"I'll tell you what we'll do," said Haverly, "we'll take \$5000 spiece and buy twenty chips. Then we can play just one game of freeze out for the whole sum."

The southerner was "game," and in twenty-three minutes Haverly had the whole stakes in his inside pocket.

Haverly was always furiously active and he soon put out "Michael Strogoff," "Widow Bedott" and "The Silver King." Then he organized the Church Choir Opers company "Haver. con, "wide Beloft and the Silver King."
