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logs county auditors have made their reports.

There are about as many different rates of taxation in the state as there are counties, and Cuyahoga's present rate, 2.98 per cent, is one of the highest.

Outside of what the state board does in bringing up the valuation of railroad property, used in the daily operation of the road, Johnson proposes to add about \$100,000,000 to the duplicate in this county alone. He has already placed about \$20,000,000 on, and this affects only the two street railroad companies, two gas lighting companies and one electrical illuminating company. He alleges that there is about \$40,000,000 worth of railroad property in the city that is not on the duplicate at all, for the reason that it is not used in the daily operation of the road. His board can attend to that class of railroad property, though it cannot touch any used in the delivery, etc., as county auditors attend to that. Then there are thousands of acres of land under water, on the lake front between the shore and the harbor line the ownership of which is claimed by railroads and old corporations.

They have never paid a cent of tax on this land, though it is very valuable for dock and other purposes. Johnson is going after this next, and he expects to find several millions in it.

The task that Johnson has laid out for himself is so stupendous that it is doubtful if he can himself see the end of it, and just how much it all means to the taxpayers. Meanwhile the valuation of every parcel of business and residences real estate in the city is being gone over by Johnson's board.

Land used for business purposes is being raised considerably, but residence property valuations are, in the main, being only equalized. Thus early it is apparent that all good will be done the small property owners, though some of the big ones are going to be hit hard. Johnson's palatial grounds, on Euclid avenue will probably be placed on the duplicate for at least 50 per cent higher than that at which they have been assessed in the past.

TAX REFORM IN OHIO.

If Tom L. Johnson has his way in the tax reform fight which he is waging, the tax rate will eventually drop from nearly 3 per cent to 1 1/2, and possibly less, in Cuyahoga county, Ohio. Should the state board of Columbus add the \$500,000,000 valuation to the neighborhood of \$12,000,000 will be saved to the taxpayers of the state. The tax rate varies in every county according to the valuation of taxable property and the expenses of the governing machinery. The levy for state purposes is the only part of the tax that is not fixed by authorities within the county. For that reason the amount saved to the taxpayers of the whole state, in the event of this \$500,000,000 addition being made, cannot be positively determined until the various

Most of the national leaders have not been west of the Mississippi river, and receive their impressions of the far west from stories of Indian wars and pictures in the illustrated papers of men booted and spurred and armed with big weapons to protect themselves from blood-thirsty Indians and more bloodthirsty white desperadoes. They do not realize that the west is peopled with the descendants from as brave pioneers and as good men as ever conquered a wilderness, and with some of the best blood of the eastern states.

Furthermore, they do not realize that the Columbia river drains a territory larger than the United States east of the Mississippi river, rich in mineral, agricultural, timber and live-
