GEN. CAILLES WOULD STOP THE FIGHTING Dictator of the Philippines is Talking Peace.

SAID TO HAVE MADE A PROPOSAL The Document Brought to Manila by Senor Doucel, Who Was Acting as an Intermediary.

Manila, June 7.—Gen. MacArthur today received a document from Gen. Cailles, the Philippine general who proclaimed himself dictator after Aguinaldo's surrender, proposing terms of peace. The document was brought here by Senor Doucel who has been in Legaspi province for some days trying to induce Cailles to surrender. Just what terms the insurgent leader proposes cannot be learned.

It was reported today that Gen. MacArthur will sail for the United States in July.

MRS. M'KINLEY UNCHANGED Examination of Blood Shows No Bad Results.

Washington, June 7.—Mrs. M'Kinley, Sternerberg and Johnston held the longest consultation of the week over Mrs. M'Kinley's condition, this morning. They were together about an hour and a quarter, and, after they left, Secretary Cortelyou gave out the following bulletin:

"Mrs. M'Kinley's physicians state that her condition is about the same as that reported yesterday. There has been no material change in the past 24 hours. Dr. Sternberg announced that the microscopic examination of the blood taken from Mrs. M'Kinley's arm last Tuesday showed purely negative results, and that no alarm is felt about its condition."

AGAINST KENNEDY DEFENSE State Will Attempt to Show a Bad Character.

Kansas City, June 7.—The defense in the trial of Lulu Kennedy, charged with the murder of her husband, sustained a severe reverse this morning when objections to the introduction of character testimony were over-ruled. The state will attempt to show that she had strayed from the path of virtue before she met Kennedy, who was forced to marry her because of his alleged betrayal of her. The woman killed her husband because he refused to live with her after the forced marriage. Both are prominent in society and their families are wealthy.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

At Salem, Jacob Idelwine was convicted of cruelly beating his 14-year-old daughter and was fined \$25.

The secretary of the interior approved the selection of Frank A. Fox, of Boise, Idaho, for forest superintendent of Idaho.

Butchers of Walla Walla report that it is almost impossible for them to secure stock at any price. The prices offered for cattle are the highest for many years and, while there is a good supply on the ranges, the owners refuse to sell.

The Oro Fino mine, in the Alamo district, owned by James Hilliard and John Schmitt, was sold to syndicate of Spokane capitalists for \$6000. A cash payment of \$3000 was made when the papers were signed. The Belcher mine, of Robinsonville, was also sold to Spokane capitalists for \$25,000.

Walter Moore, of Baker City, has been appointed deputy game and forestry warden for Baker, Union, Malheur and Wheeler counties by Warden Quimby. Mr. Moore will enter upon the discharge of his duties at once. He will inspect all the trout streams and look after the saw mill men, who, it is said, are dumping sawdust into several of the streams.

There has been an epidemic of horse-stealing in the towns near the international boundary between the United States and Canada, on both sides of the line, and on account of the sudden changes in jurisdiction within a few miles from a city in one country, where the crime was committed, the point across the line to which the criminal world flies, the police have been handicapped.

KILLED A HORSE THIEF Idaho Officers Engage in Desperate Fight With a Criminal.

Hailey, Idaho, June 7.—Sheriff Finney, of Blaine county, and Deputy McWilliams had a desperate fight with a horse thief named Sample near Eric. Sample, who resisted arrest, was killed by McWilliams, being shot three times through the body. McWilliams was wounded in the leg. Twenty dollars of counterfeit gold was found on the body. Four stolen horses and a saddle were in his possession. An inquest exonerates the officers.

ABE LINCOLN'S REMAINS A Sensational Story Denied by His Son, Robert.

Springfield, Ill., June 7.—A story to the effect that Robert Lincoln came to Springfield a few days ago disguised as a workman to secretly examine the last resting place of his father, Abraham Lincoln, and that the remains of the martyred president are not properly protected against ghouls, is vigorously denied. Lincoln made no effort to conceal his presence, and every precaution is taken to prevent the stealing of the father's body.

THE YACHT WILL BE BETTER Constitution to Be Ready for the Races With the Columbia.

New York, June 7.—W. Butler Duncan, managing owner of the Constitution, says that the yacht, in spite of the accident, will be better than ever, and will be ready for her trial race with the Columbia in a fortnight.

BOTH BERNHARDT ADAMS The Two to Appear in Romeo and Juliet.

Paris, June 7.—An arrangement whereby Sarah Bernhardt and Maude Adams will appear one hundred nights in America in Romeo and Juliet was made last night. Bernhardt will play Romeo, Adams Juliet.

Another Tien Tsin Fracas. London, June 7.—A Pekin dispatch given an account of another fracas between the French and Indian troops at Tien Tsin on Wednesday night. The Indian troops were insulted by the French who were fired on, later, killing 2 and wounding 5.

Germany Will Not Annex Farsans. Berlin, June 7.—The foreign officials today made the statement that Germany only established a coaling depot in the Farsans islands for the use of ships on route from China. The government has no idea of annexing the islands.

Booth to Come From Europe. Paris, June 7.—Commander Booth, of the Salvation army, who is now here, will go to America in September for a four months tour. He does not expect to meet his son, Ballington Booth, commander of the Volunteers of America.

Booths to Leave for Europe. London, June 7.—The Times says today that Gen. Booth will likely leave Cape Colony at the first favorable moment and follow his wife to Europe.

ROSEBURG'S BIG CREAMERY Consumes Milk From 1200 Cows—Water System Improvements.

Roseburg, June 7.—The fund for the establishment of a creamery here of a capacity to handle the milk of 1200 cows is completed and accepted by O. Ralston, the promoter. A site, desirable in every particular, has been selected and a building will be erected at once. The plant, with new machinery throughout, will be ready for operation by August 1.

Bricklaying was commenced today on the fine three-story hotel being erected by Mrs. D. C. McClallen. It will be ready for occupancy by October 1.

Large mains are now being laid through the principal streets for the new water system from Winchester, five miles north. The large 12-inch main is now in place the entire distance, the reservoirs are ready for cementing and the water will be turned in next month. The old water company will receive their new pump next week, giving triple their present capacity, and a lively contest for business is expected.

Reward Increased. District Attorney Brown has notified that Coos county has increased the reward offered for the arrest of M. D. Landis, to \$1000. Landis is the suspected murderer of J. E. Eudally, below Coquille City, and has disappeared.

HE DIED ON BRIDAL TOUR Hugh Tevis, of San Francisco, Who Married a Denver Belle.

San Francisco, June 7.—A Yokohama cablegram announces the death on his bridal tour of the California millionaire Hugh Tevis. No particulars were given. He married Cornelia Baxter, of Denver, on April 19.

Denver, June 7.—A telegram to ex-Governor Baxter, of Wyoming, this morning announces the death in Yokohama of his son-in-law, Hugh Tevis, the San Francisco millionaire. Tevis and his wife were on their wedding tour. When a student at Harvard, Tevis over exerted himself in a foot race and since then has had heart trouble. This is believed to have been the cause of death.

SACRAMENTO MAYORALTY Purity of Election Laws Gets in its Work.

San Francisco, June 7.—The supreme court today, in a suit instituted by William H. Bradley to oust George H. Clark from the office of mayor of Sacramento, remanded it for a new trial, deciding against Clark on grounds of not filing a correct statement of his election expenses. The statement filed was false. Money was illegally spent. Money was spent in excess of the maximum amount allowed by the purity of election law. He promised one-ninth of the official patronage to secure his election. It will result in the reinstatement of the former mayor, William Land.

WERE RECEIVED IN LONDON New York Moneybags Honored in England's Capital.

London, June 7.—The Lord Mayor of London and the sheriffs of the city gave a reception today to the delegates of the New York Chamber of Commerce who are visiting in England. The reception took place in the mansion house. Extremely cordial addresses were made by the hosts and the guests. Toasts were drunk to the king and queen and to President McKinley at a luncheon given after the reception.

These "Jumped" Into Pythianism. Baker City, June 7.—A new Knights of Pythias lodge was installed Monday evening at Richland, in Eagle valley, forty miles from this place. Many prominent Knights from this part of the state, including Grand Vice Chancellor J. H. Aitkin, assisted at the ceremonies. A membership of 27 was on the charter roll.

THE FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT IS ABANDONED Was to Be in Heppner June 11, 12 and 13.

ONLY WALLA WALLA STATED IN Other Teams Pulled Out, So President McDonald, of Dayton, Called the Meeting Off.

Dayton, June 7.—Benjamin McDonald, president of the Eastern Washington & Oregon Fireman's association gave out the statement last night that the firemen's tournament which was to be held at Heppner on the 11, 12 and 13th of this month was called off. The first blow to the tournament was the failure of the association to get satisfactory rates from the railroads, and the withdrawal of the Baker City team which decided not to take part in the races this year.

Yesterday Mr. McDonald received a message from Heppner wishing to know immediately whether the Dayton team would take part or not, and also stating that the La Grande team had pulled out.

A meeting was held and committees sent out to interview the business men, to see if the funds necessary to pay the expense of sending a team, could be raised. The committee later reported that the business men seemed indifferent and it would be impossible to raise the necessary money. Mr. McDonald immediately sent word to the Heppner officials that the Dayton men would be unable to take part in the tournament. This left only two outside teams—the Walla Walla and Walla Walla teams—willing to go. As Heppner was unwilling to put up the \$700 in prizes for only three competing teams the tournament was declared off.

Quite a little dissatisfaction is expressed over the action of the home team but the officials who had the matter in charge state that it was impossible to do otherwise than withdraw.

FOUGHT AND ADJOURNED Duel Between Frenchman and Algerian Was Uneventful.

Paris, June 7.—Max Regis, the noted Jew buster, and Labordeque, an Algerian journalist, fought a duel with swords this morning. The encounter lasted two hours and a half with no result, and was then adjourned until tomorrow.

Threw Out Soldiers' Home Votes. Boise, Idaho, June 7.—The supreme court awards the Ada county school superintendency to Helen Coston, ousting Helen Shackman. The decision throws out the votes of the inmates of the soldiers' home coming from other counties, asserting that they cannot gain nor lose a residence.
