HEPPNER RACE RESULTS

Waitsburg Won Speed and Hub and Hub, Walla Walla the Wet Test—Waitsburg Broke Association Record.

Heppner, June 13—Special.—The tournament of the freemen has been a decided success. Attendance has been good and all conditions contributing for the most part to the enjoyment of all.

A sensation was caused by the Waitsburg team, that lowered the association record in the speed race. It was the fastest time that has ever been registered in the history of the association, Waitsburg winning in 23.4 seconds, the best previous record being 23.13 held by La Grande, Walla Walla, 23; Heppner, 23.25; Dayton, 23.45.

In the afternoon in the wet test the positions of the two former leaders were reversed. Walla Walla won handsily in 23.25 seconds, a remarkable feat being required to better the time of their contestants. Waitsburg was in second place, time 40 flat. Waitsburg again scored victory, winning the hub and hub in 23 flat. In the first heat, Waitsburg beat Dayton in 23.25; in the second heat, Walla Walla won from Heppner in 23.13. The final between Waitsburg and Walla Walla was won by the former.

The members of the general board elected at the session yesterday were: B. A. McDonald, of Dayton, president; David McAtee, of Heppner, vice president; T. D. S. Hart, of Walla Walla, secretary; John Smith, of Walla Walla, treasurer.

OLYMPIA SPECIAL SESSION

Recommendation for Repeal of the Bands Law.

Olympia, June 12.—The special session of the Washington legislature convened in this city Tuesday with 24 members of the senate and 20 members of the house present, 10 senators and 24 representatives being absent. When the senate adjourned it had accomplished a considerable portion of the work for which the extra session was called.

The judicial committee of each house called a joint meeting and agreed to recommend the following course of action: First, that the Bands law which provides for the execution of condemned criminals in the penitentiary, shall be repealed before it goes into effect Thursday. Second, that the enactment of a law embodying the essential points of the Bands law but containing a saving clause providing for the execution of criminals already condemned under the old system, viz., in the jail and by the sheriff of the county wherein the crime was committed be carried out.
