### WHEAT IS SEELING FREELY

PRICE 45 BLUESTEM AND 43 CLUB AND REDCHAFF.

Barley is Shipping and Brings 60 Cents a Hundredweight, Less Than a Month Ago.

Pendleton, Aug. 8.—Wheat is coming in to the local market freely, considering the price. More wheat has probably been sold and delivered at the local mills than in any previous year at this date. The prices paid are 45c for No. 1 bluestem and 43c for No. 1 redchaff and club.

Portland, Aug. 8.—The Commercial Review in today's issue says of the wheat market: The local situation remains without radical change since last week. Very little old wheat is coming to hand and the new crop is hardly ready to be marketed although a few cars are coming down daily. There is no question about local exporters being willing to pay full commercial values or grain but at present they have no pressing wants to fill and are practically out of the field and awaiting the new crop which is being gathered and must soon be ready for market. Until such time as wheat is moving freely to tide water exporters are content to abide their time and are in a position to await the pleasure of sellers. In view of the low values of wheat in Europe and present firmness of freight rates, it is quite impossible to offer any sort of encouragement for any immediate improvement of wheat prices. Prices are mostly nominal. Club is quoted 55 to 59c; bluestem, 57 to 58c; valley, no quotation as yet, as standards for the same have not been fixed, but the price will be the same as club wheat.

**Wheat in San Francisco.**

San Francisco, Aug. 8.—There is no change in the local situation as to spot wheat. Exporters are not buying as yet freely. Sales are continuously being made at prices that do not suit the seller. While the present prices are considered steady, and although there will doubtless be upward fluctuations from time to time, the most conservative dealers do not look for any substantial improvement in the near future. The spot market can be called dull and lifeless. The grain handlers' strike at Port Costa is apparently settled, from the fact that a half dozen vessels are now loading at that port, but the docks there are all thronged with wheat, and dealers do not look for any buying until stocks go down some. No. 1 green, No. 1 shipping 97 1/2c; milling, 98 1/2c to \$1 per cental.

**Wool in Boston.**

Boston, Aug. 8.—Wool is buying freely. Their activity during the past few weeks has greatly reduced the surplus. Quotations: Territory, scoured basis—Montana, fine, 15 to 16c; scoured, 44 to 46c; fine medium, 14 to 16c; scoured, 42 to 43c; staple, 16 to 17c; scoured, 46 to 48c per pound.

Utah, Wyoming and Idaho—Fine, 13 to 14c; scoured, 44 to 45c; fine medium, 13 to 14c; scoured, 40 to 43c; staple, 15 to 16c; scoured, 46 to 48c.

**National Banks.**

The impetus given to the organization of National banks by the act which is still continuing, and the bills still continue. During the 16th month since the passage of the act there have been organized in the United States 665 National banking associations, with an aggregate capital of \$34,207,000, accompanied by a bond deposit aggregating \$10,000,000. Of these banks, 457 were organized with a capital of less than \$50,000, the total amounting to \$11,882,000, and 208 with a capital of \$50,000 or over, the aggregate amounting to \$22,325,000.

### MAYOR BABCOCK ON LICENSE

Walla Walla Chief Executive Advocates Increase From Saloons.

Mayor Geo. W. Babcock, in his inaugural message to the council, spoke as follows on the subject of saloon licenses:

Every taxpayer will admit that the rate of taxation in Walla Walla is too high, and I am of the opinion that the levy of direct taxes for all purposes can be reduced to 10 mills. To do this it is only necessary to make a reasonable increase in indirect taxation. At present 36 saloons pay an annual license of \$350 each. The law of Washington authorizing the laying of a license tax on saloons provides that each municipality may fix the rate of license at any figure not less than \$300 nor more than \$1000, payable annually in one lump sum in advance. I am reliably informed that with one exception, the lowest license fee exacted from liquor dealers in the entire state of Washington is charged by Walla Walla. Some cities charge the limit, but the majority range from \$500 to \$800 per annum. Having these facts in view and knowing the absolute necessity for more revenue, the council passed an ordinance by a vote of six to one raising the license to sell liquor in Walla Walla to \$600 a year. That ordinance I voted for and my predecessor vetoed. At the ensuing general city election my predecessor was a candidate for re-election, and I had the honor of being his opponent. The verdict of the people can be accepted by you as being very strongly in favor of an increase in the license fee charged for the sale of liquor in Walla Walla. With that sentiment I am in full accord. Any reasonable increase you may make in the liquor license will receive my approval.

In the passing of a new ordinance regulating and licensing saloons ample provision for the prevention of the sale of liquors to minors should be made. The license of a saloon keeper who permits the sale of liquors to minors should be revoked and his unearned license money forfeited. No penalty can hardly be too great to inflict on those who debauch our youth by selling liquor to them.

**Judge in Trouble**

The Teller, Alaska, News, says on July 15 Judge E. G. Rogon, judge of the United States commissioners, court at Teller City, was indicted by the federal grand jury and arrested for alleged misuse of government money. The judge used government funds for purchasing of supplies and a building which he claimed was for government use. He claimed to have made arrangements whereby the government is amply protected from loss.
