THE PETROLEUM DEPOSITS

IS FOUND IN THE MALHEUR COUNTY DISTRICT.

R. & N. Co. Assures That Its Engines Will Burn the Oil as Fuel, Making a Market.

Malheur City, Oct. 21.—For weeks, perhaps months, those of the mining class in Eastern Oregon, who have been of the existing conditions, have been confident that petroleum in quantities existed in the Malheur basin. The latest reports from the experts now know it. The question now arises, what to do with it? It is found. Everybody knows that oil is a good fuel and is a good thing to burn in engines.

The Formation. A great deal has been said and written about the formation of the rock of the Malheur basin. As a matter of fact, all the sand rock which is exposed along the gulches, is of horizontal strata and shows positively that it has been no seismic or disturbance of volcanic eruption, to displace oil bearing sand.

MILLING WORTH 43 1/2; EXPORT 43 LOCALLY. Sales 20,000 Since Last Saturday in Pendleton—High Point Then. Pendleton, Oct. 31.—Milling wheat here is worth 43 1/2, export 43. The market is weaker today. Last Saturday it touched the high point for this season, when No. 1 club brought 44 in the warehouse. Since Saturday 20,000 bushels have been sold here.

Portland Wheat Review.

Portland, Oct. 31.—The Commercial Review says: "Our market, while hardly so active last week as during the preceding fortnight, was moderately so, and a great deal of wheat changed hands. At one time there was a slight falling of values, partly due to a larger speculative movement east, effects of which were reflected in a certain degree in Europe, and giving some promise of a higher level of values. The speculative demand quickly subsided, however, and options fell back to old figures. Offerings are hardly so liberal as formerly from either the valley or Walla Walla district, though considerable wheat has been sold by farmers, and reports are that over one-third of the crop of Whitman county, banner wheat county of Washington, has been sold. A great many farmers prefer to meet the market as soon as their grain is warehoused, and this is demonstrated by the free selling movement recently. Reports from the interior state that if the farming class can secure 45 cents for their grain at home they will let go quite freely and more wheat will be put on the market than exporters could take care of."

Manufacturers are using a large amount of wool, and are buying when they get short, but there is an absence of speculative feeling. Dealers are of the opinion that the market will continue steady during the remainder of the year. Territory wools continue to lead the list in sales. Fine wools are quoted at 45c for scoured, fine mediums from 40c to 45c, while staple lots are selling at 45c and 47c.
