ROAD TO OLNEY CEMETERY

Proposal to Improve It With Receipts From a Baseball Game.

Damon lodge No. 4, Knights of Pythias, throws its gauntlet at the feet of Pendleton camp No. 41, Woodmen of the World, in the following challenge for a baseball game:

Whereas, Considerable comment has heretofore been made, in print and otherwise, concerning the condition of the Pendleton cemetery; and

IRWIN AND POPP WILL SPAR

Two Topnotchers Will Meet in Pendleton Saturday Evening, July 27.

Portland, July 16.—The big glove contest between Toby Irwin, the crack San Francisco lightweight pugilist, and Willie Cole, of Sacramento, is attracting the attention of the entire Pacific coast and there is much wagering as to the outcome. It is generally thought that Irwin will win and he is a warm favorite in the betting. It will be remembered that Irwin beat Martin Denny in this city last month and while he succeeded in winning he at the same time established an impression with the local sports that he was made of championship timber. In fact his manager, "Biddy" Bishop, is very outspoken in saying that his boy will be a world's champion in another year. Both Cole and Irwin are trained to the hour and are in the pink of condition and both are confident that they will win. Irwin's manager does not believe in allowing his fighters to remain idle and has just completed arrangements whereby Toby is to meet Jimmy Popp, the famous lightweight pugilist, at Pendleton eight days following the contest with Cole. In speaking on the matter Bishop said:

"You see Toby will be in good fix to go over there and meet Popp on the 27th inst. even though it is such a short time after the contest with Cole. You can see that he is in grand condition now, and will be in the pink of condition when he meets Popp. I have been in this business too long to make any mistakes at this late date, especially on a question of a man's condition. I have done my best fighting in my life, and I have watched his performance closely. You see it is my business to keep posted on these fellows. I can not say who will be a favorite in the betting. A big crowd will no doubt come over from Pendleton when Toby meets Cole next Friday night, the 19th inst., to get a line how to bet their money."

SELLS & GRAY'S CIRCUS.

Arrives Wednesday Morning—Street Parade and Two Exhibitions.

There were the Tybelle sisters in their wonderful trapeze performances, wherein one displayed great strength in her jaws, holding a trapeze rope in her teeth while the other performed thus suspended in mid-air.

One of the new specialties was the act of Mrs. Tybelle upon a cross ladder held aloft in balance by her husband. Other trapeze performers of exceptional merit were Miss Marotta and Miss Cecil Melrose. Miss Thompson is the slack-wire artist. Some of the most thrilling performances were those given by the Reno family, trapeze specialists.

The elephants were the largest ever seen in Topeka, and, with their trainer, gave one of the best trained exhibitions in this line.

There were the usual ring displays, fancy riding, drills and jumping over horses, etc.
