SEVEN DEVIL MINES

PACIFIC & IDAHO NORTHERN TO GO ON.

Control Trade Lenz Covered in Eastern Oregon—Smelter Proposed for Weiser.

City, June 3.—P. P. Shelby, manager of the Pacific & Idaho Northern railway, who was in the city Friday, stated that his company would extend their line from the present northern terminus, so that it would tap the line from Devils copper district, and connect with the Oregon line at Weiser, and is now within a few miles of the Seven Devils. No decision when work would commence, but Manager Shelby left the date, was not discussed.

Will Divers Traffic.

Amount of traffic from Eastern Oregon which has been covered, the route seemed the natural outlet for the Seven Devils, Eastern Oregon region, and as their legitimate trade has looked forward to the new railway connection, it is not surprising that the Northwest railway line, which has been graded from the Snake from Huntington, was the most likely line to be the direct, and would have the bulk of the country's traffic. But the affairs of that company are involved in receivership, and the affairs of the latter are being handled by the Federal court.

Smelter at Weiser.

Manager Shelby also stated that a small smelter, which would be used for the purpose of constructing the railway, work has been delayed, but it seems the region will be opened up by other lines before any long time.

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## WALLA WALLA WON 13 TO 3

PENDLETON DEFEATED BY A TEAM OF BALL PLAYERS.

Home Team Was Off Its Feed, Giving Visitors the Victory With Hands Down.

A special train of four coaches from Walla Walla arrived at 11:55 in Pendleton on Sunday June 2, loaded with 300 excursionists to witness the ball game. They were met at the depot by the local baseball magnates and Pendleton corner band and escorted to the Hotel Pendleton. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the line of march was formed, the band leading, the two sides following, while an immense number of spectators took the sidewalks. The Alta street grounds were filled with a crowd of about 800. When the teams were practicing and when the batting was submitted to the scores, a number of things were noticeable. On May 19, Pendleton went to Walla Walla to play the team there. This was supposed to be the return game. Strange as it may appear, of the nine Garden City players who were in the game at Walla Walla, only four were in the game here, and not a single man on the Walla Walla team was playing in the position he played two weeks ago. Among the strange faces were Bradbury, at second base, who played new with the Colfax team, and Finser and Evans, of the Whitman college team. Evans would have been more generally recognized had he gone by his own name of Egan, who Pendleton team was composed of ideally the same players that played at Walla Walla two weeks before, all Pendleton men.

It Was a Waterloo.

The game resulted in favor of Walla Walla by the lopsided score of 13 to 3. Cox for Pendleton played a wrong game at short, accepting eight chances without an error. Ulrich played a good second, as usual. Several of the players, as the preliminary will show, were having an off day. In a bunch. The batting and fielding of Bradbury and Benet, and the catching of Evans, were conspicuous for the visitors.

Fourth of July Celebration.

Probably at 3 o'clock Umpire Krause said play ball. For some reason or other the Walla Walla boys made a mistake in the date and thought it was the Fourth of July instead of the second of June. At least one would be led to believe it, or they opened the fireworks in the first inning, when there was no real necessity for it, from a Pendleton standpoint. 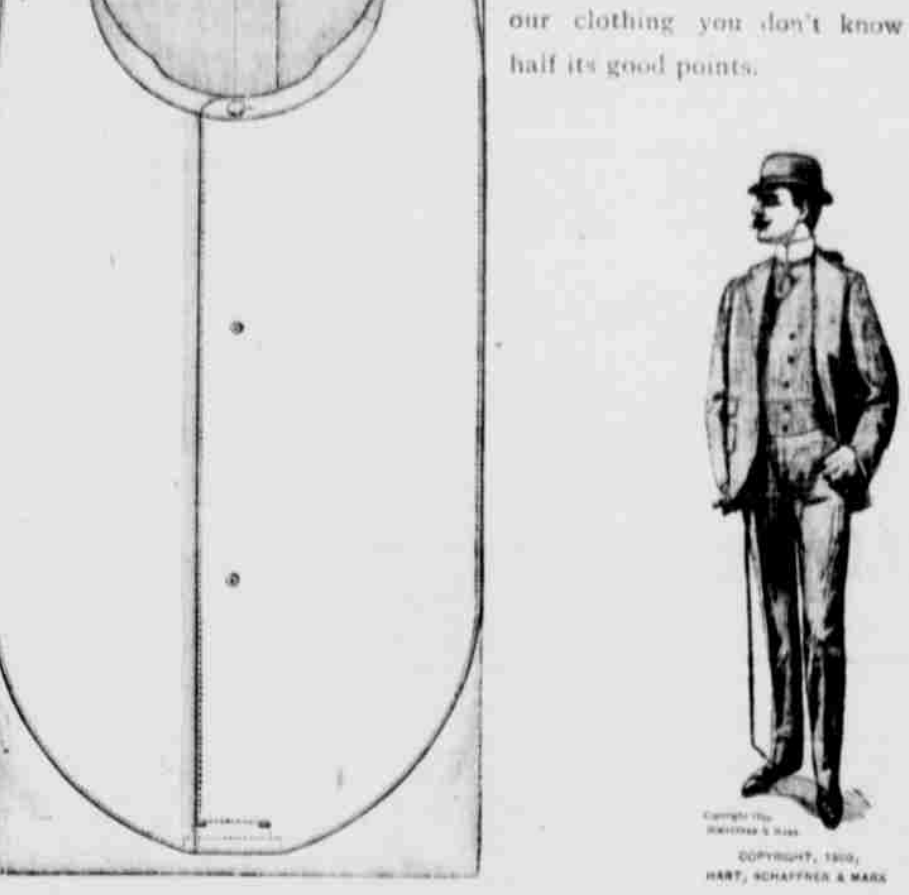
