Bids for Street Sprinkling Were Opened on Monday.

Eleven bids were received. After due deliberation the bid of Walter S. Wells was judged to be the best and a contract was entered into with him for \$200 per month. The committee will furnish Mr. Wells with water from the city mains and place the two new sprinkling carts at his service. He will furnish one cart, the other he has been using on the streets for years, and in addition will furnish his own teams, drivers and harness. The work is to be commenced at once, and the streets will be kept thoroughly wet down, particular attention being paid to west Jackson street and the west portions of Court, Alta and Webb streets.

EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR

THE OFFICIALS WANT TO SEE UMATILLA COUNTY REPRESENTED.

Plan is to Have O. R. Ballou Arrange the Display at Salem.

W. H. Wehring, of Hillsboro, state senator and president of the Oregon state board of agriculture, and M. D. Wisdom, secretary of the same organization, spent Monday, May 27, in Pendleton, where they were guests of the Hotel St. George. An effort is being made to have the counties of Eastern Oregon have a better representation at the state fair to be held at Salem on September 23-28, 1901, than they have had in previous years. Messrs. Wehring and Wisdom are traveling through this section with that object in view. They went from here to Heppner, and will afterwards go to Stierman and Waco counties. At some future time they will come back to Eastern Oregon and go to Union, Baker, Malheur, Grant and Harney counties. After discussing the matter with a number of Pendleton business men, it was decided that O. R. Ballou, of Milton, was the proper man to be selected to go ahead with the work of arranging the exhibit and making such a one as Umatilla county can make, and take charge of its arrangement at the state fair. The management offers the following prizes:

The Prizes Offered. County exhibit. Best exhibit of agricultural and horticultural products from any one county in this state, variety and quality to be considered, and to be the product of 1901—First, \$300; second, \$250; third, \$200; fourth, \$150; fifth, \$100.

In evidence of good faith, the Pendleton business men guaranteed that \$300 would be raised in Pendleton to be placed at the disposal of Mr. Ballou to be used in collecting the county exhibit and paying the expenses incident to its arrangement, getting it to and from Salem, etc. This offer was considered fair, not to say generous, by Messrs. Wehring and Wisdom. They talked with Mr. Ballou quite a while over the telephone, and he gave his quasi approval of the scheme, and after consultation with his daughter, who assists him in his work, will give a definite answer. It is almost safe to say that Mr. Ballou will go ahead with the work. His exhibits are always well arranged and attract favorable comment.

WHITNEY BOUND OVER

Alleged Crime Was Committed Sunday Evening.

John Whitney, the tough man from Texas, had his preliminary hearing before Justice Fitz Gerald Monday afternoon on the charge of assaulting a dangerous weapon and was bound over to answer to the circuit court. He waived examination to the charge of assault and robbery and was bound over on that also to the circuit court. Mr. Whitney was represented by H. E. Collier. The circumstances of the alleged crime were detailed in the East Oregonian on May 27. The one upon which he stood examination was holding up three men Sunday evening in the rear of John Damain's saloon at the point of a revolver, and trying to obtain money from them. He claimed that he was drunk at the time and did it just for a joke. Justice Fitz Gerald was so obtuse and lacking in humor that he couldn't see the joke.

Another case before the justice Monday afternoon was that of George Gillette charged with assaulting Sam Guin, the Chinese cook employed by Leo Cohen. The judge gave the defendant some good advice, fined him \$5 and costs, \$9.75 all told, and let him go. There were a number of boys in a party Sunday afternoon when the trouble occurred. Boys who assault Chinamen in Pendleton contrary to the statutes will be punished, is the edict issued by the justice.

THE NEW STAMPS.

A Special Series for the Buffalo Exposition.

A special series of postage stamps in honor of the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo, were distributed by the postoffice department of the government to all postoffices in the United States on May 1.

The stamps are of uniform dimensions, 7x1.01 of an inch, and represent different forms of modern transportation methods. The borders take the colors of the regular series of the same denominations of stamps now in use. The words "Commemorative Series, 1901," and "United States of America," appear in the upper border above the vignette; the legend in the line below it designates some particular feature of transportation appearing in the illustration. The line at the bottom indicates the value of the stamp and Roman capital letters and Arabic numerals.

All of the central illustrations are from photographs as the objects represented appear today, and are printed in black.

The one-cent stamp represents steamboat travel designated by a side-wheel lake steamer with open funnel, of the style generally used on the Great Lakes of today.

The two-cent stamp represents railway travel by a train of four cars and engine of modern pattern.

On the four-cent stamp is a picture of the automobile of the closed coach order with two men on the box and a portion of the United States capital in the background. For this illustration a photograph of one of the Baltimore and Ohio automobiles, taken in front of the congressional library at Washington, with the "capitol" in the background, was selected. The Baltimore and Ohio was the first railroad to inaugurate this method of transportation in connection with its train services.

EARLY HISTORY RECALLED

DARWIN A. RICHARDS DIED AT ATHENA ON MONDAY.

He Was the First County Clerk and Owned the Land Upon Which Middleton Was Built.

Darwin A. Richards died at his home at Athena, on Monday, May 27, aged about 75 years. When Umatilla county was cut off from Waco county by act of the legislature of 1892, H. H. Hill was appointed county clerk, but he never qualified, apparently, for at the first meeting of the county court held on April 3, 1893, the records show Darwin A. Richards as the first county clerk. The second meeting of the county court was a special one on May 27, 1893, at which Mr. Richards was present, 35 years to a day from the date of his death on Monday.

Owned the Site of Middleton.

During the early years of this county, Marshall's station was a couple of miles down the river from where Middleton now stands. Welcome Mitchell and Darwin A. Richards owned the townsite there which was called Middleton. They transferred the property by warranty deed to J. L. Martin, J. Swift and J. G. Johnson on March 30, 1893, reserving lot 2, block 7. This instrument was recorded in deed book A, page 176.

Resided at Athena.

Mr. Richards served out one term as county clerk. He shortly after that moved to where Athena is now located, and for years owned the stage station, an old land mark. The old stage barn has been torn down but recently, Mr. Richards owned the picnic grove and a great deal of other real estate along the river in the edge of Athena, and occupied a slightly residence only a few blocks from the business center of the town.
