Circuit court convened this morning after an adjournment of three days. The cases of E. R. Bailey vs. P. J. Kelly and Mary Bailey vs. P. J. Kelly which were set for trial for today and tomorrow, were settled, leaving a blank in the court docket until Wednesday, when the road case No. 325 will receive a hearing. RETURNED FROM CONVENTION

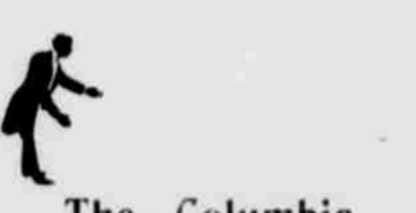
Delegates to Episcopal Gathering Arrive Home From San Francisco.
