GENERAL NEWS

CHICAGO'S POSTOFFICE WAS ROBBED

Burglars Got Away With \$76,000 Worth of Stamps.

Bored Great Holes in Steel Vault

Job Was Similar to That in California, When Selby Smelter Was Looted Several Months Ago.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—One of the bold and most successful postoffice robberies in the history of the United States was committed last night, when one of the three great vaults in the local postoffice was entered and from \$76,000 to \$75,000 worth of stamps were stolen. The job resembles the Selby smelter robbery in California, in that access to the vault was gained through a tunnel dug from the lake front at the side of the building to the bottom of the great steel case. An eighteen inch hole was then drilled into the vault. Entrance was thus effected, and the robbers helped themselves to the valuable contents, loading the loot upon a wagon and getting away undiscovered. Scores of detectives have been placed on the case. They are working upon the theory that persons thoroughly acquainted with the building perpetrated the robbery. A number of postoffice employees are under surveillance.

Took Three Days to Prepare.

Ninety-seven holes had been drilled in one of the plates in the bottom of the vault and apertures two by three feet were made. The robbery was not discovered until this morning when the cashier opened the vault. He found a box over the hole. Upon the box were a number of finger marks, which the detectives believe will aid them in running down the criminals.

It is thought the work of drilling the holes began at least three days ago, and that the men perpetrated the job without discovery is considered a marvel. Hundreds of men worked on the floor in which the vaults are located, and policemen constantly patrol the inside and outside the building. A watchman was stationed twenty feet from the robbers' place of exit. The amount of stamps stolen is found by count to be \$76,220.

It is believed the real objective of the robbery was the cash in the vault in which half a million of cash is stored, but that in the darkness they mistook the stamp vault for the great treasure box.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The Wasco Opera House company, with the expressed object of erecting and owning an opera house in Wasco, Sherman county, has been organized. The capital stock is \$2,000, in shares of \$25, and R. C. Atwood, W. L. Lamborn, W. B. Campbell and R. F. Halley are the incorporators.

There may not be an epidemic of holdups in Portland at present, but there are many evidences of the fact that a highwayman is flitting plenty of victims in this city. There has been an average of a highwayman's visitation once a night since October 1, says the Telegram.

The Southern Oregon Forest Rangers, who have been doing service in the mountain reserves since May, were called in by the order of governmental officers on Thursday. Notwithstanding the vigilance of the rangers there have been more fires in the southern Oregon forests than for a long time past.

Matt Scott, ex-Sheriff of Linn county, has brought suit against the Southern Pacific Co. for \$20,000. Mr. Scott was taking a load of cattle to Portland, October 19, 1900, and was riding in the caboose of a freight train. The cars were thrown together by a sudden jar, and Mr. Scott was thrown to the floor of the car, and he alleges, was injured seriously.

The Philippine Plantation & Commercial company has been organized for the purpose of acquiring property in the Philippines and elsewhere, operating and developing the resources of the islands, conduct a general merchandise business and transporting passengers and freight for hire. The capital stock is \$500,000, with J. C. Flanders, S. B. Litchfield and H. H. Parker as incorporators.

LAST WEEK OF SCHLEY COURT

Raynor has Only About a Dozen Witnesses to Call.

Washington, Oct. 21.—It is generally expected that this will be the last week of the Schley court. Raynor has only about a dozen witnesses yet to examine, the last of whom will be Schley himself. Following Rear Admiral Schley's testimony, Lemly will doubtless call a few witnesses in rebuttal, after which the case will be submitted to the court.

A number of witnesses who testified last week today made unimportant corrections.

Lieut. Wells, Schley's flag secretary during the war, was called and he had no recollection of the receipt of information from Capt. Cotton of the Harvard on May 27, that positively required Schley to remain at Santiago. Wells showed by a letter press book that after Schley had imposed his "March to be regretted, I cannot obey orders" dispatch to the navy department, he had sent the original by mail. The inference was that the navy department, when it issued the official document last winter, preferred to print the twice translated dispatches rather than the original. Wells said that Schley during the battle was fearless and self-possessed.

QUESTION OF BALLOONING

Santos Dumont Claims He Won the 100,000 Franc Prize.

Paris, Oct. 21.—Santos Dumont, the Brazilian aeronaut, today sailed around Eiffel tower in his balloon and returned to the Aero club within 25 minutes, having to all appearances complied with the conditions imposed by M. Deutsch for winning of the award of 100,000 francs for the invention of a dirigible balloon. Deutsch says Dumont virtually won the prize, but the Aero club says not that he failed to land inside the thirty minutes. Dumont refused to concur in the decision of the club. Deutsch offered a consolation prize of 25,000 francs, but Dumont refused to take it.

M. Deutsch has sent his secretary to Santos Dumont to pay the money. In his opinion, Santos won the prize fairly and he is now ready to pay the money to the aeronaut.

CALEB POWER'S TESTIMONY

He Swears in His Own Behalf, Making Denials.

Georgetown, Oct. 21.—Caleb Powers again testified in his own behalf this morning, and denied ever having known Postmaster Pusey at Harris who is alleged to have told of the gubernatorial contest and that five men were to begin shooting at Geibel.

Noted Detective Shot.

Cincinnati, Oct. 21.—Cal Crime, one of the best known detectives in the west, probably was fatally shot this morning by Dea Foley, a pickpocket of international fame, known as "The Goat," while trying to place him under arrest. Crime is one of the men who unearthed the Pearl Bryan mystery.

California Miner's Association

San Francisco, Oct. 21.—The California Miner's association opened the tenth annual convention here today. Beyond the appointment of committees, nothing was done this morning. The main topic to be discussed relates to the debris dam, the care of the forests and flood waters.

MISS STONE

REMOVED TO ANOTHER PLACE

Brigands Take Her to Eastern Macedonia.

RANSOM TO BE PAID IN ANICHICTA

The Kidnapers Resorted to a Ruse to Deceive the Pursuing Soldiers, and Were Successful.

Constantinople, Oct. 21.—The hill on the Bulgarian frontier where Miss Stone was supposed to be imprisoned by the brigands has been found to be inaccessible. The brigands were seen on another mountain near by, and two hundred Bulgarian troops chased them, but without avail. It was learned later that the appearance of the brigands was but a ruse to divert the attention of the pursuers while Miss Stone was taken elsewhere. The kidnaped woman now is reported to be in a peasant's hamlet in the environs of Elechnita. The brigands have changed the place for the payment of the ransom, and have notified Consul General Dickinson that the money must be paid at Anichicta, a Bulgarian village in eastern Macedonia.

JUDGE'S ORDER ENRAGES

CHICAGO UNION LABOR

The Declaration is that Picketing by Strikers is "Treason, Civic War, and Tyranny."

Chicago, Oct. 21.—Judge Kohlman's order restraining the picketing of the machinery plant by the strikers and characterizing such action as treason, civil war and tyranny of the most despotic character has aroused union labor in Chicago as it has never been aroused before. The strikers declare they will ignore the order and picket the plants as usual even if every one of the two thousand men affected are placed in jail.
