GENERAL NEWS

Austria is preparing for a struggle provoked by the new German tariff.

The Ecuador congress has reduced the import duties on sugar and lard, and has suspended the export duty on sugar.

In Japan the Marquis Ito's party has initiated a strong movement to overthrow the cabinet. Important political developments are anticipated.

The Peruvian government has fined the English Railway company \$3000 on account of the accident which took place near Lima a few days ago, in which two persons were killed.

Mabel Franklin Mayer, 15 years old, was cruelly murdered on Monday in San Francisco, as she slept in her bed at her home, 1000 Broadway, on Jessie street. John Stano, aged 22 years, was her murderer. He then suicided.

Sir Thomas Lipton returned to New York from Chicago. He said that he had enjoyed his visit to Chicago, and had received more invitations of a social nature than he had been able to accept. He returns to-day or tomorrow.

R. A. Watson, formerly of Canada and now of Sydney, N. S. W., at an informal reception given him by the New York Nonpartisan Rowing Club, said that the recent races between Columbia and Shamrock II were the greatest that had ever taken place in any waters. He added that on his return to Australia he would try to form a wealthy syndicate to build a boat and challenge for the cup from Australia.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The postoffice at Stuck, King county, Washington, is to be discontinued on October 31.

Union Railroad Company, Union, \$1,000,000. E. W. Davis, W. H. Ewin, L. J. Davis, F. E. Foster, G. F. Hall, has been formed.

H. C. Payne, a well known resident of Baker City, was arrested by Sheriff Lawrence, of Malheur county on the charge of embezzlement.

John Pierpont Morgan's special train from San Francisco arrived Saturday and remained in Portland until 11:40 when it went out over the Northern Pacific for Puget Sound.

R. C. Judson, industrial agent of the O. R. & N. Co., has made a suggestion to the merchants and business men of Baker City looking to the holding of a series of monthly fairs at Baker City.

October shipments of wheat and flour from Portland will again exceed two million bushels. With but two-thirds of the month passed the shipments are already in excess of a million bushels, and there is a big fleet in the river to finish.

For the next 18 months the various Washington state officials and institutions will have to get along without drawing upon the printing fund. This condition of affairs arises from the fact that there is in reality no printing fund to draw upon.

J. Horn of Petaluma, Cal., has brought an attachment suit against J. Connor, proprietor of the Williamette hotel to recover \$190 alleged to be due on a judgment recovered in California. Sheriff Durbin has attached a sum of money deposited in the Ladd & Bush bank.

At Eugene the committee which is soliciting subscriptions for the bonus for the proposed woolen mill is now at work and is meeting with good success. About half the required amount was subscribed after a few hours of soliciting, and it is now believed there will be no trouble about raising the amount needed.

ROOSEVELT ATTENDS THE BI-CENTENNIAL

Honors Yale With His Presence in New Haven.

THE UNIVERSITY ALSO HONORS HIM

The Big Celebration Attracts Many Visitors From Other Places—Athletics Part of the Day's Doings.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 22.—The bi-centennial of Yale is now in full blast. The morning's exercises consisted of addresses in the chapel. This afternoon a football game occurs between Yale and Bates college. President Roosevelt arrived early this morning. A delegation of Borygh council waited on him shortly after he arrived and tendered him the freedom of the town. It is planned to have an informal reception this afternoon. The president is guarded from cranks by three secret service men and a corps of deputy sheriffs.

On receiving the degree of LL. D., the president will be decorated with a hood. He will remain throughout the day.

Following the degree ceremonies he will lunch at the home of Prof. W. W. Farnham, and will hold a reception with President Hadley for the bi-centenary guests at the Yale art School. A dinner is to be held in his honor in the evening and he will depart on a late train for Washington.

The spectacular events of interest are the torchlight procession of the classes in picturesque uniform through the streets and the production of the student's play on the campus emblematic of the history of Yale. The celebration is designed the familiar scenes of "A Night at the Old Yale Fence."

Flaming, evergreen trimmings, pine flags and Yale seals by day and every manner of blue light by night meet the visitor on every hand.

To feed the multitude Yale's new dining hall, accommodating 1200 is opened to guests, and restaurants and hotels are ready for the host of sightseers.

THE VIENNA REICHSRATH WAS VERY INDIGNANT.

When the Presiding Officer Admitted There Had Been Intentional Omission of Mention of McKinley's Death.

Vienna, Oct. 22.—In the reichsrath today, the president, in reply to interpellations, admitted the truth of the reports that at the opening session of the body all mention of the death of McKinley was intentionally omitted. The admission caused a sensation. Expressions of violent indignation resounded on all sides of the chamber.

BULGARIANS BLAME THE SULTAN OF TURKEY.

Says He Ordered His Soldiers to Steal Miss Stone to Pay Off Grievances Against the United States.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 22.—Vetscherias-Peschta, a newspaper today throws the blame for the abduction of Miss Stone on the shoulders of Turkey and implicates the Sultan in the plot. The paper says it has conclusive proof that Turkish troops, acting on the sultan's orders, seized the missionary, hoping thereby to pay off some old scores Turkey had against the United States.

AFTER A KING KILLER

Berlin Police Search for Italian Anarchist who Would Murder the Kaiser.

London, Oct. 22.—A Berlin dispatch says the police are looking for an Italian anarchist named Napoli, who is reported to be enroute to Berlin with the object of assassinating the Kaiser.

A Poisoner of Relatives.

Dayton, Ohio, Oct. 22.—The hearing of Mrs. Mary Wittmer, accused of poisoning her sister and who is supposed to have knowledge of the sudden death of thirteen others, was begun this morning. The physician who attended the prisoner's sister testified that unusual conditions followed the first visit, indicating morphine poisoning. After death the autopsy showed arsenic and mercury in the stomach.

American Woman Pleaded Guilty.

London, Oct. 22.—In the central criminal court today, Josephine Marie Eastwick of Philadelphia, pleaded guilty to a charge of having attempted to swindle a London broker by raising stock certificates. Sentence was postponed until the prisoner's sanity has been examined into.

Engagement of Two Millionaires.

New York, Oct. 22.—Mrs. Edward Kelly confirmed this morning the report of the engagement of her daughter Helen to Frank, the youngest son of the late Jay Gould. The wedding will occur next spring. Miss Kelly is the heiress to a million. Gould is worth twenty millions.

TODAY'S COURT OF INQUIRY

WELLS WAS AGAIN ON THE WITNESS STAND

More Testimony that Schley was not a Coward or Lacked Calmness.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Schley's flag lieutenant Wells was called when the court opened this morning, and he was asked if Schley ever told him his reasons for believing the Spanish to be at Cienfuegos and what they were. Wells said he had only an impression and knew only in part Schley's ideas were. The question was not pressed.

George Graham, correspondent on the Brooklyn during the war, gave the conversation between Schley and Sigbee on May 26. He testified that after Sigbee reached the quarterdeck, Schley asked:

"Have we got 'em?" Sigbee answered: "No, I have been here for a week and they are not here."

Graham also testified that Schley told him on the day of the reconnaissance of May 31, he did not intend to anything except find out what batteries were there. During the reconnaissance, Schley was on the exposed side of the coming tower. Graham said when the battle of July 3 opened, Schley took his position on the platform around the coming tower. At the first shot, Lieut. Simpson called:

"How was that?" Schley replied: "I don't know but keep at them."

He said Schley throughout the fight was calm and self-possessed.

New Jersey Ferryboat Burned.

Jersey City, N. J., Oct. 22.—The ferry boat Elizabeth caught fire in mid stream this morning, but the passengers and crew were safely landed, after which the vessel was towed in mid stream again, where she burned to the water's edge. The loss is \$100,000.

IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS CAPTURED

In Philippines From Family of a Rebel General.

REVEALING BAD FEELING IN SAMAR

Men Involved Supposed to Be Loyal to American Government—Some Europeans in the Trouble.

Washington, Oct. 22.—News reached the war department from the Philippines today of the capture on Samar by Captain Jackson of the wife, mother and child of the rebel general Lucban, together with the seizure of his private correspondence. Lucban was wounded in a raid, but escaped. In his correspondence were letters indicating wide spread dissatisfaction with the American regime among the leading citizens of Sanbalogan, capital of Samar. The men involved were supposed to be loyal supporters of the American government. Thirteen of them were arrested and probably will be deported to Guam. Several Europeans are said to be involved, and they have been ordered to leave the Philippines.

Active Insurrection in Samar.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The following cablegram was received by the navy department today from Rear Admiral Rodgers, commanding the southern squadron in the Philippines at Cavite. He reports active insurrection in Samar. The New York leaves today for Calbalogan with 300 marines to report at Bancey and Bulangta to cooperate with the army. Nearly all the naval force is concentrated on the Samar patrol. Two colliers are needed and are being utilized.

Archer, Great Organist, Dead.

Pittsburg, Oct. 22.—Frederick Archer, perhaps the greatest organist in the world, died this morning of cancer.
