GENERAL NEWS.

Henry W. Massingham, writing in the London News, says that 8000 Cape Colonists have already joined the Boers.

A violent storm burst over a large area of southern Russia Wednesday, flooding several towns and greatly damaging the crops.

Chancellor Cook has decided that the Nashville railway has a perpetual ownership in the streets of Nashville. Suits were instituted to obtain a revocation of the charter.

The Reichs Anzeiger publishes a statement to the effect that Emperor William has decorated Emil Boas, the American general manager of the Hamburg-American line, with the Crown Order of the third class.

Billy Madden, manager of Gus Kolbin, declared that he has waited long enough on Jeffries, and if the Californian does not agree to a match at a very early date he will claim the world's championship for the Akron giant.

The management of the Santa Fe railway has begun to carry out a vast colonization plan which will result in bringing many thousands of Italians to this country and in locating them on lands in Southern California, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

Samuel Garvin was arrested by the federal authorities at Billings, Montana, charged with complicity in stealing \$18,000 worth of cattle from Creek Indians, on which charge Robert Lee is now being tried in the United States court. A year ago Garvin was one of the most prosperous citizens of Billings.

The Oregon and Washington editors in New York city are creating much interest in the Lewis and Clark Centennial, to be held at Portland in 1905. The editors and publishers of the papers attract great attention. Many favors are being shown the party. It was entertained by the New York Press club Thursday.

The Exchange Telegraph company says the legal preliminaries in the suit of Portia Knight, the American actress, and an Oregon girl, against the Duke of Manchester for breach of promise have been completed and the case has been set for hearing. Colonel Knight is in London to support his daughter's interests.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

There are several cases of diphtheria at Astoria and one or two deaths have occurred.

Dr. D. K. Pearson, of Chicago, has again pledged to give \$50,000 to Whitman college, Walla Walla.

The Clackamas county assessment roll will aggregate from \$150,000 to \$200,000 higher than that of last year.

At Baker City \$1100 has been subscribed to the Red Men's carnival which is proposed to be held in that city.

J. W. Trott, aged 29 years, died in Salem Thursday of kidney trouble. He was a son of Mrs. R. C. Shelton, of that city.

George Davis, a well known business man of Boise City, dropped dead on the street in that city Friday morning of heart apoplexy.

Johnnie Kaiser, the 3 year old son of a farmer living four miles from Endicott, Wash., was bitten by a rattlesnake and cannot live.

The supreme court of Idaho has decided that the law of Idaho that a band of sheep cannot be herded within two miles of an inhabited dwelling is constitutional.

Mrs. Starr, wife of Wayne Starr, who is under arrest for robbing the Dusty postoffice, attempted to commit suicide at Lebanon by taking an ounce of laudanum.

Since about two weeks ago, when the height of the river at Portland was 29.8 feet, the water has been gradually falling until it is now about 15 feet above low water mark.

John H. Carse, of the grocery firm of Carse & Burden, died Thursday at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland after a long illness with stomach and heart trouble.

The salmon canners and fishermen of Fraser river are now at a deadlock and another fishermen's strike, on practically the same grounds as last summer, seems inevitable.

SOLDIERS HOLD ANGRY TEXAS MOB AT BAY

The Law's Strong Right Arm Protects a Rapist.

NEGRO SPENCER TAKEN TO HOUSTON

Orders of the Governor Must Be Obeyed, Said the Commander of the Militia to the Leaders of the Mob.

Houston, Tex., June 22.--The Houston Light Guard and the Houston cavalry were sent to Trinity yesterday to protect the negro rapist named Spencer from mob violence. The last advice at 2 o'clock this morning, coming in an indirect way, say the negro was sent to a tree with the soldiers surrounding him and a big mob surrounding the soldiers. The commander of the soldiers has informed the mob leaders that he will obey the governor's orders to return the negro to this city and they have told him that the negro will never be taken out of this county unless by superior force.

SPENCER LODGED IN JAIL

Houston, June 22.--This morning Spencer was taken to Huntsville and lodged in jail. The militia held the mob at bay all night, taking refuge with the prisoner in the Trinity school house.

The Soldiers Attacked. Houston, June 22.--As the soldiers boarded the train with the prisoner someone in the crowd opened fire and a pitched battle ensued in which about two hundred shots were fired. It is not known positively whether anyone was killed, but it is believed that two of the mob were shot.

The mob, which had the first contingent of troops besieged in the school house, was taken completely unaware by the arrival of reinforcements early this morning. After some maneuvering the soldiers with the prisoner boarded the train for Houston.

SECRETARY HAY TO RUSSIA

He Writes a Note to the Czar Explaining Duty on Russian Oil.

Washington, June 22.--Secretary Hay has prepared a note for the Russian government, relative to levying duty upon Russian petroleum, stating that the action by the secretary of the treasury is, in no sense, of a retaliatory nature, but simply in accordance with the law which provides for the levying of import duties on goods coming from any foreign country, equal to the duty exacted by that country upon the same class of American exports.

Cabinet Discussed It.

Washington, June 22.--The most important subject under discussion at the cabinet meeting was that involving the assessment of the customs duties on petroleum or its products imported from Russia. As a result of the consideration of the entire matter by the cabinet, Secretary Hay will soon make representations to the Russian government, fully explaining the attitude of this country and pointing out that Russia has acted hastily and under a misapprehension of the facts in her position of retaliation.

To Threaten Sultan of Morocco.

Washington, June 22.--As the result of a visit here by Consul General Gummere, who has been the American representative in Morocco, it has been decided that on his return to his post of duty that he shall demand a personal interview with the sultan. Gummere has been in Morocco for three years, but was never afforded an opportunity of presenting credentials to the sultan. If any obstacles are placed in his way or any deception practiced it is probable the United States will make a naval demonstration in Moroccan waters.

Mad Mullah Routed.

Aden, June 22.--Advices received here tell of another reverse suffered by Mad Mullah and his followers. During their flight, after repulse by the forces under Captain Minelli, Mullah encountered a large force of British cavalry and mounted infantry, who attacked and routed him. The British pursued the enemy all night. Mullah, who narrowly escaped capture, lost one hundred killed. The British lost was seven killed and wounded.

Emperor and Empress Present.

Kiel, June 22.--Emperor William and the empress attended the launching of the cruiser Prince Adalbert today. Prince Henry christened the new warship. The kaiser made a brief speech, in which he referred to the prophetic words of Prince Adalbert, that "expansion," said the kaiser, "is impossible without a navy."

Banished to Siberia.

St. Petersburg, June 22.--A great sensation has been caused by the banishment to Siberia of Prince Babrnyeki, a descendant of Catherine the Great, for petitioning the czar to introduce a constitutional form of government in Russia. Two hours for the presentation of the petition the prince was on his way to Siberia.

Morgan Buys a Picture.

London, June 22.--J. P. Morgan has made another great art purchase. He has secured Sir Joshua Reynolds's famous portrait group, "Lady Deina and her daughters." The price paid is said to have been \$100,000. Reynolds received \$1500 for it.

Bryan Not a Candidate.

Buffalo, June 22.--W. J. Bryan and family were visitors to the exposition today. Asked if he was a presidential candidate for 1904 he said: "No, neither am I a candidate for any office." He denied having any connection with the so-called third-party movement in Missouri.

THE NEW YORK MARKET

Reported by I. L. Ray & Co., Pendleton, Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers. New York, June 22.--The wheat market was still on the down grade today. Prices at New York declined 3/4c. Liverpool closed 7-8d lower, 5-6 1/2c. New York opened at 73 7-8 and closed at 73 3/4. The export shipments for the week were heavy 5,529,000, compared with 4,645,000 for the same week last year.

MINING CONGRESS AT BOISE

Funds Raised for Holding a Fair Will Be Used to Help Defray the Expenses of the Congress. Boise, June 22.--Owing to the demands which will be made upon the citizens of Boise for the entertainment of the delegates and visitors to the International Mining Congress, which will hold a several day's session in this city, commencing July 23, the directors of the Idaho State Fair Association have concluded not to hold any session of the fair this fall. The several thousand dollars that have been raised by Boise business men for the benefit of the fair, will be turned over to the mining congress, in addition to an appropriation of \$5000 made by the state.

TORNADO'S DREADFUL WORK

Several Lives Sacrificed in a Storm Near Napier, Nebraska. Napier, Neb., June 22.--There was a loss of seven lives caused by the tornado which swept over this section Thursday night. The killed were members of the Greening and Anderson families. The casualties were: Jacob Greening and wife, fatally injured. Grace Greening, aged 14, seriously injured. Margaret Greening, aged 9, killed. John Greening, aged 4, killed. Jacob Anderson, aged 2, killed.

DAVIS' BONDSMEN SUED

Attorney General Blackburn Begins an Action Against Them. Salem, June 22.--Suits have been filed here by Attorney General Blackburn and District Attorney Hart against the bondsmen of George W. Davis, the defaulting clerk of the school land board, who was found \$30,000 short six years after the embezzlement occurred and several years after he retired from the office. Davis' whereabouts are not known at the present time, as he took flight soon after being charged with the shortage and before the officials had time to act.

Mother and Children Burned to Death.

Fort Worth, Texas, June 22.--Mrs. Wiley Calhoun and her three children were burned to death last night in the destruction of their home by fire, which was caused by an explosion of a can of gasoline.

Convicted of Forgery.

San Francisco, June 22.--Peter W. McTiade, accused of forgery of bogus demands on the city treasury, was found guilty today. This was his fifth trial and there were four hung juries.

Americans Beat Shots.

Glasgow, June 22.--The American and Scotch pigeon shooters met here today for a prize of one hundred pounds. It was easy money for the Americans who won by a score of 973 to 882.

Cheats Has Recovered.

London, June 22.--Ambassador Choate has fully recovered from a cold which kept him confined to his home for several days. He was at his desk today.

Failures for the Week.

New York, June 22.--Dun's Review will say: The failures for the week numbered 193 in the United States against 14 last year and 14 in Canada against 15 last year.

LIVES LOST BY AN EXPLOSION OF FIREWORKS

Ten Killed, Nine Injured, Five Missing.

THE BUILDING DESTROYED BY FIRE

Store Where the Explosion Occurred Was Under an Apartment House Occupied by Many Families.

A Later Report.

Patterson, N. J., June 22.--By an explosion of fireworks in a store building on Main street the building was burned and four persons lost their lives, two were seriously injured and it is believed seven others perished. The store was under an apartment house.

Three More Victims.

Patterson, N. J., June 22.--Ten dead, nine injured and five missing, is the corrected casualty report this morning of the fire-works explosion which wrecked Adolph Rittenberg's store and buildings yesterday. The dead are Sarah Williams, Chas. Rittenberg, Lucinda Adamson, Mrs. Leah Hamber, Bertram Hamber, Mrs. Patrick Burns, Clarence Burns, Wm. Elmsner and Annie Laugan. The missing are: Annie Senteman, Mrs. Andrew Elvin, Jos. Elvin, Mrs. Simon L. Schulman.

Search of the Ruins this Morning Revealed Three More Victims.

Patterson, N. J., June 22.--Mrs. Senteman, Mrs. Elvin and Joseph Elvin.

A Frame Tenement Building.

The building in which the explosion occurred was a frame tenement four stories high. Ten families occupied flats in the building. So great was the force of the explosion that a boy playing in the street half a block away was lifted from his feet and hurled against an iron fence, one of his legs being broken by the shock.

A number of those who were on the upper floors of the building when the explosion took place were either stunned and then burned to death or suffocated. Every window seemed to be cutting flames within a minute after the first explosion.

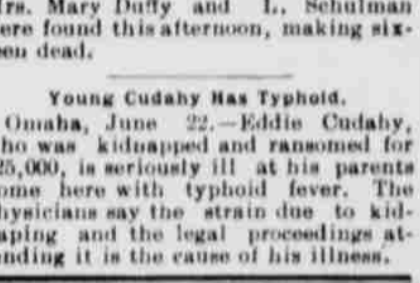
Mrs. Williams with her clothing on fire leaped out of a window and fell to the yard below. Her dead body was dragged out of reach of the flames. Some occupants of the rooms dropped from the windows and were bruised and maimed and others hung from the windows until the firemen came. Twenty persons were taken down in this way through the fire and smoke while still others dropped into the life-nets.

Two More Bodies Found.

Patterson, June 22.--The remains of Mrs. Mary Duffy and L. Schulman were found this afternoon, making sixteen dead.

Young Cudahy Has Typhoid.

Omaha, June 22.--Eddie Cudahy, who was kidnapped and ransomed for \$25,000, is seriously ill at his parents home here with typhoid fever. The physicians say the strain due to kidnapping and the legal proceedings attending it is the cause of his illness.
