#### A CONSISTENT PLAN.

The East Oregonian believes that no plan for the improvement of the Columbia river will be permanent that does not recognize the claims of state. Just so long as Portland asks for federal money to make it stronger from a navigation standpoint, and falls to see to it that the upper river has proper attention, so long will Portland fall to accomplish what she desires. She will find opposition from Astoria and eastern Oregon, sufficient to prevent results. Also, it is true that just so long as Astoria and eastern Oregon attempt to deprive Portland of her rights in the matter of river improvements, just so long will no results come to them in their desired ends.

It is imperative that someone competent so to do formulate a consistent plan for the handling of the entire river improvement, as relating to the federal appropriations, such a plan to incorporate just recognition of Portland's rights, and also those of the other portions of the state that are interested.

We of eastern Oregon appreciate that Portland's continued growth as a commercial center is essential to the prosperity of the state. In proportion as Portland develop her commercial possibilities, will Oregon advance. Portland is joined closely with all of Oregon, in all matters pertaining to the bringing out of the latent resources. Portland is in a figurative sense the heart of Oregon, and only by the strong flow of commercial blood through that heart may Oregon have the strength warranted by her great natural wealth and commanding position.

We must have no internal quarrels. We must have accord and harmony. We must make a long pull and a strong pull and a pull all together for the good of the commonwealth. Let us stand as a solid wall of defense against the aggression of our rivals; or, better, let us be an aggressive army, fighting for our rights at the hands of the federal government.

#### TAXING MINES.

It will be noted with satisfaction that Baker county will place mining properties upon the tax rolls, and compel owners to contribute something towards the support of the government. They receive benefits of protection and of other character, and should pay into the public treasury an amount of money commensurate with their takings from the ground. Baker county might even think of suing for collection for back taxes that have not been paid; or, as of course would be the case, finding this illegal, sue former officers for damages. In not assessing the mines; or, as in fact would be the only course to pursue, see that hereafter no assessor is elected who does not pledge plainly and openly that he will assess mining property according to its just valuation. It has been a travesty upon government that Baker county, with little else but mines, compared with other regions, permitted the owners to go year after year without returning the obligation under which they rested for the protection afforded them, by law and officer.

#### A SON OF HIS FATHER.

To be a son of Joe Jefferson, the leading comedian of the world, is a mark of some distinction. But, when regarded from all rational points of view, it is not calculated to elevate one in the estimation of others for an actor to advertise himself as the son of anyone in particular. The fact that he is existent is proof that he is a son, and as to who owns him as a son makes no difference to people of good sense. Josh Billings said that when he heard anyone bragging of his grandfather, all he (Billings) did was to pity his grandfather. Thomas Jefferson came here the other day and played "Rip Van Winkle." Irving's quaint story made more famous because Jefferson, the elder, has enacted the story for thirty years past. Thomas did very well, indeed, but he did so, not because he was a son of Joseph, but because he could act well. However, many people remained away for the reason that they feared that Thomas was merely a son of Joe, and not also a good actor. Thomas would better order his press agent

to eliminate from advance notices so much of prominence for the sonship of this son of his father.

#### LET HIM PROVE HIS WORDS.

Senator Simon, says the Salem Statesman, believes that chances are excellent for the passage of the Nicaragua canal bill at the coming session of congress.

The East Oregonian suggests to the senator that he has now an opportunity to prove that he is not talking for political effect. Everyone knows that a legislator failing to "talk" for the canal at home, would not last so long as a snowball would in the fires of Hades. And everyone knows that many legislators have lasted a long time who have "talked" for the canal at home, and then gone to Washington and failed to do something effective for the measure. Senator Simon and others of Oregon's congressional delegation may well heed these words of warning, and remember that sometimes the people get into the saddle, and go out on a hunt for legislators who do not make good their campaign promises. Let the senator prove his words.

#### MULTIPLE TELEGRAPHY.

What is considered as the perfection of multiple telegraphy, has just been demonstrated in a series of experiments between Paris and Bordeaux by means of an apparatus invented by M. Mercadier, one of the head masters of the Paris Polytechnic School of Telegraphic Operators. No difficulty was found in transmitting by the same wire sixteen simultaneous messages, which were received by an equal number of operators without the slightest confusion.

The success of the experiments was so unquestionable that M. Mougnot, under secretary of state for posts and telegraphs, proposes immediately to establish a Mercadier apparatus for the purpose of transmitting to Havre and Brest cablesgrams to England and America. Before the Academy of Sciences, M. Mercadier explained his new system.

"It is based," said the inventor, "on the principle of sending undulatory currents over the wire instead of continuous currents. It is well known that movements transmitting themselves by means of undulations, can coexist without destroying one another. In every drawing-room this principle is illustrated. The voices of the different talkers, the music of the piano and other sounds do not interfere with each other in the slightest degree, because they are undulatory, as well as pitched in different keys.

"Thus, I have used a number of transmitters, each tuned to a different note of the scale, and therefore making a different number of vibrations. The first transmitter is tuned to 'G,' the second to 'A,' and so on through the scale, each vibration sending a short, sharp current over the wire. Corresponding apparatus is placed in the receiving end, each receiver responding only to a similarly tuned transmitter at the other end. The words and messages fly amicably and distinctly along the single wire, precisely as conversations cross one another in the same room.

Speaking to a correspondent, M. Mercadier said: "My apparatus can be established at any point in a wire and is perfectly capable of sending messages in different directions or in the same direction. The number of messages that can be sent is only limited by the number of pitches employed."

One of the officials of the telegraphic administration said: "Other devices for multiple telegraphy do not approach the perfect working of that invented by M. Mercadier, by means of which, during the experiments just concluded, 1300 distinct pitches, averaging twenty words each, were sent between Paris and Bordeaux in relays of sixteen at a time. If the invention should be adopted, it will increase ten fold the present telegraphic efficiency of France."
