Judge Raleigh Stott Dead.

Judge Raleigh Stott died last Saturday in Portland. Judge Stott was the head of the law firm of Stott & Stout, and had long been a leading member of the bar. He was born in Indiana in 1845, and six years later came to Oregon with his parents, who located in Washington county. He was graduated from Pacific University in 1869, and was admitted to the bar in 1870. In 1873 he moved to Portland where he took up the practice of his profession, attaining an almost immediate position in the front rank of the lawyers of the city. In 1874 he was elected district attorney of the fourth judicial district, and in 1880 was made judge of the same district. He left a widow, a daughter and a son, Miss Susan and Plowden Stott. Mr. James Laidlaw, George and Lansing Stout and Mrs. C. Cheney are his step daughters and sons.

Some Turf Notes.

Walla Walla is to have a new race track and country fair if the scheme proposed by John Albright goes through. He proposed to the directors of the old Walla Walla track to sell part of the present grounds as town lots to pay for the expenses of fitting up the rest of the speedway. Mr. Albright was given 60 days by the directors to enter on his project. He commenced work immediately and is meeting with good success. It is thought the solution to the vexed county fair and race track question has at last been reached.

SCHIFFLER CASE ON.

Morning Occupied in Argument—The Court Sustained Himself.
The case of Schiffler vs. Siebert is still dragging along in the circuit court. The court sustained the objection of counsel for defense, Messrs. Carter & Rale, that testimony 'regarding the extent of Mr. Siebert's tailor-business, prior to the transaction of selling out, was still inadmissible. The argument was reopened this morning and after about two hours of discussion among the attorneys, the court sustained his former decision.
This morning the plaintiff, S. A. Schiffler, was examined as a witness. He testified that he was positive that Siebert and A. Schwartz were in partnership under the name of the latter, also that at one time they dissolved partnership for a few months and then resumed it again. The books of A. Schwartz were introduced as testimony. At three o'clock the witnesses were still on the stand undergoing a severe cross examination by the counsel for defense.

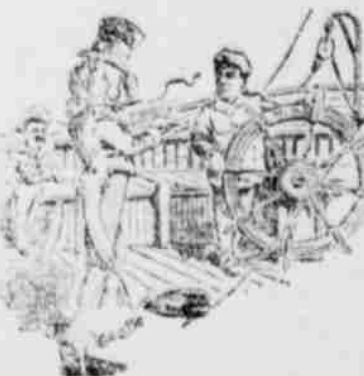
