The Kretzers are now down 100 feet, and are in a black rock. Water taken from the shaft shows drops of oil that are thought to indicate the presence of petroleum.

The older Kretzer stated that he is confident that oil will be found, and his work will be prosecuted until a complete demonstration has been made one way or the other.

Rural Spirit Says They're in Fine Condition.

The Rural Spirit has also this concerning Pendleton horses:

Perhaps the horses at Pendleton are in better condition to race than those anywhere else in the state, though some of them are temporarily indisposed at the present time. James Erwin's stable seems to be in the best condition as they have escaped sickness.

He is working Starkey 2:15½, John Edlin 2:16½, Oveda 2:21½, and they are all in the pink of condition.

Besides these he has Saltese, by Cauton; Sanicisco, a green pacer by Cauton, that is said to possess more speed than anything on the track; Kinney, Mack, three-year-old by McKinnay, dam by Gosper; Ollie, M., Oregon Sunshine and Uncle Reams, all year-olds and entered in the Breeder's stake at the state fair.

Cris Simpson is working Alta Norte 2:16½; Phil N., 2:21; Santiam 2:26; Mack Mack, green trotter by McKinnay, and Charlie B., two-year-old pacer, 10th Phil N., and Mack Mack have worked miles in 2:25 this spring very handily. Charlie B. is going in 2:24, eighth in 18 seconds.

Gus La Fontaine is working the runners Grace W., Pauline and Gus L. Erwin Frazier is working his green pacer Hassalo, the trotter Mt. Hood and the 2-year-old trotter Promise, all sired by his stallion, Westfield.

Hassalo has worked an easy mile in 2:22. Mt. Hood in 2:24 and the 2-year-old can trot fast enough so that they will all have a chance to throw their searchlights on her from behind.

THE CROP PROSPECTS.

Some Fields of Wheat Are Reported Greatly Damaged.

M. M. Wyrick, of this city, is one of the largest wheat growers in Unasilla county. He has over 2300 acres of wheat in different sections. He has 1330 acres of winter wheat on Prospect place, 430 acres near Yakima, on the O. R. N., 270 acres on his home place, and 100 acres of spring wheat on Prospect flat. Mr. Wyrick brought samples of his wheat to the East Oregonian office today, showing that his

grain has not been damaged. The samples brought in were of bluestem, of which he has 1300 acres. It is well-headed, and, with favorable weather from now on, will be ready to harvest within two weeks. Mr. Wyrick left this afternoon for an inspection of his wheat fields which will require his time for two days. He will have something interesting to tell regarding crops when he returns.

Ambrose Cooley's Statement.

Ambrose Cooley says he inspected a wheat field and a barley field a few miles from Helix, and in his opinion both crops have been ruined by the cold weather.

CANADIAN ROUTE FROM GREAT LAKES.

Probably Rival for the Great Erie Canal.

At a time when the interests of the Erie canal seem to be the mere sport of politics, and this greatly improved improvement is apparently as far from realization as ever, it is as well that the people of the state should realize that the Canadian government is pushing forward the interests of the rival route by the way of the St. Lawrence river canal with the greatest activity.

In an address delivered last week to the business men of Montreal, by Mr. Tarte, Minister of public works in the Dominion government, he assured them that the Canadian government was completing Montreal would contain as many grain elevators as the city of Buffalo. He stated that the Port Colborne works, at the Lake Erie end of the Welland canal, would be completed in two seasons, and that the government was about to undertake important works at Georgian bay and the French river. The minister also said that, at the next session of parliament, he would ask for money to complete a public drydock at Montreal, and that with a view to encouraging a large share of the trade of the Great Lakes to come to that city, he favored a free canal, and a free port at Montreal.

Direct evidence of the wisdom of the great St. Lawrence enterprise was shown in the recent sailings of the new vessels of the Northwestern steamship company. These ships, the first of which is known as the "Northwestern," have been built specially for the canal route; they are 256 feet in length, 42 feet in beam, 24½ feet in depth and they can carry between 3200 and 3500 tons at a speed of 13 knots an hour. On her first trip the "Northwestern" took a large consignment of machines from the McCormick harvesting machine company, Chicago, direct to Hamburg. The vessel cleared Chicago on April 24, and two days later another consignment of 14 carloads of agricultural machinery left for Europe by a sister ship, the "Northman." The fact that vessels are sailing at an interval of only two days, carrying American machinery direct from Chicago to European ports, should bring home to the people of this state the present reality and the prospective strength of Canadian competition. We have said before, and we repeat it, that the most effective answer to this competition would be the construction of a canal of equal capacity and convenience from Buffalo to the Hudson river; for unless we present some rival water route, New York will see the city of Montreal added to the number of Eastern ports that are taking away the trade which formerly sought its natural shipping point at this port. —Scientific American.
