BIBLE SCHOOL AT MEACHAM
VACATION DAYS TO BE DEVOTED TO STUDY OF SCRIPTURES.
Prominent instructors from Pendleton, Portland and other places.
Largely through the efforts of the Rev. F. L. Forbes, president of the Pendleton academy, a school for the study of the Bible and several topics relating to church and Sunday school work, combining pleasant recreation and an outing on the mountains at Meacham, is being held Tuesday evening, and the school will continue until August 5.
The idea is not a new one. The Bible school conducted last summer at Meacham was practically the same as the present one, was a marked success. The attendance was large, and every one who was present pronounced it very profitable.
Besides the sessions held for the study of the Scriptures, religious meetings are held, at which musical addresses are given calculated to assist church workers in the various branches to which they devote themselves.
Many other campers are there, enjoying the mountain air and resting from the labors of the town. Pendleton people are more numerous than those from any other place.
"Indeed," said one who came from there a day or two ago, "Meacham is about as homelike for Pendletonians as the town itself."
Besides Mr. Forbes, Robert Pond of Pendleton, Rev. H. W. Kellogg of Portland, Rev. W. H. Blakeley of Portland with several others will conduct classes.

THE MINING CONGRESS OPENS
Oregon Has a Strong Delegation Well Organized.
Boise, July 24.—Promptly at 10:30 Tuesday morning President Prince's gavel fell at the Columbia theatre, calling to order the fourth annual session of the International Mining Congress.
Fully 450 delegates were in their chairs at the hour of opening and about 100 other delegates were in the city strolling in at intervals.
President Prince's introductory remarks were very brief and then he introduced the Rt. Rev. A. J. Glorieux, Catholic bishop of Idaho, who offered a fervent prayer.
To the right of the stage and immediately behind the Nevada delegates, is the Idaho delegation, and, as is to be expected, the largest of all the state delegations.
Oregon, occupying the front rows of the middle section, presents almost a full delegation. It includes many of the foremost mining men of the state and is the second largest at the congress. The delegation effected an organization before the congress was called to order by electing Col. F. V. Drake of Portland, chairman, and Claude Baugh of Sumpter, secretary. Oregon has a very strong delegation and it will be heard from before the congress is over.
After the prayer by Bishop Glorieux, President Prince introduced Governor Frank W. Hunt of Idaho, who de-

Pittsburg, July 24.—The combine forces have decided to carry the strike into the courts. Ex-Judge Mills of Wellsville, Ohio, has been retained by Perreller F. Smith, district manager of the American Sheet Steel company, to prepare papers for the presentation in a few days to the federal court asking for a restraining order to prevent the strikers from accosting or molesting infamy way non-union men on the highways. This move promises a crisis in the strike, which has thus far been one of watchfulness and waiting.
New York, July 24.—Another rumor declaring that the strike of steel workers had been settled reached Wall street from Boston tonight. When J. P. Morgan's attention was called to the report he replied: "The situation is unchanged."
