WALLA WALLA HOSPITAL

OVERDOSE OF STRYCHNINE

MRS. ALEX DRYSDALE
DIED IN GREAT AGONY.

Believed She Took the Poison With
Suicidal Intent.
Walla Walla, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—
With a great dose of strychnine, Mrs.
Margaret Drysdale took her life Sun-
day night at her home, 25 miles from
this city, and in great agony she
died while all help obtainable proved
futile. After four hours of horrible
suffering, she died in an unconscious
condition.

Mrs. Drysdale was born at Dayton
shortly before coming to this city. She
was a daughter of Henry Day, a pio-
neer in this valley and the man for
whom Dayton was named. She left
a husband and a small son.

A week ago Mrs. Drysdale was called
to the ranch of her husband near
Pascocott, and she went reluctantly. To
friends, she spoke of desiring to go
to the country, and the prospect of
having to leave town for the present.
News of her death came to town
yesterday in a request for Coroner
Shaw to immediately go to the ranch
and investigate the sudden death. Cor-
oner Shaw returned last night, it hav-
ing been deemed unnecessary to hold
an inquest.

The Drysdales are in good circum-
stances. A sister of the deceased is
married to Thomas Drumheller, one
of the wealthy merchants of this city.
Dependancy is supposed to have
caused temporary insanity.

She Lived in Pendleton.

Here in Pendleton, Mrs. Drysdale
was well known, having lived in this
place for several years after her mar-
riage five years ago. Mr. and Mrs.
Drysdale moved to Walla Walla during
1900, and have resided there since. Mr.
Drysdale operating ranch lands he
owns near Pasocott, Wash. Mr. Dry-
sdale was agent for the Scottish Mort-
gage companies, and also farmed ex-
tensively in Umatilla county. The
friends of Mrs. Drysdale were sur-
prised and pained to learn the deplorable
news contained in the foregoing tele-
gram.

ALASKA PROSPECTS
ARE FLATTERING.

Yukon River Tied Up for the Winter
by the Forming of Ice.

W. F. Matlock and son, Wesley N.
Matlock, who returned from Juneau
on Monday, say that boat traffic is
now blocked on the Yukon till next
June and that the only access to the
gold fields of Alaska from now until
that time will be overland. W. N.
Matlock and wife have spent four
years in Skagway. He was in the
brewery business till a year ago, and
he modestly says that he has made
considerable money since leaving
here. He and his father have some
very flattering mining properties in
the Porcupine, Atlin and Juneau coun-
ties. They left Skagway on the 22d
of October and the steamer they came
on was the last of any size to attempt
the trip this season. All the river
boats now are tied up at White Horse
Rapids. Mr. and Mrs. Matlock have
had some very thrilling experiences
with the earthquakes and floods in
the north. Only a few days before
they started out they were threat-
ened with being washed away by a
flood and prepared themselves to leave
their home on a raft if necessary.
They spent very encouragingly, how-
ever, of the future of the country
they were in and think it destined
to rival the gold fields of California
in an early day. W. F. Matlock may
return in a couple of months, but Wil-
liam and his wife will remain here un-
til traffic opens in the spring.

Last Up the River.

Port Townsend, Wash., Nov. 5.—
The steamer *Bellevue* arrived with 158
passengers from Vancouver, the last
crowd to come up the Yukon before
navigation closes. The river boat had
to force its way through the slush ice.
Fears are entertained that the steamer
Nora, which left White Horse Oct. 18,
will be in the frozen ice before she
reaches Dawson. Passengers report
over one thousand men have gone into
headquarters on Pelly and Stewart
rivers for the winter's trapping and
hunting.

POSTOFFICE BOXES SHORT.

Expectation of Free Delivery Cause
for Failure to Put in Additional
Fixtures.
Postmaster Fell informs the East
Oregonian that he hopes to have the
long-talked-of free mail delivery estab-
lished in the city of Pendleton by
the first of January. He has written
the superintendent of free delivery
on the coast, stationed at San Fran-
cisco, asking that a special effort be
made toward this end and informing
him that all the preliminary work has
been completed. All that lacks now
of having free delivery is for the post-
office department to order it estab-
lished. The postoffice now has 600
boxes and yet the demand is far above
this. Postmaster Fell says that there
are calls for boxes every day but he
does not add more for the reason that
when the free delivery is established
that will make less demand and there
will be then be plenty for those want-
ing them.
