CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

CASE OF A. J. OVERTURET vs. EDWIN WOODY ON TRIAL.

The case of A. J. Overturet vs. Edwin Woody has been on trial in the circuit court for the past two days.

The proceedings were delayed for some time yesterday morning while a special venire of talemens was summoned.

When the panel was complete, those in the jury box were E. G. Ehrhart, E. D. Turner, S. A. Hampton, Jurgen Mumm, E. N. Smith, John Dand, Winn Johnson, J. M. Ferguson, Joseph Dorn, Carl Hanson, J. M. Ferguson and R. F. Johnson, J. J. Baileys and T. G. Hailey appeared for the plaintiff and Stillman & Pierce for the defence.

The suit was over some property which Woody had leased for two years from Jas. P. Whittemore. The plaintiff, Overturet, is the owner of the property and claims that Woody did not abide by his agreement in the feeding of the stock and repairing fences, etc.

An incident out of the ordinary occurred in the testimony of the first mentioned witness. When asked why the fences were not kept in repair, the witness answered by calling the defendant Woody some very offensive and evil sounding names, for which he was reprimanded by the court.

The examination of witnesses for the defense began this morning. John McCourt was the first upon the stand and was followed by Elizabeth Shull, Mrs. J. P. Whittemore, J. W. Stamper, E. H. Strangh, H. H. Saxon and P. J. Christie.
