HEAD CONSUL NORTHCOTT

MODERN WOODMEN OF

AMERICA'S BIG MEETING.

Four Hundred People at the Court
House Heard Distinguished Ora-
tors.

Never before in the history of Mod-
ern Woodmen of Oregon, have they
had so many of their distinguished
officers together at one time as were
assembled on the platform in the
court house last evening. As announced
by the East Oregonian, they were
Head Consul Northcott and his party,
consisting of Head Clerk Hawes, Mrs.
Mary Fay Hawes, of Rock Island, Dr.
Hamilton Meade, of Portland, head
physician for Oregon, Washington
state Deputy C. D. Elliott, of Seattle,
Washington's Head Physician C. Mil-
ler, of Tacoma, Oregon, State Deputy
Simmons, and others who did not take
part in the speaking. The train was
met by a delegation of Modern Wood-
men and some of the visitors were
taken to Hotel Pendleton for entertain-
ment, while others were taken to
private homes. At 8 o'clock 400 peo-
ple were in waiting at the court house
to see and hear the distinguished
speakers tell something about Modern
Woodcraft.

Stephen A. Lowell presided over the
meeting and at 8:15 he arose and de-
livered a very appropriate address of
welcome in behalf of the Modern
Woodmen of America. Following him
came Miss Ida Hamilton, who welcom-
ed the visitors in behalf of the Royal
Neighbors. Then Head Consul North-
cott addressed the audience for fifteen
minutes and held them spellbound
with his eloquence. Then came Dr.
Hamilton Meade, who made every one
laugh with his stories. State Deputy
Simmons followed him with a brief
history of the state of Oregon as he
had seen it in his travels through
the work, and C. D. Elliott, Washing-
ton state deputy, gave an exhibition in
ventriloquism.

The program ended at 11 o'clock,
after which a brief reception was ter-
minated. The modern Wood-
men of America was organized in 1883
and has made a wonderful growth

LA BELLE CAMAS PRAIRIE

CATTLEMEN ENJOYING
MUCH PROSPERITY.

Breeders are Buying Stock in Large
Numbers—Dairy Industry Boom-
ing.

Ukiah, Nov. 6.—Owing to the high
prices paid for all kinds of beef cat-
tle and the success which has attend-
ed the efforts of the stock associa-
tion in their endeavors to keep out-
side stock, especially sheep, out of
Camas prairie, the cattle industry of
this section is undergoing a boom.
Everybody who can, is buying cattle,
getting them principally from Grant
's Harvey counties. Among the
cows are the following: Bowlsby &
Lester, 150; William Fulton, 100;
Loren & Lazinka, 250; F. Hilbert, 100;
H. Thompson, 75; Ukiah Cattle Co.,
100; Arbogast Bros., 135; E. B. Gam-
ble, 40; Charles Vinson, 25. These
cattle, together with what were
already here, will be quick to fill (to
at all the grass in the ranges su-
perior to this valley next year.

Another important factor, which
enters largely into the cattle business
here, is the creamery industry. Be-
tween 1000 and 1200 cows were milch-
ing in the past season, and indications
are that still a larger number will be
milked next year. When it is consid-
ered that the average cow gets her
owner from \$3 to \$4.50 per month for
six or more months in the year, be-
sides raising her calf, it can be seen
that the creamery business is one not
to be despised, by any means.

CAMAS VALLEY SETTLERS LOCATING MANY CLAIMS.

Stockmen Have Secured Most of the
Watering Places to Protect their
Ranges.

Ukiah, Nov. 6.—The public land is
being rapidly taken up in this section
by means of homestead, stone and
timber, school land and lieu land laws.
It is mostly being taken by stockmen
and ranchers already here, there being
very few newcomers. Almost all the
watering places are located by cattlemen,
in order to hold the adjoining
range.

Ukiah is steadily improving, there
having been six new dwelling houses
and a large livery stable erected with-
in the last six months. There is some
talk of trying to incorporate at the
next session of the legislature, but
such a move will meet with consider-
able opposition.

A deal is pending between W. T.
Sellers and J. B. Despain, by which
Mr. Sellers will purchase Mr. Des-
pain's interest in the general mer-
chandise business of Despain Bros., of
this place. Daniel Rumor has had
the deal consummated. Mr. Des-
pain will ask for a county office at
the hands of the republican party next
spring.

Snow has begun to appear on the
foothills around the prairie, a gentle
reminder to the stockman that winter
is at hand, and to govern himself ac-
cordingly.

School is progressing nicely under
the able management of Prof. J. R.
Engleb as principal and Miss Lulu
Marple as assistant.

The newly organized camp of W. O.
W. at this place is doing nicely, and
has good prospects for a rapidly in-
creasing membership.

L. L. Mullan and Clarence Moore,
who were both recently married, gave
a dance at the town hall on Saturday
night, in honor of the events. Quite
a large crowd was present.
