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JOHN ECHART IS DEAD

Buried in Athens. This Morning—Died Sunday.

Athens, June 15.—At 10 o'clock Sunday morning John Echart, the well known Athens contractor and builder, died of Bright's disease in the Walla Walla hospital, aged 58 years.

Mr. Echart was born in Sweden in 1845, and at the age of 18 years came to the United States, settling in Michigan, where he followed his trade, being a cabinet maker. In 1866 he moved west and located at Walla Walla, where he followed carpentering for a livelihood. In 1872 he came to Pendleton, where he remained until 11 years ago, when he came to this city, and has since made this place his home. His parents are both dead, and his only known living relative is a sister who lives in Sweden, but her address is unknown.

The funeral took place from the residence of V. M. Shick, and was attended by a large number of his friends, at 10 o'clock this morning. The members of I. O. O. F., of which lodge, he was a former member, attended in a body. The interment was held at the Athens cemetery.

Accident in Weston.

A dog belonging to a Mr. McBride ran out and frightened their team and they dashed down the street. None of the other members of the party were injured. One of the horses fell when they attempted to cross Pine creek on Franklin street and was killed. The carriage was not damaged very badly. The team was one of Pinkerton & Froome's best drivers and were very valuable animals.

BLACK HORN WILL DIE TODAY

THAT WORD WAS BROUGHT TO THE AGENCY THIS MORNING.

The Indian Was Shot While Resisting Arrest Saturday Night at Little Hawk's Home.

Black Horn, the Indian who was shot to death at the home of Little Hawk, the Umatilla, was shot while resisting arrest Saturday night at Little Hawk's home.

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CAUSE OF SHOOTING.

The story of this matter was published in full in the East Oregonian of Monday, June 17. Chief of Police Ed Brishow, accompanied by Joe Parr, attempted to arrest Black Horn and another, a Chinaman, who had been in the Yakima agency, Wash., for being drunk and disorderly. They resisted. The one from the Yakima agency, whose name is unknown, but is John Something, drew a large white-handled revolver and made several lunges at Brishow who drew his revolver and snapped it several times full in the Indian's face, but the cartridges would not explode. Black Horn in the meantime cracked his back with a revolver on the back of his head and knocked him down. Brishow threw his revolver to the ground and told the Chinaman to get up and go home. The two Indians turned on their horses and left hurriedly. Parr taking a couple of shots at them as they disappeared. At that time it was not believed that anyone was hit, but developments show otherwise. The retreating Indians fired several shots. By that time, Police Officer Jack and two other Indian policemen were near by and they took a hand in the shooting. Consequently, "Who shot Black Horn?" is a conundrum that may be as unanswerable as either of the other two famous questions, "Who killed Cook Johnson?" and "Who struck Billy Patterson?"

Question of Jurisdiction.

There will be an attempt made to throw these Indian criminal cases into the federal courts. On previous occasions such action has been taken with good satisfaction and at a great saving of expense to the taxpayers of Umatilla county.

Other Indian May Die.

Word has been received by Agent Wilkins that John Something, the Chinaman, who was shot while resisting the right shoulder. When further information was sought by the agent, his informants looked dumb and blind as regards the location of the particular Indian or the extent of his injury. It would not surprise the agent who is acquainted with the customs and habits of the pure and unadulterated native American. John Something were to be found dead in some of the dense, dense or canyons of the reservation along the foothills.
