CHIEF BRISBO HAS RESIGNED

Has Gone on a Pleasure Tour-Says the Friends of Black Horn are After Him. Ed Brisbo, chief of the Indian poicemen on the Umatilla reservation, has resigned his office, and given up the star that was a badge of authority. Brisbo stated to the East Oregonian that he resigned because the friends of Black Horn were after him, and he thought it would be more healthy for him to take a little pleasure jaunt, in order that he save some of the hair upon his head.

"Those friends of Black Horn, they want my scalp," said the chief, "and I want it, too, and if I keep it I bet-ter go away for a few weeks."

Brisbo's fear of being scalped may not be so foolish, after all, when it is considered that Columbia George and Toy Toy are now in the jail awaiting results of trial in the federal court, having been convicted of murder and thus early in the season to get a then released on a supreme court ruling, the killing of Annie Edna, In-dian sorceress, being the act of which they were guilty, and that act having been performed because of Indian superstition. Brisbo was the policeman who shot Black Horn a few weeks ago while the latter was resisting arrest, and Black Horn is now dead. When he died it was announced that he died from cor sumption, death being hurried by the fact that Black Horn was compelled to stop drinking after being shot, and that the withdrawal of the stimulant accellerated the progress of the disease. might avenge his death. At any rate, Brisbo left today for Montana, going to Butte and other points. Umatilla county will have gone to the seaboard about 120,000 bushels of the new crop wheat. This wheat is that sold early by a few growers who needed a little ready money or desired to stop interest on obligations at the banks. E. W. McComas, of the Northwestern Warehouse company, has bought 100,000 bushels, and it is either at the seaboard, or will be aboard bound there by Monday morning. Other purchases have been made, some for -immediate snipment or for the near future sending to the seaboard. Almost all grain bought thus far has been taken by buyers who had con-tracts to fill. At this time the growers are inclined to hold. As one buyer "the farmers seem to expressed it, have stiffened up in their demands, of late, and are not disposed to part with their crops.

Fifty cents net appears to be the idea of the farmer, as to the value of his wheat of No. 1 grade. It is yet too early to predict what will be the status of the local market, growers being engaged in studying present quota-tions and the condition of the charter market in Portland and at Tacoma and Seattle. Upon an export basis no better than 45c can now be paid. Any-ting above this figure has been paid by those who had contracted to deliver wheat in Portland and were willing to pay slightly more than the export basis.

The farmers are able to do about as they please, being in a strong position financially, and having in almost all instances good credit at the banks or

with loaning companies. From the standpoint of seaboard conditions, charter quotations and foreign demand based upon supply the situation is mixed and few pretend to prophecy what will come to pass.
