MR. YOUNG'S VIEWS AT LENGTH.

Baker City Newspaperman Discusses the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

Edward Everett Young, editor of the Baker City Herald, is making a short visit in Pendleton. Mr. Young is one of the five commisssioners who met in Portland some months ago to draw up plane for the Lewis and Clark centennial to be held at Portland in 1905. The other members of the commission are Mr. Ankeny of South Oregon, Judge Bellinger of the U.S. circuit court, H. W. Corbett of Portland, and Chas. W. Fulton of Astoria. At the meeting it was decided to call the exposition the "Lewis and Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition." The insigns chosen was "Where Rolls the Oregon," the well known quotation from Thanatopsis.

Upon Mr. Young devolved much of the work of promoting the exposition and advertising it among the people of Oregon. He has been cognizant of the necessity of beginning at once in order that the momentous undertaking may be carried through with entire success. In an interview, Mr. Young said:

"It is eminently right and proper that Oregon should take the initiative and pass an enabling act that will commit the state unquestionably to the cause. 
