NORMAL SCHOOL AFFAIRS

BOARD OF REGENTS HELD ANNUAL MEETING WEDNESDAY. Reports are Favorable Indicating Excellent Condition of the Institution at the Close of the Year.

The regents of the Eastern Oregon normal school met at Weston on Wednesday, May 29, a full board being present, with the exception of J. W. Morrow, of Heppner. Officers of the board were elected as follows: R. Alexander, of Pendleton, president; R. P. Wortington, of Portland, secretary; J. R. Killgore, of Weston, treasurer. The present faculty was re-elected, as follows: Dr. J. A. Beattie, president and professor of ethics, education and pedagogy; H. W. Mott, vice president and professor of physical and natural sciences; George A. Peebles, history and English; Herbert Kittridge, mathematics; Mrs. M. C. Ryan, superintendent of training department; Miss Nellie M. Stevens, assistant. Several weeks ago the board hired E. M. Lazarus, of Portland, to prepare plans for the new normal school building. There were presented and accepted. They call for a three story building and basement. Bids will be received up to June 17, when the contract will be let at a meeting of the board to be held in Pendleton on that date. President Beattie's annual report was read and adopted, and the president was authorized to issue a circular relating to the work of the school. The report was extremely pleasing to the regents, and the feeling that they have the right man for the head of the institution. It is the intention of the board to elect additional instructors at the June meeting. The employees at the boarding house and school, in addition to the faculty, were re-elected. R. Alexander, president of the board, upon his arrival in Pendleton, expressed great satisfaction at the outlook for the Eastern Oregon state normal school.
