ALLISON PLACERS BRING \$15,000. They Will Erect a Large Home on the Site Next Spring—Paid \$ 500. Walla Walla, Nov. 7.—Special.—Two lodges of Odd Fellows, Washington No. 19, and Trinity No. 121, have purchased the Keylor property, at Alder and Third streets, for the sum of \$5500. Howard Keylor, the former owner, has purchased the old Picard property, at First and Alder streets, for which he paid the sum of \$15,000.
