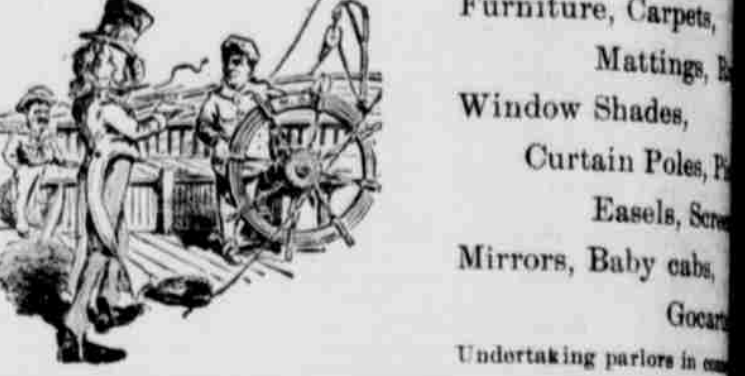
