WESTON NORMAL OPENS 9TH

New Teachers Selected by the Executive Committee for the Regents.

A meeting of the executive committee of the board of regents for the Weston state normal school was held Monday afternoon in the private office of the regent who is chairman of the committee.

There were two others present, Deputy United States Marshal, Secretary, and G. J. Worthington, secretary, and G. W. Probst, state senator from Weston. The important business before the committee was the payment of bills and the election of teachers. Harry C. Dame of the University of Michigan was elected to the chair of science and Miss Ethel Beattie, Portland, was selected to teach Latin. Other instructors whose selection was confirmed are: Mr. Wilson of Atlantic, Iowa, preceptor; B. B. Smith, penmanship and bookkeeping; Miss LeBarre of Portland, elocution; and Mrs. W. H. Bennett, bookkeeping.

The committee came here from Weston where they have been making preparations for the opening of school on Monday, September 3. The first story of the new hall is up and within a few months the building will be ready for work.

BOSTON'S BARBER REGULATIONS.

Board of Health Orders Sterilization of All That Barbers Use on Customers.

A special despatch from Boston, Mass., Sept. 3, says that the Boston board of health has ordered that razors, shaving brushes and razors shall be sterilized after each separate use thereof. A separate, clean towel shall be used for each person. Material to stop the flow of blood shall be used only in powdered form, and applied on a towel. Powder puffs are prohibited. REGARDING THE CITY WATER

NO TYPHOID GERMS ARE TO BE FOUND THEREIN.

Ordinary Filters Remove Impurities—Death Rate is Low as Compared With Other Towns.

A day or two ago a gentleman came here from Portland and attended to matters pertaining to his property interests. He met many citizens, and conversed upon the conditions here affecting business, health and the future. One thing was told him that appears to have no foundation in fact—that the water of the city system is impregnated with typhoid bacilli, and that citizens are compelled to turn to the use of well water in order to preserve health as relating to fevers.

The East Oregonian caused inquiry to be made and finds that these assertions are not doing justice to the city water system. As a matter of fact, there are in the water coming from the city mains no typhoid bacilli, and it has not come to the attention of the city health officer, Dr. W. G. Cole, that any cases have developed this summer of typhoid that are traceable to the city water.

It is true that some tendency exists to acquire miasmatic or malarial fevers, but the tendency is not strongly marked, and is less than that in most other towns. Filters of ordinary construction remove all deleterious substances. And, in these days of scientific investigation and the application of the results of the scientists' labors to the economy of the household, it is not unreasonable to expect people who desire perfect protection to health to utilize filters. They are not expensive, nor is their use the cause of the slightest expense, after purchase.

A comparison into wearying details, a comparison between Pendleton and other towns of the country shows that this is a very healthy place in which to live. The death rate here is 11.5 to the thousand per annum, but slightly more than 10 per thousand, and close to the lowest averages established by the most careful investigation throughout the United States. In New York, where latest scientific knowledge has been applied the annual mortality rate per 1000 of population is 13, or 1.5 higher than that of this town.

Dr. Cole has made such a report to the surgeon general of the United States, and it is not surprising that he had occasion to give some attention to the matter under consideration. Question as to Wells. As to the use of well water, it has been the opinion of most of the Pendleton physicians that the city water is purer than that coming from wells here. As a matter of necessity, wells take their supply from portions of the town's substratum at the west from where more or less silt has accumulated upon the surface and has therefore found its way down into the soil. So that the well water is much more likely so to be impregnated than is the water from the mains. An exception to this might be and probably is found in the extreme eastern part of Pendleton, inasmuch as above there are no residences and consequently no surface accumulations to work their way down into the soil.

In Other Parts of Town. But, as to portions of the town lower down to the west, there can be but little question. The Pendleton public schools will commence the new year's work on September 16, one week from Monday. Such was the decision at a meeting of the board of trustees. Among other business transacted, was the election of a new teacher. Miss Erma Benson of Cascade Locks will fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Miss Addie McIntosh. On account of the rapid increase shown by the school census, it may be necessary to employ still another teacher. This will necessitate the addition of a new school room to accommodate the overcrowded departments. This will not be done, however, until it is found indispensible after the opening of school. There are sixteen teachers in the entire corps. They are: E. B. Conklin, principal; Roy Conklin, assistant principal; Jennie Beatie, Laura Beatie, Carrie Epple, Mary Ritter, Rose Epple, Eva Wood, Margaret Leonard, Mrs. Rhoda Fitz Gerald, Neva Lane, Elsie and Sadie Beate, and Erma Benson.

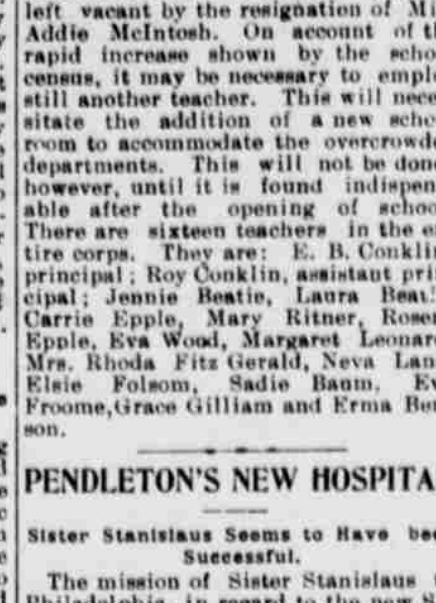
