THE MONTHLY MARKET FAIR
MANY PEOPLE ARE HERE FROM COUNTRY AROUND.
Next One Will Be on December Second Tuesday—Auction This Afternoon to Dispose of Stuff.
Today is market day. Sometime ago the Pendleton Commercial Association concluded that something should be done to bring the farmers who had something to sell and those who wanted to buy any article that might be on the market closer together, and the idea of a monthly market day, such as cities of the east are having and which has proved a great success toward this end, was decided to be the most feasible way of accomplishing it. So on the 8th of last month the first attempt, which proved very successful, was made toward bringing the buyer and seller together on a certain day and many farmers took advantage of it. Today is the second market day and our streets are filled with people from miles around, some of whom have brought something they desired to sell and others who came with the intention of buying. A great variety of stuff, such as horses, cattle, ducks, geese, chickens, wagons, and many other articles are on the vacant lot on Alta street, back of the city recorder's office, where people are dickering to buy and sell and this afternoon at 2 o'clock an auction was commenced to sell of what was not sold at private sale.
A monthly market day in Pendleton will prove a great boon to the people of the vicinity and it should be encouraged in every way possible. It should be held in mind, however, that to make such a day a success takes some time and the interest it should have can not be worked up in a month or even in several months, but to constantly keep at it in the course of time everybody in the country will become interested and the day can be made one of much greater value to all than can be seen at first.
Past efforts have proven satisfactory to so great an extent that the second Tuesday in December has been set for the next meeting, and the second Tuesday of each month thereafter will be market day in Pendleton. The management requests that this date be kept in mind by the farmers and that each man make a special effort to make the next meeting a greater success than the last one. This will be easily accomplished if all do their part.
