GENERAL NEWS

United States Consul-General Dickinson, of Constantinople, authorizes the statement that he is satisfied both Miss Stone and Mrs. Talika, her companion are alive and well treated.

Mr. Croker, Maurice Untermyer and Senator F. D. Sullivan were together at dinner and it is said on good authority that a little later Mr. Croker said this was his last political fight.

At Fall River, Mass., M. C. Borden, who a few weeks ago caused excitement in labor circles by announcing an increase of 19 per cent. in wages, has returned to the original schedule of Nov. 18.

President Lockett, of the Knoxville chamber of commerce called upon Admiral Schley in Washington and prevailed upon him to accept the invitation to visit Knoxville. Dewey and Hobson personally urged Admiral Schley to accept.

"If we had all continued together," said Andrew Carnegie to William T. Stead before his departure for the United States, "Britain would have belonged to America much more than America would have belonged to Britain. And it will come to that yet, all under the stars and stripes."

Justice Bradley, sitting as a United States district court judge, signed a decree of condemnation and distribution in connection with the libel on prices instituted by Admiral Dewey on behalf of himself and the crew of the United States naval force taking part in the battle of Manila bay.

Orders have been given by the Chicago & Northwestern management for a complete equipment for the overhaul limited. This necessitates the purchase of ten entire trains, from the engine to the baggage cars, at an expenditure of approximately \$1,200,000. This is said to be the largest order ever given for the equipment of a single train.

Admiral Schley will be invited to Indianapolis. It was decided by the board of managers of the board of trade, and he is asked to be their guest on Nov. 1, or such other early date as would suit his convenience. The occasion will be made a public one and everybody will be invited to a reception at the state house.

The jury in the case of the state against John W. Conditine, has been secured. The testimony of the state relative to the killing of William L. Meredith, formerly chief of police of Seattle, began on Wednesday.

The controller of the currency authorized the Vancouver National Bank, of Vancouver, Wash., to begin business, with a capital of \$60,000. Levi Ankeny is president and W. P. Connaway cashier of the new bank.

William McBride, son of Judge John R. McBride, of Spokane, who was recently in trouble at Baker City, and who was once sentenced to the penitentiary for a Salt Lake City postoffice robbery, is now in trouble in Portland. Two women claim him as their husband.

New York, Nov. 7.—The wheat market continued its upward course today, and shows a gain of 1½c. Liverpool was 1d higher, 5-9. New York opened 78½, and closed 79½, being the low and high points of the day. In view of the heavy export demand and the big shortage in corn, we look for much higher prices for wheat in the near future. The Argentine reports estimate their surplus at only 15,000,000, as against 35,000,000 last year, and 75,000,000 two years ago. Corn closed 66c for December, Pork, \$14.92½ for January. THE COLOMBIAN REVOLUTION

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Kind Words From Italy.
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SCHLEY WAS NO COWARD, SAID LEMLEY

Judge Advocate Concluded His Argument.

DISCUSSED THE EVIDENCE FULLY

Maintained the Department Had Been Neutral in Its Attitude Toward the Rear Admiral.

Washington, Nov. 7.—When the Schley court met this afternoon, Judge Advocate Lemley began his closing argument, elucidating the testimony from the standpoint of the department. He stated he had endeavored to follow the instructions of the secretary of the navy without fear or favor. Early in the proceedings of the court he had remarked that it was a trial by the newspapers, yet he could not help noticing that many of them had put the department and himself on trial. He claimed the department maintained an entirely neutral attitude, that there had been no alteration of records, although Schley's failure to obey orders did not meet the approval of the president and the department, and that it was not permitted to interfere with his nomination for promotion.

Question of Speed.
 Concerning the trip from Key West to Cienfuegos, Lemley maintained that Schley should have made better time, in order to carry out the spirit of the department's instructions. As to the McCalla signals with the insurgents, he asked if it was not incumbent on the commodore himself to make some effort in the event he had not been informed. Upon meeting the Marblehead, Schley should have ordered McCalla to report aboard the flagship. Lemley sarcastically referred to Schley's voyage from Cienfuegos to Santiago which he was ordered to make quickly and cautiously.

LI HUNG CHANG DIED AT PEKIN

Celebrated Chinese Statesman Ends Career.

REMARKABLE SCENES AT HIS DEATH

Celestials Brought Paper Horses and Chairs to Bear Him to His Heavenly Rest.

Peking, Nov. 7.—The death of Li Hung Chang, which occurred this morning, was attended by remarkable scenes. The court yard of his yamen was crowded during his last moments with friends and servants who wallowed widely. Many brought paper horses and chairs of full life size, which will be buried with the body. The Chinese believe that they are needed to carry the man's soul to heaven. Prince Chang succeeds Chang as governor of Pechili.

Minister Wu Grieves.
 Washington, Nov. 7.—Minister Wu is greatly grieved at Li's death. He believes the demise will leave a gap that cannot be filled. Li was the friend and confidant of Wu. "I am disheartened, and an afraid his life's work has been fruitless. My people do not understand," said Wu.

TOM L. JOHNSON WAS VICTORIOUS.

Elected Entire Democratic Legislative Ticket in Cleveland and Cuyahoga County, Ohio.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 7.—Complete returns of Tuesday's election show that Tom L. Johnson, democratic mayor of this city, who managed the campaign for the democratic legislative ticket, succeeded in electing every man who had been nominated by the democrats. Mayor Johnson fought against tremendous odds, inasmuch as the remainder of the state went strongly republican, with majorities and pluralities even larger than those given to McKinley in the presidential election last year. Mayor Johnson secured 2000 plurality for the entire democratic legislative ticket Cuyahoga county, in which Cleveland is located, gave Kilbourne, democratic nominee for governor, about the same plurality over Nash, present incumbent and the republican nominee. Johnson overcame a plurality of 6909 in favor of the republican ticket.
