E. PENLAND'S REPORT

Trip Taken Through a Number of Wheat Fields. L. E. Penland returned this morn

number of the wheat fields of Umatilla tailless calf which is to be had in county and reports that "many of the that prolific country that surrounds farmers are worse scared than burt by the cold weather." He went from Pendleton up the Wild Horse to Havana station, thence north to Helix, a distance of about 20 miles. The damage to wheat along the Wild Horse is but along the Wild Horse is but slight, and that only on the low land. The frost apparently did its damage in spots. The greatest evi-dence of the work of frost was seen in a stretch of country several miles east and west and 10 or 12 miles north of Pendleton. According to his judgment the loss in no case would be more than five or six acres of wheat out of 160. "Here's some advice for you and the farmers," remarked Mr. Penland. "If they will cut their wheat in the gulches for hay, instead of wheat on the uplands, the damage by frost in the country over which I traveled will be scarcely noticeable. I have seen three worse frosts in Umatilla county in previous years than the cold weather of worse frosts in Umatilla county in previous years than the cold weather of June 5.7. I have 160 acres of wheat one and one-half miles from Helix and do not believe it has been damaged at all. In fact, I saw but lew fields that had been damaged very much. I saw some guiches where the wheat was rained for a strip of 20 or 30 feet wide, up the guich, but it would still make good hay. I went right into the wheat fields over the path I went, and made a careful inspection. In brief, my belief is that the damage to wheat in that section has been very slight."


