SMITH TO KENTUCKY

Smith Landed Safely in Blue Grass State. A. Worthington, of U. S. Marshal's office at Portland, the Weston leader, was in Saturday and Sunday on return from Kentucky, whither he accompanied J. Bowlin-Smith, of much of the man so badly wanted in Kentucky. The present case against Smith is brought by the government, and he is accused of forging names of two witnesses to affidavits in pension claim. It has no connection with the former charge upon Kentucky officers attempted to arrest him amid such sensational circumstances last spring. He will have a trial, it is said, in the United States district court at Louisville, and nothing to fear from his political allies. It is also stated that his case is not regarded by the authorities as particularly serious. The prisoner gave no trouble to his custodian during the week. He is absent. COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

The Pendleton Academy to Close on May 23. The closing exercises of the school year at Pendleton academy will be of an interesting character this spring. The academy has a prosperous year and comes to the end of it with the best record of enrollment and the most successful work in its history. Certain plans for the betterment of the institution have been formed and with probability that they will be carried out the prospects for the academy are excellent, indeed. The commencement exercises will include these events: On Thursday afternoon, May 17, the primary and intermediate departments will hold their exhibition, for which rather elaborate preparations have been made. On Friday evening, the same day, the declamation contest of the preparatory department will take place. Seven or eight young people will participate. On Wednesday evening, May 22, S. A. Lowell will deliver the fourth and last of the series of four lectures in the student's course. His subject has not yet been announced.

On Thursday evening, May 23, occurs the final event when the class of 1901 will receive their diplomas. It is expected that the Rev. Dr. Wilson, of Portland, will be present on commencement evening, May 23, and give one of his valuable addresses. The exercises will all be held in the First Presbyterian church. It is hoped that, before another year has passed, the academy will have an assembly hall of its own where such affairs may be given.

A NEW PASTOR IS CALLED. Rev. R. W. King to Be in Pulpit of the Baptist Church. Since the departure of the Rev. Mr. Patterson, the First Baptist church of Pendleton has been without a pastor. For a couple of weeks, the Rev. E. R. King, of McMinnville, Or., held evangelistic services here, however, and proved to be the man wanted by the church. Mr. King returned to his home, and the church here decided to extend to him a call for a permanent pastorate. This call was given and accepted by Mr. King, who will be here on Sunday, May 12, holding on that date the first services. His family is in McMinnville, and will accompany him to Pendleton. The Rev. Harmon C. St. Clair, formerly assistant to the Rev. W. E. Potwin, rector of the Church of the Redeemer and in charge of several missions in Eastern Oregon, so it is expected now, will come again from New York state to Oregon, and will be at some point in the Eastern part of the state.

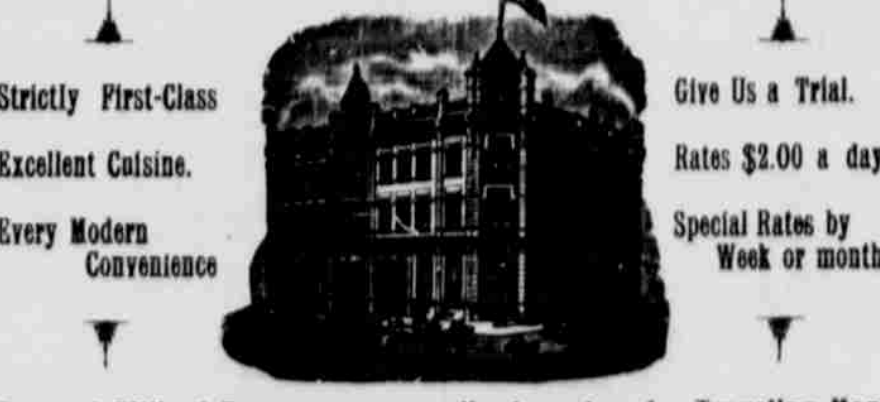
