THE BOXERS TAKE EXERCISE

Crowds Will Come From Abroad to See the Contest.

Jim Popp, who is to meet Toby Irwin tomorrow night in a 15-round glove contest at the Fraser opera house, took a 10-mile trip down the road yesterday, and when he returned he was wet with perspiration.

"I just wanted to sharpen my wind a bit," said Popp, "and the road work is the real thing for that. I am in better shape now than ever before in my life and will surely win from Irwin. Just watch and see if I don't." Irwin and his manager were out on the road bright and early, and last evening they went out again for a long walk. "Toby will not need much training for this mill, as he has just finished a long course of work at Portland for his bout with Willie Cole. I will just keep him on light road work up until Saturday noon time," said Biddy Bishop.

Special Train Coming.

The ring will be erected on the stage at the opera house today and the place will be thoroughly renovated and fixed up in excellent style to accommodate a large crowd. A few select seats will be placed on the stage next to the ring which will afford an excellent view. A special train will be over from La Grande and a big crowd have ordered seats from Athena. Several Portland and Spokane sports will be here and there should be considerable betting on the contest. It is said that W. G. Bogert wants to bet some money on Popp, as does Little Henry, who is a great admirer of Jim's.

The six round preliminary promises to be a very warm affair. Dallas O'Hara of Pendleton and Frank Cross of Portland are the contestants. Cross says that O'Hara never saw the day that he could beat him, and O'Hara says that he won't "do a thing for" Cross, and if there the matter rests, and the friends of both boys are anxiously awaiting the result with much interest. There will also be another 4-round contest between two local boys. The first bout will be on promptly at 8:30 p. m.

THE WALLA WALLA TEAM

Arrived This Afternoon Enroute to Baker City to Play Ball.

Manager Sharpstein and his baseball team under Captain Buchet arrived this afternoon on the 5 o'clock train, and went east on the fast mail to Baker City. There they are to play two games, one tomorrow and one on Sunday. Virgil Ryan was with the team to watch the first game, and to go over in time to occupy the box on Sunday. Ray Ryan, the nervous little catcher of the Whitman team during the earlier season, was among them.

It is probable that the Baker City game will end the season for the Walla Wallans. Difficulties as to dates in Portland will interfere with a series from which they expected a whole lot of sport. It is not unlikely that Mr. Sharpstein will disband his men upon their return from Baker City.

Regarding the future, the Statesman has this in its Thursday issue: "In the letter from Portland it was stated that it would be possible to arrange a game with the Fontellas to be played at Oregon City during a regatta which will be held at that place in early September. It is likely that a picked team will be made up from Walla Walla, Pendleton and Athena and the proposition will be accepted."

The La Grande Chronicle says the baseball association there has selected a new set of directors, who will make efforts to organize the league including Pendleton, Walla Walla, La Grande and Baker City.

Uncertainty regarding the Sunday closing event in Walla Walla has caused Manager Sharpstein to debate the feasibility of maintaining league games in that town.

They Beat the Woodmen.

Thursday afternoon, on the second street grounds, in Walla Walla, the locals defeated the Spokane Woodmen, in a score of 3 to 2. Walla Walla scored in the third and eighth innings, the Woodmen chopping out tallies in the seventh and ninth. Berry and Ryan for Walla Walla, and Bliss and Waller for the axe wielders constituted the batteries. The attendance was ghastly—150, about enough to pay the wages of the ticket sellers and takers, and furnish several nice new baseballs for the players. Pendleton and Walla Walla are the only teams who have administered defeat to the Spokane aggregation.

The Pendleton Baseball association this afternoon met at M. A. Rader's office and discussed the formation of the league. The matter remains as much unsettled as at any time, but it was decided to canvass for stock subscriptions and Leon Cohen has the charge of that task. It is hoped here that the league may be organized.

TOWN NEEDS DWELLINGS

DEMAND FAR IN EXCESS OF THE SUPPLY.

Vert and Hislop to Build Some Houses on Webb Street.

At this time, in Pendleton, people are looking about every day for dwellings, and as has been the case for several years past, they do not find any unoccupied. The other day Mr. and Mrs. Tassie Stewart of Heitz came here and expressed a determination to make their home in Pendleton, if they could find a house in which to live. They made search in vain, and are now in Milton, where they will remain for some time, until they make more permanent plans. Writing from Milton, Mr. Stewart informs the East Oregonian that they desired to locate in Pendleton, but could not find a house that was suitable for a home.

Dealers in building materials state that the great demand for houses is planned for the remaining portion of the season in Pendleton. A few dwelling houses are to be built, but in the most instances they will be erected by those who will own them and occupy them.

John Vert and W. T. Hislop, so it is understood, will have several cottages suitable for renting ready for use this summer or fall, located on Webb street, between College and Thompson. There will be three now standing that will be made over into houses of greater comfort, and three new ones will be put up by them.

Fall Demand Will Be Greater.

If the demand now, in the middle of the summer, is so great, what will be the condition in the fall, when the people come in from the farms for the winter? Is the question that many are now asking. Usually in the summer-time and that is the case now, many are in the mountains or at the seashore or on the ranches, and the town contains just that many less than the regular population. In the fall, they return, many families desiring to live here during the winter, to give their children educational opportunities. According to the present prospects, Pendleton will not have many places in the fall in which to stow away the persons who want to come here to live. In so far as the good of the town is concerned, it would doubtless be an excellent thing were several capitalists to erect a number of good renting houses, to supply this demand that is growing greater all the time.

PEOPLE HERE FOR A DAY.

"Biddy" Bishop, manager of Toby Irwin, now at the Golden Rule hotel, is a clever newspaper writer, as well as a well posted sporting man. As a manager of prize fights, Bishop has a record that entitles him to a rank in the best in his class. But that is by no means all of the talent he possesses, for with a Faber No. 2 pencil in his hand, he is qualified to earn a good living on any daily paper. He makes a specialty of sporting news, and is the out-of-town correspondent of a number of newspapers of the east. He sends in some "stunt" once in a while, and has a very good style of composition. Bishop is a young man of first class address, with excellent manners, clean gentlemanly appearance, and everything to enable him to make his way in the world. BIG FIRE IN GRAIN FIELDS

Started Mysteriously and 140 Acres Destroyed.

A fire occurred in a grain field on the T. K. Beard lands, nine miles north west of Pendleton Thursday afternoon, consuming 100 acres of growing wheat for T. K. Beard and Herman Suhl and 40 acres for H. Lorenson.

It is not known how the fire started.

but before the flames were subdued nearly 100 men were attracted to the scene and assisted in the work. The losses will reach \$1200, and are partly covered by insurance with Bentley & Moorhouse.

WESTON NORMAL SCHOOL

Of 97 Students, All But 16 Are Residents of Umatilla County.

From a "casualty and circular of information" issued by the "Eastern Oregon State Normal School," located at Weston, Umatilla county, it is learned that out of a list of 97 students all but 16 were residents of Umatilla county and the postoffice address of 67 is Weston, says the Portland Telegram. Thus it is clear that the "Eastern Oregon State Normal school" is almost entirely a mere school. More than two-thirds of the students live in the little town of Weston and vicinity, and over 85 per cent live in Umatilla county. According to the circular of 1900 Weston contained a population of 926, as against 508 in 1890. It is a pleasant, healthful location, surrounded by rich agricultural lands, and the school is presumed to do as good work as could be expected.

But the question recurs: Should the state appropriate so much money to support a practically local school, one attended almost entirely by youth of the town in which it is located and the immediately surrounding country? The appropriation made by the last legislature for the Weston school amounted to \$59,429.52; this, of course, for two years. Of this, \$35,000 was for a new building and heating plant, \$2000 was for repairs, painting, etc., and \$229.52 was to cover a deficiency, leaving \$23,000, or \$10,000 a year, for "the payment of the salaries of officers, teachers and employees, and general and contingent expenses." This is manifestly too small a sum with which to maintain a normal school worthy of the name, and \$60,000 is too great a sum to fritter away on a local school, merely to "give Eastern Oregon something," and secure a few votes in the legislature for similar and worse schemes for squandering the public funds.

But these little normal schools are with us to stay; once fostered, there is no getting rid of them, and serious taxpayers may well congratulate themselves that such schools are not even more numerous.

Stipulation Filed.

An agreement has been reached between the Joseph Schultz Brewing company and Henry Schultz, George J. Potter and the East Oregonian Publishing company, by which the defendant, Henry Schultz is granted the privilege of using a certain specified label for his beer, brewed in Pendleton and the suit against him has been withdrawn by the Schultz Brewing company of Milwaukee.

Passing of Old Pioneers.

Joseph Southwell, an old pioneer of Oregon, and well known in Wasco county, died Wednesday at his country home about 10 miles southeast of The Dalles, of general decline. Joseph Southwell was born at Scarborough, England, August 29, 1820, and came to America when 18 years of age, and settled in the state of Illinois, where he married Mary Clark. In 1851 he crossed the plains to Oregon, and first settled on the Santiam, and later moved to Cottage Grove. In 1870 he moved to Wasco county, and settled on the farm on which he died. He leaves a wife and 10 children and a large estate.

Henry Vandersanden, a farmer, aged 55 years, a resident of Vashon, Washington county, for nearly 24 years, died Tuesday night. Mr. Vandersanden was hurt three months ago by the collapse of a barn, which injured his spine and broke his legs in several places. He left a wife and several children.

Mrs. William McKinley Brings Suit.

Suit has been commenced in the United States court at Carson City by Mrs. Ida McKinley, wife of President McKinley, and Mrs. Mary B. Barber, against John Steele, William Hays and others, to recover possession of the Eljah mine, one of the patented claims of the Canton Mining company, on which, it is alleged, the defendants are operating, and also for \$10,000 damages, being for the ore taken out and shipped by the defendants during the period of the occupancy of the mine.
