GENERAL NEWS

The Breaker Island plant of the
Troy Steel company will soon be ab-
sorbed by the United States Steel
corporation.

President Hughtitt, of the Chicago &
Northwestern, denied that the North-
western had purchased or intended to
purchase the Chicago, Peoria & St.
Louis road.

Wu Ting Fang, Chinese minister to
the United States, and eminent as a
scholar, has been requested to fill the
chair of Chinese literature, founded
last July at Columbia University.

Said Senator Lodge: "The Isth-
mian business will be settled next
year in a manner honorable and satis-
factory to both countries, which
means we presume, that America will
get her own way in the matter."

Samuel Gompers, president of the
American Federation of Labor, saw
the president to protest against the
arrest of Santiago Iglesias, who was
sent to Porto Rico by the Federation
to organize the workmen of the
island.

Major S. K. Hooper officially denied
the report which has gained currency
throughout the country, that the Den-
ver & Rio Grande company, of which
he is general passenger agent, intends
to employ girls as waiters on its din-
ing cars.

The Lynn Canal steamer City of
Topeka, Captain Oleson, steamed
slowly into Seattle harbor with her
stem bent and a gaping hole near the
load line. The steamer collided with
a sunken iceberg in Taku Bay on the
up trip on the night of November 2.

Two hunters in the mountains east
of Santa Caterina Landing, Cal., came
upon the corpse of a white man, par-
tially eaten by some wild beast. Near
by was a cave. The hunters watch-
ed, and were rewarded by seeing a
large mountain lion emerge from it.
They killed the beast.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

Amos Nahum King, one of Port-
land's most widely known pioneers,
died Monday night in Portland, at the
family homestead.

M. L. Chamberlain, clerk of the
State School Land Board, reports an
unusual demand and an increased
number of sales by the state of farm-
ing lands.

The Long Beach bathhouse, owned
by Canaris & Ferrell, was destroyed
by fire Tuesday morning, and also Mr.
Canaris' residence, which adjoined the
bathhouse.

A temporary telegraph line is to be
erected this winter between Port Eg-
bert and Valdez. In the spring work
will be commenced upon the line be-
tween Port Egbert and the Panama.

On Tuesday morning C. E. Shuff
shot and killed Eugene Klein, time-
keeper for the Standard Mining com-
pany, at Mace, Idaho. Shuff maintained
his pay check was not large enough
and shot Klein in the back.

Two highwaymen are behind the
bars at the Portland city jail, and one
has already been held to the grand
jury under \$1000 bonds. The prisoners
give the names of James O'Brien and
Frank Eagle, and each was concerned
in a different hold-up Sunday night.

J. K. Edmiston, formerly president
of the Walla Walla Savings Bank,
which suffered a bad suspension about
seven years ago, is now making a
record as an honest man who pays
whatever he can, and hopes some day
to be able to look the whole world in
the face and say he owes not a penny.

A large cinnamon bear made his ap-
pearance on the farm of Edward Dim-
mick, in the northern suburbs of
Grant's Pass. The big beast was
boldly attacking the inhabitants of the
barnyard and showed fight when the
owner of the ranch unexpectedly met
him. There was a hasty scuffle for
a gun, the contents of which put an
end to Bruin's career.

At a Salem restaurant a duck was
found to have 50 cents in gold in its
crop. The duck was brought from
Scott's Mills, where it was raised.
The owner said the gold evidently
came from a mill race, dug in that
town recently. The gold was in small
nuggets, wedge-shaped, one-eighth of
an inch long. The ground where the
ducks feed will be investigated.

MORGAN'S
GIGANTIC
SCHEME

Begins Work of Actual Con-
solidation of Roads.

COMBINED CAPITAL IS \$1,042,837,186

Total Trackage, 47,372 Miles—Organizes
Northwestern Securities Company to
Buy in the Stocks.

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 12.—J. P. Mor-
gan & Co. today secured a charter for
the Northwestern Securities company,
capital \$400,000,000. Among the ob-
jects for which the articles of incor-
poration say the company was organ-
ized is the purchase and acquisition of
stocks, bonds and securities of cor-
porations. The company is admitted
to be a branch of the billion-dollar
steel corporation, and is the begin-
ning of the consolidation of the Union
Pacific, South Pacific, Northern Pa-
cific, Great Northern, St. Paul, Den-
ver, Chicago & Northwestern rail-
roads, whose combined trackage is
47,372 miles and capital stock \$1,042,
837,186.

N. P. Preferred to Retire.

New York, Nov. 12.—At a meeting of
the directors of the Northern Pacific
railway today, resolutions were unani-
mously adopted to retire the preferred
stock at par on January 1, 1902.
The resolution means the Northern
Pacific directors accept the Harman-
Morgan plan for settlement of the
conflict of railroad interests in the
northwest; that the Northern Pa-
cific will go into the hands of the prop-
rietary company formed today, and that
the Burlington and Great Northern
railways will do likewise.

THE M'KINLEY MEMORIAL

PLAN TO HAVE A NATIONAL
HOLIDAY FOR THE COUNTRY.

Postmasters to Receive Subscriptions

All over the United States.
Washington, Nov. 12.—A plan to
obtain the entire sum necessary for
the erection of the McKinley mem-
orial arch will be adopted shortly by
the association in this city. Presi-
dent Roosevelt is to be asked to ap-
point by proclamation a memorial day
upon which subscriptions can be re-
ceived by every postmaster in the
United States. The day is to be a
national holiday. More than a million
and a half, it is believed, can be rais-
ed in one day in this manner.

AN EVANSVILLE MYSTERY

ENTIRE POLICE DEPARTMENT
FERRETING OUT MURDERS.

A Commercial Traveler From St.
Louis Is Wanted in the Case.

Evansville, Ind., Nov. 12.—The en-
tire police department is trying to
ferret out the murderer of Mrs. Geo.
Railey and Lena Tenner, who were
strangled to death and the bodies
found at different points on the pub-
lic highway outside of the city. Sev-
eral men are under surveillance, but
no evidence has been secured that
will justify the police in making ar-
rest. A St. Louis traveling man, with
whom Mrs. Railey secretly was
friendly, is being looked for. The
man has a family.

On the night of her murder her
house was entered and all her letters
carried away.

SPEAKERSHIP UNQUESTIONED

HENDERSON HAS NO
OPPOSITION FOR IT.

Payne to be Republican Leader—
Dearmont May Supplant Richardson
for Democrats.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Speaker
Henderson, of the national house, will
arrive at the capital on Friday. He
will have no opposition for the speak-
ership and the house will organize
next month without a flurry. Hender-
son's reelection will mean that Sen-
ator Payne, of New York will continue
to be leader of the republicans on the
floor. Richardson, of Tennessee, may
have some opposition for the demo-
cratic leadership. There is some
talk of putting up Dearmont, of Mis-
souri.

DEATH OF MAJOR BELKNAP.

Died in Manila—Was Congressman
Two Terms—Had Been Paymas-
ter.

Washington, Nov. 12.—The adju-
tant-general today received a cable-
gram from Manila, telling of the
death of Major Belknap, paymaster.
Belknap was congressman from Chi-
cago for two terms, and a son of Gen-
eral Belknap, Grant's secretary of
war.

He died in Calamba yesterday of
septic poisoning of the intestines.

Fire in Grand Rapids.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 12.—Fire
this morning destroyed the Powers
Opera House. Several occupants
barely escaped with their lives. Loss
is \$100,000.

General Merriman Retired.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Brigadier-
General Merriman was placed on the
retired list today.

John Irise, a ward of the Clark
county, Washington, poor farm, com-
mitted suicide last Friday by hanging
himself.

THE NEW YORK MARKET

New York, Nov. 12.—The wheat
market was very steady today, the
closing prices being practically the
same as yesterday. Liverpool opened
5-8%, and closed 5-9. New York
opened at 78%, and after touching
78 1/2%, closed at 78 1/2%. Chicago opened
at 71 1/2%, closed 71 1/2%. Corn was strong
and closed a cent higher, 67 Decem-
ber. The conservative people in the
trade regard wheat cheap and safe to
buy around present prices. A promi-
nent commission merchant expresses
the situation as follows: "The out-
look for wheat points to much higher
prices, and I feel that a buyer as re-
gards the final outcome, never took
less risk than right now, especially
when you compare the price of wheat
with all other grain, and consider the
foreign requirements as evidenced by
our shipments since July, of over 112,
000,000, being nearly double those of
last year. There will be a large
amount of the short corn and oat

HE WAS STOLEN BY HIS DAD

FATHER RAN AWAY
WITH HIS OWN SON.

Fulton Pickard, of Eureka Flat, Se-
creted and Then Found in Wait-
sburg.

Walla Walla, Nov. 12.—Special.
Kidnaped by his father, secreted with
friends for several days, and found
by the sheriff, is the record made by
Fulton Pickard, the 17-
month-old son of Silas Pickard, a
farmer living on Eureka Flat. The
little fellow was taken in charge to-
day by Sheriff Kees, of Waitsburg,
where he had been secreted. An or-
der of the superior court caused the
sheriff to make the search.

Several months ago Silas Pickard
and his wife separated, the wife tak-
ing the child with her. The husband
remained on the ranch and perform-
ed his usual duties. Recently he made
up his mind to secure the child, and
last Friday was the day set apart for
the task. Previously he had met his
wife, and the two had agreed to mend
their ways and try double harness
again. Before leaving for the ranch,
he went to a dentist in this city for
treatment of a tooth which had
been troubling him. The husband and
child remained in a buggy, while Mrs.
Pickard went up to the dentist's of-
fice. When a few minutes later, she
returned, her husband and boy had
disappeared. No trace of the boy was
found until yesterday, when Sheriff
Kees located him in Waitsburg, and
today went after him.

Yesterday Mrs. Pickard began ac-
tion for divorce from her husband, al-
leging improvidence and incompati-
bility of temperament. On this ac-
tion she secured a court order direct-
ing the sheriff to secure custody of
the boy and bring him to his mother
pending the determination of the case.
Silas Pickard is a farmer, 35-
do, and of long residence in Walla
Walla county. He is a brother of
Charles J. Pickard, the well-known
wheat king of Eureka Flat. About
three years ago he married, and the
neighbors were surprised at the sep-
aration a few months ago, as no signs
of discontent had been noticed there-
before.

Saloon Cases.

Walla Walla, Nov. 12.—Special.
Charged with selling liquor on Sun-
day eight saloon-keepers were brought
before Justice William Glassford yester-
day afternoon to answer the charge
made by Prosecuting Attorney Cain.
The men were: Albert Netherberg,
a member of the city council; Nicholas
Schmidt; George Retzer; Peter
Werner; Frank Davin; Xavier Michel
loid; Joseph Schuler and John Rach-
told. Each conducts a saloon on Main
street. It is charged that eight sa-
loons were open last Sunday, the first
time in several weeks. In each case
the defendant waived examination, and
as yet he cases be set for next
week. Bonds in the sum of \$100 each
were given.

A sensation was sprung when the
arrests were made yesterday. It has
been generally understood that the sa-
loons would obey the new ordinance
passed by the council requiring all sa-
loons to close Sundays, and no trial
has been experienced until last Sun-
day. Now prosecution has begun
under the state law instead of the
ordinance. It is said that the council
is figuring on enforcing the ordinance
by forfeiting a license and closing up
one saloon as an example.

SWEPT BY
A FURIOUS
HURRICANE

England, Scotland and Ireland
Blown to Pieces.

LIVES LOST, SHIPPING DESTROYED

Storm Abated Somewhat Today—Hundred
and Fifty Have Been Drowned
in Two Days Past.

London, Nov. 12.—The disastrous
gale which swept over England yester-
day continues today, although it is
abating somewhat in its fury. Re-
ports of damage to shipping and loss
of life continue to come in. Several
members of the crew of the Dover
lightship are believed to have lost
their lives when that vessel went
down. The vessel has sunk off Dub-
geness and it is feared the entire crew
has been lost. Rain fell for forty
hours in Ireland, swelling rivers and
flooding towns along the banks, and
causing great distress to the poor.
Many streets of Belfast are flooded. A
revenue cutter has been wrecked in
the Frith of Forth and twenty-three
of the crew drowned. One hundred
and fifty deaths have been reported
from all points since the gale began.

REPUBLICS ARE RECOGNIZED

PRESIDENTS WILL BE IN
IT AT THE CORONATION.

Edward Will Make No Distinction Be-
tween Monarchs Crowned and Those
Who Rule Free Republics.

London, Nov. 12.—The king has de-
cided that in the coronation celebra-
tion no distinction will be made be-
tween the titles of king, emperor and
president. He declares his object is
to honor the state and not the man
who is at its head. Englishmen who
are not aware of the constitutional
prohibition, hope that President Roo-
sevelt will come.

MERCHANTS WANT A
CANADIAN RECIPROCITY.

Called on the President to Ask Him
to Favor Such a Treaty.

Washington, Nov. 12.—President
Roosevelt received a visit this morn-
ing from the representatives of several
chambers of commerce, who called
to urge him to take some action look-
ing to reciprocity with Canada. The
president told the merchants that,
while he did not think it expedient for
him to express a preference for one
reciprocity over another, he was
greatly interested on the subject and
believed commercial relations with
Canada should be placed on a most
favorable basis. He also expressed
the belief that the coming congress
would pass some sort of a reciprocity
treaty with many of the countries that
buy our goods.

FIGHT WITH FILIPINOS.

Hartman's Cavalry Run Into a Band
of Armed Insurgents.

Manila, Nov. 12.—Captain Hart-
man's cavalry ran into 200 Filipinos
armed with rifles and bolos on the
Batangas road. The insurgents routed
them in quick order. Sixteen of the
Filipinos were killed and nine cap-
tured; two Americans were wounded.
