The report of the Walla Walla schools for September makes a good showing. The total enrollment was 1405, with an average daily attendance of 1215. Eighty-one cases of trachoma were recorded. Thirty-one teachers are employed in the city schools.

A telegram has been received at the La Grande land office from Commissioner Hermann, of the general land office, directing that all the land surrounding the Columbia, North Pole and Golconda mines is no longer subject to entry. The reason for this action is not known, unless it is for the purpose of calling a halt on the destruction of timber in that neighborhood.

Business was good in the Walla Walla land office during September. There were 80 homestead entries, covering 1363.99 acres, mostly in Franklin county. Three settlers made final proof on their homestead. One settler made final proof on a timber culture entry. Sixteen Klickitat Indians made application for lands to be segregated to them. They claimed 2240.40 acres. One desert land entry of 260.75 acres was made.

Major Conroy recently killed two chickens near this city, says a Weston friend, in the craws of which were found small gold nuggets to the value of \$1.25. The gold was of the small, well worn variety, the nuggets being quite small, but perfect in every respect. How the chickens secured the yellow dust is still a mystery.

The late mill at the Walla Walla state penitentiary has been closed down for the annual overhauling. During the past year the mill turned out 1,200,000 sacks. The price at the mill has been \$5.90 a hundred. The product of the mill supplied about a third of the demand for sacks in the Walla Walla country. Those who were not fortunate enough to secure prison sacks last spring had to pay from 8 to 8 1/2c each for wheat sacks.

NELSON B. SALISBURY DEAD
Passed Away After an Operation at Portland.

Nelson B. Salisbury died last Saturday after an operation in a Portland hospital. The remains arrived in Pendleton this morning and were taken to M. A. Rader's undertaking parlors. He was formerly a resident of Pendleton and up to the time of his illness, was employed as engineer on the O. R. & N. between Walla Walla and Wallula. His seven children are now orphans, his wife having died about a year ago. He was 46 years of age.

The funeral took place this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the undertaking parlors, under the direction of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, of which order he was a member. If two of Mr. Salisbury's brothers, who are absent, could have been found, the funeral would have been deferred until their arrival.

SCHOOL ELECTION TUESDAY
PROPERTY OWNERS ASKED TO ENFORCE TECHNICAL POINT.

Law Passed Last Winter Requires Voters to Go Through Formality The Law Requires It.

Pendleton public schools now have eleven grades, and they are in very efficient condition. There are plans for enlargement of the scope of their work in the future, but for the present it is thought wise to permit them to remain in the existing status. Some day, a full fledged high school will be the boast of the town.

According to a law passed by the legislature of 1901, there is a technical point to be covered in an election by the property owning voters of the district, No. 16, and in pursuance thereof the school board will ask the district voters tomorrow to go to the court house and cast their ballots for the following proposition:

"For establishing grades above the eighth grade in school district No. 16, Umatilla county, Oregon."

It should be understood that no changes are proposed. The schools will remain as at present constituted. The law merely demands that the voters endorse the action of the board in establishing the grades above the eighth, and this is to be done tomorrow at the election that has been called.

The laws enacted last winter made many changes in the legal requirements pertaining to the management of the schools of the state. It was a comprehensive statute, and the election that has been called is but one of the features of it. The grades above the eighth have been maintained for several years, and there is no doubt that some time in the not distant future the voters will be asked to endorse further extensions in the local system.

WOOD CHOPPERS SCARCE
Scarcity of Laborers Raises Price of Wood to \$5.75.

Mayor F. W. Vincent in company with Supt. O'Brien of the O. R. & N. took a trip to Huron yesterday. The mayor said today that there is a scarcity of wood choppers in that country and the price of wood is being raised accordingly. Wood is \$5.75 per cord now which is 25c more than the price of a ton of coal. Mayor Vincent predicts that within a year if the present situation continues coal will take the place of wood in the city of Pendleton.

Another circumstance that affects the value of wood in this particular vicinity is that the railroad rates on wood are the same from the Blue mountain to Walla Walla as they are to Pendleton. This increases the quantity shipped to Walla Walla, and unfavorably affects the price as looked at from the standpoint of the Pendleton consumer.

Supt. O'Brien left his private car in the yards here and he and Mayor Vincent made the trip to Huron on the caboose of a gravel train. They were delayed three hours on the way and about lunch time, Mr. O'Brien began

to feel the loss of his cook. Mayor Vincent had prepared for just such an emergency, however, and after struggling for a while with one of his pockets, pulled out a can of sardines and some crackers. The two gentlemen dined untroubledly without after dinner coffee.
