TWO INDIAN MURDERERS Examination. Columbia George appeared before United States Commissioner John H. Bailey, Jr., this forenoon, waived examination, and were bound over to appear before the federal grand jury. No bail was fixed and the crime charged is murder and manslaughter in the particular case. The indictable in this particular case, the two Indians will be allowed to remain in the jail in Pendleton until the coming together of the federal grand jury, which will probably take place in October or November. Colonel Parsons, attorney for the Indians, obtained the consent of United States District Attorney John H. Hall to have the Indians remain here in jail, instead of taking them to Portland, provided he would have his clients waived examination. The above two Indians killed Anna Edna, an Indian woman, by administering strychnine to her on August 24, 1900. They were tried in the circuit court, convicted and sentenced to be hung. On appeal to the supreme court, that body decided that the circuit court did not have jurisdiction. They will consequently be given a trial in federal court.
