### PENDLETON CANDIDATES

The Dalles Chronicle says: Pendleton is afflicted with an alarming attack of chronic modesty. Its leading paper has just announced the name of another candidate for state honors, making four in all at this writing, with the Lord alone knows how many more in training who will come out in due time. This time it is "Colonel" J. H. Raley, who is "mentioned" for the attorney-generalship. The East Oregonian was eloquent over Raley's nomination. The Chronicle is, perhaps unintentionally, yet nevertheless, really unfair in this comment. The editor would have found upon careful reading of the East Oregonian's statement regarding Col. Raley that it was distinctly asserted that Col. Raley was not a candidate, has not been, and at no time conceived the idea of offering his name as a candidate for the democratic nomination for the attorney-generalship. A Portland paper "mentioned" him in that connection, and the East Oregonian made it the occasion of paying a deserved compliment to a distinguished member of the democratic party. Col. Raley is recognized as one of the ablest lawyers in the state, as an unusually qualified for public office, as a man of intellect and studious habits, of careful attention to any task that his profession may assign him, and few persons who know Col. Raley will refuse to concede that he is in every way fitted to discharge the duties of the office for which he has been "mentioned" without his knowledge or consent.

### CONSIDINE VERDICT JUST.

Notwithstanding John Considine of Seattle, is a most undesirable citizen, pernicious in his influence, corrupting in his life and practices, and in every respect worthy of all good men's contempt, yet justice-loving and unprejudiced persons will commend the verdict rendered by the jury on Thursday. According to the evidence there was even more than a "reasonable doubt" of Considine's guilt, and it would have been unjust to have declared him guilty. Seattle's municipal affairs are so foully corrupt that the distant observer of events finds it difficult to discriminate between the good and the bad. Considine had been linked with law-breakers, was himself a law-breaker, and studied constantly to discover new and untried means whereby he could further avoid the prohibitions of the law. He was a briber, an associate of vile people, and during many years has been notorious for his unlawful practices. But it was not clear that he was the aggressor in the fight with Meredith, and "not guilty" was dictated by considerations of justice on the part of the jury.

### WALLA WALLA'S COUNCIL.

The city of Walla Walla has advertised itself in an unfavorable manner through its common council. Albert Niebergall, a member of that council, was guilty of violating the ordinances of the town and the statutes of the state by keeping open his saloon on Sunday. There is no denial of his guilt. It was conceded by him. It was proposed to annul his license for the sale of liquors, and the council held a special session to take action thereon. The decision was that the license should not be annulled, and Councilman Niebergall and other Walla Wallans will continue to violate the laws with impunity. It is an invitation to all citizens there to proceed to disregard law of all kinds. It encourages robbers, thieves, crooks and all others who wish to do things contrary to statute and ordinance, to do so at their pleasure. With an issue squarely joined Walla Walla's council has taken action that amazes law abiding people elsewhere. For what is law enacted? For what are officers chosen? For what has government organized? Why has been constructed the expensive machinery of the law and the courts, if not to punish law-breakers? And, in all good conscience, if Albert Niebergall, common councilman, self-confessed violator of the law, can ride over the will of the people as written in statute and ordinance, why should not all others do the same? With

the precedent now established, where is Walla Walla to draw the line and who shall be punished, if he goes free who, himself a maker of law, openly insult the better element by admitting his guilt and then asking for remission of the just penalty?

### NEW YORK GOSSIP.

Not in a great many years has New York been treated to so many real sensations as this year. The final settlement of great railroad questions, speaking of events since the campaign, the combination of big banks, the selling of liquor on Sunday and contests of wills have formed only a part of the happenings in which the public took the keenest interest. The various temperance societies of New York City and the boroughs are greatly excited over the question of Sunday opening for the saloons. Of course they are against it and several committees are going to present themselves to Mayor Low at the beginning of his administration to see what can be done about the matter. Among politicians the matter is a ticklish one. The republican party in the state is practically pledged to support the Kansas law. Any deviation from the present system, certainly any approval of Sunday opening, would stir up all kinds of trouble with the people up state. The only thing that can be hoped for from the legislature, and that is unlikely, is a referendum to give the people of New York a chance to say whether or not they want their saloons open on Sunday or not.

Much speculation is rife in Gotham concerning the recent purchase of the famous Hope diamond from Lord Francis Hope, of England. The purchase of this stone is of particular interest to Americans just now because of the recent importation by a well-known firm of jewelers of a twenty-two and a half carat sapphire blue diamond, said to be the rival of the Hope gem in beauty and price. So it would appear that Santa Claus will carry this year deep down in his pack two little bits of crystal worth a king's ransom. For whom are these priceless gems destined? The richest women in the richest country in the world are anxiously awaiting the coming of the good saint, for he holds the secret. Barring the King-of-Kings, the celebrated gem which King Edward has ordered to appear in the queen's crown at the coronation, the Hope diamond is the most famous jewel in the world.

### THE SCHOOL LIEN LANDS.
