Umatilia county for the year of 1901, as brought to Pendleton on the latter days of Fourth of July week, and on Sunday and Monday of this week, are of a decidedly adverse character. Sev eral of the best informed farmers of the county have told the East Oregonian that the crop has been damaged certainly not less than 25 per cent. This has been done by a combination of circumstances. The frosts of June 5.7 started the trouble. They left the wheat plant in a weakened condition. Then came the cold winds, blasting the grain. The wheat raised in Umatilla county in 1900 was probably 4,-000,000 bushels, nearly all of which was No. 1. Included in that was a great deal of volunteer wheat, which made phenomenal yield, and spring wheat, much above the average. The volunteer wheat this year will be scarcely any crop.

Dr. W. R. Campbel,'s Report. The most pronounced report of crop damage was brought to Pendleton this morning by Dr. W. R. Campbell, who resides in the Cold spring country, 18 miles northwest of Pendleton. He has been examining fields of wheat for the Scotch company and says that the crops north of Pendleton have been damaged 50 per cent.
