GENERAL NEWS

James R. Woods, who drew the capital prize in the Lawson land district at the El Reno lottery last August, and selected a claim valued at nearly \$50,000, is dead of typhoid fever after a brief illness at Lawson, O. T.

Bands of about 500 Indians are in Colorado from the White Rock, Utah, agency, destroying game in direct violation of the laws of the state. Immediate provision must be made to remove them, otherwise there will be serious trouble.

In carrying out the sentence of death imposed on Leon F. Czolgosz, the murderer of President McKinley, 1200 requests have been received for invitations to the electrocution. There will be but 26 witnesses admitted, the law limiting the number.

A petition asking that Cuba be annexed to the United States is being circulated among Cuban business men, and every effort is being centered upon annexation, as business men generally, it is alleged, believe that the reciprocity movement will amount to nothing.

The president appointed George H. Koester, collector of internal revenue for South Carolina. With the appointment the following statement was issued: "Mr. Koester is a prominent solid democrat, and has been recommended for the position by a large number of influential business men and representative citizens, not only of South Carolina, but of North Carolina and elsewhere."

Marshall Clifford Lofferis has just sold his library in New York, valued at \$200,000. In this library were 95 first editions of Milton, including the "Aeropagitica" of 1644, and the six first issues of "Paradise Lost" with variations of title pages, the four first folios of Shakespeare and almost perfect, 800 quartos of plays of the Elizabethan period, all first editions. The Indian Bible of John Eliot in this library was one of the 20 copies that the author sent to England to be presented to eminent personages. This one has on the fly leaf the inscription, "Dane Martij Atmye Omnia This Book," dated March 23, 1664.

Deceased was 84 years of age, and had been a resident of Vancouver since the early '50s. He was born at Lexington, Ky., February 29, 1817.

While Harvey H. Stanton of Salem was returning home last Saturday evening, he was attacked by an unknown man on the covered bridge near the Reform school, knocked from his wheel and stunned by a blow from some heavy weapon. SCHLEY WAS THOUGHTFUL OF HIS MEN

He Sent Them Word of the Battle's Progress.

THE ADMIRAL WAS SELF-POSSESSED

But He Had His Mind Set on Catching Cervera and Was Determined to Capture the Spaniard.

Washington, Oct. 23.—When the Schley court opened this morning first on the stand were a number of witnesses who made important corrections in testimony.

Correspondent Graham added to his testimony that not only did Sigbee state the Spaniards were not at Santiago, but he clinched his information by saying he had two pilots aboard who were sure the Spanish boats were too big to get through the harbor entrance.

James Hare, the photographer of an illustrated weekly, was called on the stand. He was on the press boat and scout boat St. Paul on May 28, Sigbee was asked if there was news of Cervera's fleet. Sigbee replied Cervera was not at Santiago.

Chief Boatwain Hill, who was on the Brooklyn during the war, testified there was never a time the Texas was in danger of being run down by the Brooklyn. When Yeoman Ellis was killed, Lieut. McAuley said: "Let's throw the body overboard." But Schley said: "No, he died like a brave man and he will be buried like one."

While the battle was raging, Schley was self-possessed and constantly sent words of encouragement to his men below, letting them know the progress of the battle.

Hill's testimony frequently elicited applause. During the chase of the Colon, the witness said, Schley stamped his foot and said: "Damn him, I'll follow him to Spain, if necessary."

This brought more applause.

GEN. BULLER WILL REVENGE HIMSELF ON DETRACTORS

His Dismissal May Stir Up Scandals in the War Office—He is a Scapegoat.

London, Oct. 23.—Gen. Buller's degradation is the sensation of the hour. The impression prevails that Buller's dismissal will have the effect of stirring up the war office scandals. This idea was strengthened today by friends of Buller, who say he will retaliate at the first opportunity.

CONFERRING THE RED HOOD

ROOSEVELT INVESTED WITH THE ROBES AT YALE TODAY

Distinguished Men Given Degree of Doctor of Laws. New Haven, Oct. 23.—Today witnessed the climax of the celebration of the bi-centennial of Yale. All business was closed, people thronged the streets to watch the passing of great men. President Roosevelt and his party arrived at nine-thirty. The police had arrangements that prevented anyone in the vast crowd that welcomed him from getting unacceptably close to him. Escorted by the second regiment, the second company of the governor's foot guards, the second company of the governor's horse guards, and headed by a band, the presidential party started for the campus. Three mounted policemen rode near the president's carriage. Arriving in Dwight hall, the president donned the academic robes, and the academic party then proceeded to the Hyperion hall, theater, where the degree of doctor of laws was conferred upon the president. Other distinguished men similarly were honored. Secretary H. C. Archibald, John Ireland of St. Paul, Bishop Potter, President Harper of the University of Chicago, President Ide W. Wheeler of the University of California, President Angell of the University of Michigan, Chief Justice Fuller, Richard Olney, Admiral Sampson and Whitlaw Bishop, Archbishop of Japan, Speaker Hayatama of the Japanese house of representatives, Ambassador Choate.

MISS STONE MAY BE FREE WITHOUT PAYING RANSOM

A BRAVE MESSENGER BESTS ROBBERS

They Attacked His Car on the Southern Pacific

AND HE STOOD OFF THE GANG

Highwaymen Rifled the Mail—Left Passengers Unmolested—Sheriff's posse Now Pursuing Them.

Eugene, Oct. 23.—(Special)—The Southern Pacific train, No. 16, north-bound, was held up by three or more masked men at Walker station 16 miles south from Eugene this morning at 2:30 o'clock. The express car was blown open with dynamite, but the messenger fought off the robbers. The mail car was entered and the registered mail taken. The passengers were not molested. No one was injured. The robbers made off on the engine to the outskirts of Eugene and escaped in the darkness. No Clew has been found as to the identity of the robbers.

A BRAVE MESSENGER

Portland, Oct. 23.—A wire from Eugene says: Two men boarded the train at Cottage Grove and put off the fireman and helper, unseparated from the passenger train and compelled the engineer to pull ahead a short distance, where they attacked the express car. The two men fired repeatedly at the engineer. The car was attacked, but the robbers were stood off by the messenger, C. Charles, after the discharge of a number of shots. The door of the express car was blown off by a bomb. A second bomb thrown into the car was caught by Charles and thrown out before the explosion. Registered mail pouches were secured. A sheriff's posse now is in pursuit.

GEORGE OF GREECE WOULD ANNEX ISLE OF CRETE

And Such Action Will Be Turkey Rumors. Vienna, Oct. 23.—Advisers from Constantinople assert that Prince George of Greece, high commissioner of Crete, intends to summon the Cretan assembly and proclaim the annexation of Crete to Greece. The prince, says the adviser, has intimated to the Athens cabinet that such action would be considered as a casus belli by Turkey. Turkish troops it is further asserted, are being concentrated on the Turkish frontier. In diplomatic circles, it is not believed that Prince George will persist in his determination to annex the island.
