The Eastern Oregon State Normal school opened Monday for the new school year, says the Leader. "There is an excellent student body, an earnest and enthusiastic school spirit prevails, and the prospects for a successful year's work are bright indeed."

The enrollment has not yet been completed and exact figures cannot be given. There is a far better representation from outside points than last year, students being present from Harney, Malheur, Union, Wallowa, Morrow, Gilliam, Baker and Umatilla counties. Southern and Eastern Washington are also represented.

The attendance from Weston and vicinity is expected to be considerably larger than last year as soon as the rush of farm work is over.

The young ladies' dormitory is accommodating more than twice as many female students than at this time last year.

With respect to its faculty, the school has been strengthened, and students are assured of thorough instruction.

FAVORS FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Walla Walla High School Manager Outlines a Scheme Including Pendleton

Manager Lacy Galbraith of the Walla Walla high school team, has plans for a football league between the schools of Baker City, La Grande, Pendleton and Walla Walla, which if it materializes will be something entirely new in the northwest, and will establish high school football on a firm basis. Speaking of the matter, to the Union he said:

"We have already decided that none but bona fide high school scholars can become members of our team. We wish the other high schools of the eastern half of Washington and Oregon to do the same. That will give us a four-club league.

"Pendleton and Walla Walla could play games to determine their half of the championship. Baker City and La Grande could play a similar number to decide the honors there. Then the winning teams could meet for the final series, it also to consist of two games. This would mean at least nine high school games.

"We cannot hope, when we play a strictly high school team, to compete with Spokane, Seattle and Tacoma, where they have from twice to three times as many scholars to choose from. However, we can play only high school men and still remain in the class of the cities mentioned. I believe this to be the proper idea and an effort will be made to arrange it in this way.

"In order to guard against outsiders playing on either of the teams my plan is to make each aggregation bring with it a member of its faculty who will certify that each man on the field is a scholar who has been a regular enrollee and attending pupil more than one month. This will prevent false registration and the ringing in of rank outsiders."

Mr. Galbraith's plan seems to meet with general favor throughout the city, and the claim is made that all the financial backing desired can be secured for the undertaking.

The Pendleton high school will commence work next Monday and it is probable that football practice will begin soon after. All to whom the subject of a league has been mentioned, are enthusiastic over the idea.

Roy Conklin, manager of athletics for the high school, has not yet returned from his general tour of the state, but he comes it will not be known definitely what he will take in the matter.

COLLISION ON DAYTON LINE

Lon Jones and Fireman James Were in a Wreck, Escaping Unhurt.

On Thursday morning, a collision occurred between James Laidlaw's yearling bull and the Dayton mixed train, 300 yards west of Waitsburg station, resulting disastrously for both. The mixed was pulling into Waitsburg on time. Coming round the last curve on the line, he was unable to stop the train in time and one of the animals was thrown onto the cowcatcher and then gradually dragged under the engine. The continued obstruction finally derailed the engine which tore every shape. Had the outfit gone to the right side instead of to the left the whole train would have been smashed and part at least would have landed at the foot of the steep bank of the Ton-chab river bottom.

Engineer Jones and Fireman W. C. James stuck to their posts and went over the bank with No. 118, but emerged from the upper side unscratched. Both are well known in Pendleton.

ADVOCATES CENTAL SYSTEM

Ex-Governor Moore of Walla Walla Would Change Bushel Quotations for Wheat.

Miles C. Moore of Walla Walla formerly governor of the state of Washington, now in the prominent bank and business of Walla Walla, broached a subject while in Pendleton Friday that will appeal to every one as timely and pertinent.

"Some years ago," said Mr. Moore, the board of regents of Walla Walla attempted to effect a change in the manner of quoting wheat. Now, as every one knows, the market is quoted on a bushel basis. The desire was that it should be quoted on the cental, or one hundred pound, basis. This is done in San Francisco, and other grains are so quoted, barley, for instance. If this change could be effected, it would bring about a desirable status, contributing to convenience on the part of all.

"It will be appreciated that under the prevailing custom, with one system in San Francisco for all grains, and a mixed system here for different classes of grains, it is bothersome in the extreme to make comparisons between San Francisco's and Portland's and the Sound's markets. One must reduce the San Francisco quotation to a bushel basis, or the bushel quotation to the San Francisco cental basis. While San Francisco quotes anything but an even \$1 per cental, a pencil and some figuring are absolutely needed."

Governor Moore's suggestion is agreeable to farmers and grain men in Pendleton, and it has been a general wish for years that his proposed change be made. His idea is that by agitation the alteration may be effected, and counsels all persons interested to keep up the advocacy until it has become an accomplished fact.

SCENES OF SPLENDOR.

Portland Carnival's Brilliant Array of Attractions.

Never in the history of the northwest have the people been offered such enjoyable entertainment mingled with useful instruction as will be laid before them during the month of the Portland carnival, which will be held in the great exposition building from September 18 to October 19, and also in the beautiful Multnomah field adjoining. The committee of representative business men having the carnival in charge have already made contracts involving the expenditure of \$20,000 to make the carnival a success. On the music and amusements alone there will be \$15,000 expended, and the other appropriations will be in proportion for the horse show and the athletic exercises, etc.

These figures will give people an idea of the grandeur and immensity of the carnival, which will be illuminated with 3800 electric lights. The music by two full military bands will be grand, and there will be a dull moment, afternoon or evening. There will be a reproduction of Multnomah falls in the exposition building, a big working mining exhibit, a German village, a showing of all the products of the northwest and many other sights to see. All railroad and steamboat lines will sell excursion tickets to the carnival, good for seven days, at one-and-one-third fare for the round trip. People who miss the Portland carnival will miss a grand event.
