GENERAL NEWS

The failure of Topitt & Brooks, bankers and brokers, of Boston, was announced on the Stock Exchange, of which they were members.

Dr. Doty, health officer of the port of New York, is not alarmed over the fact that Liverpool has been declared a plague-infected port by the Italian and French governments.

John E. Redmond, Patrick E. McHugh and Thomas O'Donnell, Nationalist members of parliament, who came in behalf of the Irish cause, have landed in New York.

Emperor William has telegraphed the German Protestant community in Shanghai, that he will give an altar and window to the new church there in memory of Baron von Kettler.

At Glasgow the bubonic plague has reappeared during the week. Four suspected cases were removed from the Central Hotel, belonging to the Caledonian Railway, and one died.

At Liverpool it is officially announced that there have been no further deaths from bubonic plague and no fresh cases reported. The precautionary measures, however, are continued.

The monthly statement of the government receipts and expenditures, will show that the month of October, 1901, the total receipts were \$4,251,952, and the expenditures \$4,645,832, which leaves a surplus for the month of \$398,117.

The annual report of Commissioner Hermann of the land office, says that 15,562,796 acres of public lands were disposed of during the last fiscal year, an increase of 2,108,908 over the previous year, which was the banner year in public land sales. The net surplus from the entire land and forest administration is \$3,548,442.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

C. F. Aetor was appointed postmaster at Alto, Wash.

At Monroe, Ore., the 2-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Belknap, died from the effects of being scalded 20 hours before.

At Vancouver, Wash., John Burg, a pioneer of Vancouver and Clark county, died at his home from heart failure. Deceased was a native of France, having been born in Alsace, Dec. 15, 1823.

The government may lose 400 head of reindeer at Sitka, Alaska, according to passengers arriving on the steamer Rosinok from Nome. The reindeer are without herders and are roaming at will.

Chief Joseph, head of the Nez Percés tribe, expects to go to Washington, where he will see President Roosevelt and demand that a public school be maintained at the home of himself and followers upon the Spokane reservation.

At the next meeting of the state board of control, to be held shortly after the arrival of its members from their tour of inspection of the state institutions, the question of establishing a printing office or a creosote at the reform school will be taken up.

A strike is threatened at the Cornucopia mine because a non-union man is employed who refuses to join the Miners' Union or resign his position. The Cornucopia has a payroll of \$17,000 to \$20,000 per month. It is one of the richest properties in Eastern Oregon. At present it is in the hands of a receiver.

ITALY'S NAVY TAKES A HAND IN BLUFF GAME

Sends Some Warships to Offset France's Demonstration.

A REPORT THAT THE PORTE ACCEPTS

And That the Trouble May Thus Be Settled. Suggestion of Resemblance to Crimean War.

London, Nov. 2.—A Rome dispatch says that a division of the Italian Mediterranean squadron has started for Turkey with the supposed object of counterbalancing the French naval demonstration.

Paris, Nov. 2.—A counselor of the French legation at Constantinople telegraphs that he has received a message from the sultan announcing that the porte has accepted all French claims.

Other Matters.

Paris, Nov. 2.—It is semi-officially announced today that the real demands of France in connection with the present trouble with Turkey will be announced in a few days. It is stated that the Loranio claim has been neglected, now are at stake. These are religious as well as political. Among them the most important is France's religious protectorate in the Orient, which Turkey has threatened. In this connection it may be well remembered that the dispute concerning France's protectorate was the chief cause of the Crimean war.

POPULAR LIBERTY IS OURS

ANNUAL DAY OF NATIONAL THANKS.

President Roosevelt Issues the Usual Proclamation Setting Nov. 28.

Washington, Nov. 2.—President Roosevelt today issued a proclamation designating Nov. 28 as the annual Thanksgiving Day. The proclamation says:

"We mourn President McKinley because we so loved and honored him, and the manner of his death has swelled in the breasts of our people a keener anxiety for the country, and at the same time, a resolute purpose not to be driven by any calamity from the path of a strong, orderly, popular liberty in which as a nation we have thus far safely trod."

A GERMAN MURDERER.

Half Wit Kills Two and Then Himself.

Amsterdam, Nov. 2.—Fred Banker, a half-witted German, entered the home of William Green last night and going to the bedroom of Green and his wife shot them both, killing the husband and fatally injuring the wife. He crushed the couple's skulls with a hatchet, then shot himself to death. Banker recently was released from the penitentiary, where he served a term for shooting Mrs. Green before her marriage.

New Asylum Regulations.

Salem, Nov. 1.—Employees at the state insane asylum go under new regulations today, which have been adopted by the state asylum board on recommendation of Superintendent Galbreath. From this date, employees will be limited to one late permit a week and excuses for temporary leave of absence will be granted only in cases of sickness or important business, with exception of the regular vacation which must be taken at one time. This vacation consists of seven days off for the first year and ten days off after the first year. Employees have been from duty in past year, by permission, as high as fifty to ninety-five during a single month, at times seriously crippling the service. The growing practice of employes taking time off to attend social gatherings at night is thus sought to be checked.

Bourke Cochran Out of it.

New York, Nov. 2.—It is announced that Bourke Cochran's injuries are so serious that he will be unable to take any further part in the majority campaign.

Barracks Burn in China.

Tien Tain, Nov. 2.—The barracks of the Royal Welch Fusiliers were destroyed by fire yesterday. Two men were reported killed.

Colonel F. J. Parker also owns shares in the Statesman and other small stocks are held by individuals throughout the county.

The town of Pendleton, Mr. Watson says, is the liveliest and most prosperous town in the inland Empire, and if oil is found in the vicinity it will result in the rapid building up of the place.

DUKE AND DUCHESS OF YORK

Arrived in England From the World Tour.

WERE HEARTILY WELCOMED BY ALL

A Cloud Was Cast Over the Festivities by the News of the Reverses to British Arms.

London, Nov. 2.—The disaster at Bruckenberg to the Russian force, has cast a cloud over the reception to the Duke and Duchess of York today. The streets, however, are decorated and crowds gathered at an early hour to welcome the heir home. The royal train left Portsmouth amid a big ovation.

DUKE AND DUCHESS OF YORK ARE HONORED.

Arrived Home From Their World Tour and Were Heartily Greeted.

The royal party arrived at Victoria station at one o'clock this afternoon, where addresses were presented on behalf of the colonials. Secretary Chamberlain acted as master of ceremonies. The party then drove to Marlborough. The greatest crowd since Queen Victoria's funeral crowded the streets through which the party passed.
