INDIANS' TRIAL ON NOV. 21.

Columbia George and Toy Toy to Answer Murder Charge in Portland.

Judge Hollinger, of the federal court at Portland, has set Nov. 21 as the day for the trial of Columbia George and Toy Toy, the Omaticum reservation Indians charged with murdering Annie last year. The defense, represented by Colonel William Parsons and Carter & Bailey have moved for a separate trial for the two, but Judge Hollinger has ruled on the agency's expense the court refused to grant. The defense also moves, that the expenses be allowed to the defendants for the defense, on the ground that the court allows three witnesses, Columbia George's wife, Elizabeth Toy Toy's mother, Mrs. Alex. Toy Toy and William McKay, the agency interpreter. The court refused to grant to the witnesses who were to testify that it was a superstitious belief of the Indians that they should kill those whom they think are guilty of whoredom and of exercising against any of the tribe such of their facilities. Judge Hollinger even refused to grant the agency's expense that was involved on the ground that the best interest of the Indians is to be admitted is inadmissible.

FREEWATER HAS A COLD WATER BATTLE TO WAGE.

Anti-Saloon League Issues a Defi and Says the Keys Gallon House Must Go—Call for Meeting Says County Law Enforcement is an Issue in County Election.

A war is in progress in Freewater, which is the small community at the railroad station where one alights from the train when going to Milton. The war is between those who view with alarm the gallon liquor house of H. Key, and those who are prone to gather there to drive full cars away by filling and emptying the flowing bowl. The first named class came out with a notice that firing the cold water banner to the houses of the Tuna-um river, declared bitter war on the liquor traffic and placed on their mettle those who professed abhorrence of the selling and buying of intoxicants. The "defi" and meeting call was this:

WAR HAS BEEN DECLARED.

Notice—Is hereby given that a regular meeting of the Anti-Saloon League will be held in Freewater on Saturday, Nov. 9th, at 7 o'clock p. m. in Sander's Hall. It is desired that a large representation be present at this meeting, since important measures are to be discussed relative to getting rid of the Gallon House and to prevent further encroachments of the saloon power in our community. It is desired that a general store be controlled by the league, are certain features of the plan to be laid before you. It seems necessary to make a move towards electing county officials who will enforce the law and also set the pace for the business men of this place, who are favoring a saloon. It is also quite apparent that the new paper at Freewater is subsidized to that end. We must put in a counter influence or loose the battle in the very near future. Everyone having signed the remonstrance will be given a seat in the league at this time.

JESS OF THE BAR Z RANCH

Forbes Heerman's Dramatic Romance Satisfactorily Produced by the Alice Archer Company at the Frazer.

"Trice is he armed that hath his quarrel just, and he but naked, though locked up in steel, whose conscience with injustice is corrupted."

Adapted—"Trice" arms the man who has his quarrel just; and four times he who gets his gun out first.

The moral of the Forbes Heerman's play, "Jess of the Bar Z Ranch," is indicated in the quotation above, whether in the original or in the adaptation as given by one of the characters, "The Poet Lariat," who in speaking so, spoke the meaning of the entire piece. Heerman has caught the spirit of the cattle camp, and Miss Archer with her excellent support, has faithfully interpreted the author.

The production is satisfactory, even when judged by a standard far above that commonly attained here. It was an artistic success. The play teaches a good lesson and the lesson is finely brought out and elaborated by the conscientious attention to detail on the part of the Archer management.

The piece, in the first place, is well written. In the next place, its casting is just what it should be. In the fourth place, each of the company of actors producing it is perfectly adapted for his part. And these supply all of the constituents of a successful dramatic presentation.

Miss Archer as "Jess" is infinitely in her part. She will be welcomed here again next season, and her play according to the plans of her manager, and will need them no more; that announcement to attract a large house. Randolph Roberts as "James Spencer," is a gallant fellow who wins the admiration of the audience, and has their sympathy instantly upon coming upon the stage. Albert Lang as "Quigg," has the villain's part and does it finely without overacting and with ideal meanness in his every movement. Joey Santley in his juvenile work is a youthful genius, and the entire cast is worthy of the very best words that a critic can say.

ESCAPED PATIENT TAKEN BY AN O. R. & N. AGENT.

Bolles Junction, Wash., Nov. 12—Special.—Neah McKean, the man who escaped from the Walla Walla jail by pretending to have scarlet fever and eluding his guard at the hospital, was captured this morning by I. T. Glen, the O. R. & N. agent. Glen saw a man arriving in rubbers, helmet and Prince Albert coat and immediately recognized him as the man wanted. Glen pursued and easily captured McKean, who was very weak and unable to resist. Sheriff Kees was sent for and the man is in the county jail.

A Bad, Bad Man.

Walla Walla, Nov. 12—Special.—Ephraim Dent, a bronco rider and bad man in general, lies in the county jail suffering from a huge rash in his head, made by a spade in the hands of Terry Ghoslon. Terry Ghoslon runs a livery stable on West Main street, and when Dent entered the barn yesterday morning and proceeded to clean it out cowboy fashion, he came to a sudden stop by a terrible blow on the head which brought him to the floor.

J. C. Lamar, Pioneer, Dead.

Walla Walla, Nov. 12—Special.—James C. Lamar, pioneer of Ashford and Washington, has died in a hospital in this city and the funeral service will be held this evening. He died after an illness of a month, due largely to senile decay.

Mr. Lamar was truly a pioneer. He came to California in 1849, and a few years later came to this valley. He gathered quite a fortune in Walla Walla county, being at one time one of the prominent horsemen of the state. For many years he has grown wheat in large quantities. Mr. Lamar was 76 years old and had never married.
